OTTAWA TO HANDLE FIRST DAY COVERS

The Post Office has informed the press that they are resuming the servicing of First-Day Covers for stamp collectors, a practice dropped some months ago.

An official said the service was cancelled because of the very considerable cost and work it entailed.

It is being resumed to meet the great demand of philatelists, but, to help cover expenses, charges of five cents on ordinary first-day covers and ten cents on special-delivery covers will be made.

Halifax has felt that their Joseph Howe of the Chronical should be por-trayed on the recent Canadian commemorative as he battled to establish responsible government in the days before 1848. A post office official said that Howe was only one of many who took an active part in the fight for responsible government. The department felt there were far too many fine distinctions to say that any one of these persons was the true "Father" of responsible government. "This is the year in which the 100th anniversary of the achievement of responsible government is marked," he said. "We are trying to commemorate an event, not the respective merits of the people involved. We thought it would be appropriate to picture the sovereigns reigning then and now."

A new 5c Postage Due stamp of the current style was issued on August 11th, 1948.

The 1c Green (Scott-217) was sold out at Ottawa on Sept. 14th.

1949 CONVENTION IN MONTREAL

Convention chairman for next year, C. Woodhead, reports that after receiving and investigating several requests to have next convention, that it has been decided that in line with the policy adopted of shifting about the country from year to year, it has been found most desirable to accept the invitation of the Westmount Stamp Club to come to Montreal next spring. The dates have been agreed on as April 20-21-22-23, 1949. Already Cyril states that he has three reservations on hand, and what's more my wife wants to know why we can't all fly down together.

It has been announced at Ottawa that 25,000,000 copies of the 4c Citizen stamp were issued.

The recent Princess Elizabeth stamp from Australia was on water-marked paper. It has now appeared on paper that is unwatermarked.

New Zealand Health Stamps for 1948 issued Oct. 1st show a lad sunbathing in a window looking out at other children at play outside. The 1d. plus ½d. is green and blue while the 2d. plus 1d. is red and brown. These stamps will be withdrawn from sale on Jan. 31st, 1949.

British Hondurus will issue a set of six bi-colored stamps to commemorate the 150th Anniversary of the Battle of St. George's Cay.

Jugoslavia has issued a stamp for Lawrenz Kosir whom they claim as the creator of the idea of the first postage stamp in 1836.

CANADIAN REVALUED IN 1949 CATALOGUE

With the new 1949 issue of Scott's "Standard Postage Stamp Catalog" now available, it is interesting to note some of the revisions affecting Canadian issues as compared with the previous addition. Generally speaking there a very few changes of importance, but here are the highlights for the benefit of our members who have not yet had the opportunity to check the new catalog.

The 1851-5 "pence" issues are unchanged with the exception of the 5 pence variety No. 5d, which has increased to \$700.00 unused and \$150.00 used. The 1855-7 "pence" issues show marked increases for both unused and used, while the wove paper varieties of 1858-59 remain unchang-

ed.

The 1859 "cents" issue and the 2 cents rose of 1864 all show increases in value indicating that these are becoming increasingly more difficult

to obtain in good condition.

Very little change is noted in the 1868 "large cents" issue, but the perforation varieties and the Ottawa printings of the "small cents" have been revalued. The 1897 Jubilees have been upped slightly, differences being most apparent in the used high values The Maple Leaf and Numerals, Penny Postage and the Edward issues show very little change except in the high values.

Changes to the latter issues show steady gains in the higher values. The 2c coil, No. 133, has been corrected and is now at \$4.50 mint and used. The 50c Bluenose now catalogs at \$5.00 and the \$1.00 Parliament at \$12.50 mint. The 50c Grande Pre unused has been increased from \$7.50 to

\$10.00.

Air Post issues remain steady, although the 17c "error" of 1946 dropped from \$1.00 to 75c mint or used. Special Delivery and Postage Due issues are practically the same as last year, but the 8c Registered has been increased to \$17.50 mint and used.

OUR AFFILIATED SOCIETIES

The local club will pay to the society an annual registration fee on April 1st each year at either of the following rates:

Club having less than 25 members on its roster shall pay \$3.00 annually. Clubs having more than 25 mem-

Clubs having more than 25 members on its roster shall pay \$5.00 annually.

All local clubs in order to receive the status of affiliation must have at least five C.P.S. members on its roster.

WHAT WE PROPOSE TO DO-

In lieu of the annual fee, we will provide for full registration of each club in the Club Listing of our Annual Membership Directory at no further charge.

A special committee is being established to co-operate with the local clubs and to assist them in every way possible.

We will endeavour to do everything possible, in a general way, towards promoting the hobby in all

parts of the country.

REGISTER NOW — All clubs now affiliated are asked to complete a copy of the registration form now in order that we can get our plans under way, however no fees are required at the present time. The regular annual registration is to be made on or about April 1st next year.



CANADIAN ERROR



A. G. BELL DISPLAYS

We are indebted to Mr. Joe F. Melvin of the Bell Telephone Co. of Can. in Montreal for the use of the two cuts reproduced on these pages. They originally appeared in the "Blue Bell" with one of those articles Joe Melvin frequently contributes on Philately. Maybe in a future issue he will favor the Bulletin with some of his writings. Herewith we steal in part from his recent account on Centennial Stamp Displays.

The Bell Homestead at Brantford, scene of so many historic events since Professor Alexander Melville Bell brought his family, which included the noted Alexander Graham Bell, to live there in 1870, saw yet another historically significant ceremony on the occasion of the annual Convention of the Canadian Philatelic Society. It was the presentation to the City of Brantford and the Bell Homestead of a frame of Bell Commemorative Stamps and Covers.

Suitably mounted and labelled, it will hang prominently in the Homestead for all to see — another unit in a collection of telephone models, parts and documents contained in this museum.

The frame included: A block of Centennial Stamps perforated with the initials "B.T." as used on company mail; mint sheets from each of the two plates; a first-day goodneighbor cover with commemoratives picturing A. G. Bell, from Argentine, U.S.A., and Canada; a first-day cover marked Tutela (the actual location of the homestead) and Brantford; an airmail first-day cover presented by J. F. Melvin, C.P.S., member on the Montreal Bell Staff, a city of Brantford first-day cover, and a first-day cover postmarked at both Paris and Brantford which were the terminals of the first long distance experiment.

The frame was presented by Messrs. Woodhead and Baulch in the presence of many leading Brantfordites and Bell Officials.

A similar frame has been made up by J. H. Crocker, curator of the Jeffrey Collection as one of some 75 panels in the noted exhibition of the University of Western Ontario, at London.

The 54th annual convention, bourse and exhibition of the Society of Philatelic Americans was held in the Detroit-Leland Hotel, Detroit, Michigan, from Friday, Sept. 17th to Sunday, Sept. 19th, inclusive.

Mr. Hil. F. Best, of Gross Point, Mich., and incidentally a member of the Canadian Philatelic Society, was elected President of the S.P.A., succeeding Mr. Vincent Domanski, and presided at the Convention Banquet on Saturday, Sept. 18th. Colonel S. L. A. Marshall, editorial writer and military critic of the Detroit News was guest speaker and gave an interesting and informative account of some of his experience and observations during World War II in his capacity as U.S. Army Historian in the European and Central Pacific theatres.


Perhaps the most outstanding feature of the convention was the huge Exhibition, where over 300 frames were on display. Trophies and awards were presented to the winners at the banquet. Dr. Clarence Hennan, Chicago, was Chairman of the Board Judges, and Mr. Les. Davenport, of Toronto, was also one of the judges. The Grand Award for the Best Exhibit in the show went to Mr. Edwin E. Pulls, for his display of Territorial and Express Covers. Mr. Leo. Goldman, C.P.S. member from Windsor, was presented with Chicago Philatelic Society Research Award for his display of Canadian varieties.

"P" FOR PHILATELY PINS

The Canadian Philatelic Society has been given sole rights for the distribution of the new Stamp Collectors identification badge in Canada.



The design for this badge was originated by the Ford Employees stamp Club of Windsor and the manufacturer. Promotion of a lapel pin with this de-

sign is being handled by a group of collectors know as "Philatelic Boost-

ers".

The overall size of the pin is %" x %". It has a general background of gold, while the lettering in the centre is red surrounded by a circular band in blue, both of these colors being in enamel. In the centre is a letter "P" in Old English, while in the circular band is the word "Philately". The border of the pin has indentations representing perforations.

This design is international in scope, having nothing about it that represents any particular country or

type of collecting.

The "Philatelic Boosters" believe an emblem to identify Stamp Collectors is a necessity. One that would be worn by all collectors regardless of clubs, societies or nationalities. When this design is accepted by all collectors and attains the universal use as does the Masonic emblem, or Rotary, etc., then it will have attained its real purpose.

To make it possible for all collectors to have one, the pins are being sold at cost plus a small handling charge. It is hoped that all collectors will wear one and promote the idea

with fellow collectors.

The pins are obtainable from the C.P.S. by writing to Phil. McCabe at 40 Stanley Ave., Mimico, Ont. The pins are available in screw type for men, a brooch type for the ladies, and little larger style for juniors.

The price of the pins is 50c plus a handling charge of 10c; or 25c for

the junior style.

Considerable credit is due to K. Bileski for his "Philatelic Pathways". A lot of work went into the presentation of such a wealth of interesting and valuable material. All collectors should have a copy, and in the offing, the "Red River Rambler" will be eagerly awaited.

In connection with the 100th Anniversary of the opening of the first railway span between the U.S.A. and Canada, traffic was halted for the first time in the history of the Whirlpool Rapids bridge. Drawn ou on either side were New York State Troopers and R.C.M.P. officers, while a ribbon, brought from either shore by "Uncle Sam and Jack Canuck" dressed in authentic costumes, was tied Premier Drew of Ontario and Gov. Handley, of New York, to cement the International Goodwill and Friendship. A plaque was unveiled to commemorate the anniversary. Earlier Joseph Lawlor, 3rd Asst-Postmaster-General sold the first of the new 3c U.S.A. stamps commemorating "A Century of Friendship". picturing this bridge.

The "Weekly Stamp Collecting" states that despite the opposition of the habitual grumblers, a set of Commemorative Stamps for use in the British Commonwealth of Nations commemorating the 75th Anniversary of the Universal Postal Union is now in an advanced state of preparation.
