A new list from Cttawa shows that the 2¢ New Brunswick is again for sale there, as well as all Jubilees, 1, 2 and 3 cent coils; 1, 2 and 3 cent combination booklets and 1, 2 4 and 10¢ ones of the 1935 issue. Removed from sale are the 2 and 3¢ war tax, 1¢ green coil (1912,P8V) and the 1931 2¢ brown booklet (die 1).

Stamps listed as "off-centre" include - 4¢, 7¢ bistre and 20¢ of 1912-25; 1¢ Confederation; 5¢ violet (both kinds) and 8¢ blue, 1930; 20¢ S.D., 1922; 20¢ S.D. Confederation issue; 2¢, 4¢ and 5¢ thin Dues and both surcharged air-mail.

Newfoundland - In addition to the 1932 issue, the 3¢ and 10¢ to 30¢ values of 1931 are on sale at the St. Johns P.O.

The Mint reports coinage struck during 1935 as follows:428,120 dollars; no halves; 537,997 quarters; 384,592 dimes; 3,891,151 nickels and
