EDITORIAL

Those interested in Canadian Meter cancellations will find a two and a half page article in "Stamps" of Dec. 17th. The author, Werner Simon, states that details of Meter Slogans will perhaps be given in the Monthly Bulletin of the Meter Slogan Associates.

The booklet on The Georgian Stamps of Canada, published by the Capital Stamp and Stationery Co., 241 Bank St. Ottawa, is highly recommended to members of the Society (50¢)

The 1939 issue of the A.H. Vincent catalogue of B.N.A. is a well printed book of 62 pages which includes 23 pages of Canadian Revenues (2 column page) and is well worth the price of 35¢ at most dealers.

We again draw your attention to the questionnaire on the second page of this bulletin. It is some years since a roster was available and your directors want to make it as complete as possible, so please fill out and mail to our President at once.

Ye Editor was recently favored with a copy of "The Virginia Philatolist" dated Aug. 1898, which contained a full report of the Dominion Philatelic Association Convention in Hamilton, July 1st & 2nd. The magazine had a picture of 21 of the 30 who attended the meeting. There was a total of 78 votes cast for the office of vice president, the president, A.M. Muirhead, being elected by acclamation. The officers were scattered from the President in Halifax, to the U.S. Vice Pres., Chas. Bailey, from Kaukauna, Wis., who incidentally came the furthest to the convention. The first arrivals were W.A. Lydiatt, Toronto and R.G. Widdicombe, St. Catharines, both gentlemen "wheeling" to the city. Fifty two lots were auctioned at one evening session, one lot of particular mention was a Canada 3¢ laid paper on original cover which sold at 50¢. The second morning session was taken up in examining the magnificent collection of W.H. Thurston of Flesherton, who had wheeled in the previous day. The Auction manager reported a profit for the year of 92¢. It was arranged that the 1899 convention should be in Toronto. Those attending were greatly pleased that the new Special Delivery stamp had been put on sale during the convention. Although a number of the visitors went home on Sat. P.M. the evening session was made informal by music, speeches and a jolly time. In fact 7 of the visitors stayed over Sunday and took in the city. Those in the group picture were F.M. Robinson, R.S. Mason, A.H. Ward, A. Terryberry, Ed. A. Marris, Dr. E.G. Kittson, C.S. Applegath, J.H. Slater, N. Matches, and W.H. Grant, of Hamilton; W.A. Lydiatt and W. McMahon of Toronto, C.B. Morden, Toronto, G.W. Starnaman, W.A. Starnaman and F.I. Weaver of Berlin, R.S. Knox of Grimsby, L.S. Graham, of Merritton, R.F. Widdicombe and W.A. Beatty, St. Catharines, Chas. Bailey, Kaukauna, Wis. Canadian Philatelic magazines of that time were the Philatelic Advocate, Berlin; The Ontario Philatelist, The Stamp Reporter, The Montreal Philatelist and the Philatelic Messenger, Oak Hill, N.B.

Information re Late Issues of Canadian Postal Stationery

We are indebted to A. E. Bradley for information re the following:
Like the stamp issues of the same period, all Canadian Postal Stationery of the last issue of King Geo. V. and the present King Geo. VI. show the date of issue. The date 1935 is half on each side of the portrait near the value tablet. The date 1938 on the present issue is arranged the same way but placed under the value tablet. Owing to the smallness of the figure on this issue it is often blurred and practically undecipherable even with a glass on the various postcards. The type of postcard sold in blocks of 8 for printing is the plainest of the postcards and letters. The date is easily discerned on the newspaper wrappers. In regard to the postcards, each type of the 2¢ card is printed in a different shade of brown. After looking at Mr. Bradley's collection of stationery, we wonder if we, like hundreds of other collectors, are passing up something really interesting. Some fine day, maybe, we will find there "ain't no more" and we were going to send for it next week, too.
