Mr. L. J. Mills, Director of Financial Services of the Canadian Post Office informs us that: "The Post Office Department cannot make any statement regarding a Newfoundland commemorative postage stamp issue until such time as the necessary legislative action required to effect this union has been taken by both countries concerned. The Post Office Department hopes to release information concerning the union at the earliest possible date after the legislative authority for such a union is given". When this is available the C.P.S. will advise its members accordingly.

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The ANZAC Royal Tour was never cancelled, only postponed, we learn. The King hopes to revive soon plans for a Royal Tour of Australia and New Zealand.

TEN DECADES AGO: 1840-50

A STUDY OF THE WORK OF RADWON, WRIGHT, HATCH AND EDSON OF NEW YORK CITY

This is the title of the latest Handbook of the American Philatelic Society. The Author is Winthrop S. Boggs. In writing his last two books on Canada he turned up a lot of other information relative to the printing firm of Rawdon, Wright, Hatch and Edson which relates the early printing of stamps to both Canada and the United States. In this new publication he gives us an insight into the firm responsible not only for the first issues of stamps from both countries but into the manufacture of the then current Bank Notes, and the methods used in their production.

The printing of stamps was only incidental to the printing of Paper Money. In fact the firm was not at all sorry to part with the contract when it ended. The charge made for printing 51,000 of the 12 penny black was only \$10.00. Compare this with printing charges to-day or the value of these same stamps to collectors to-day if you like.

Mr. Boggs gives us some fine illustration of early Bank Notes including one of the Bank of Toronto. The most interesting fact stands out that the portraits of Washington and of Franklin were used as early as 1832 and 1836 on Bank Notes before they appeared on the First Issue of 1847 Stamps.

The correspondence on all orders for our first issue of stamps is quoted in full. This clearly shows the number of plates, quantity printed and the cost of producing the same.

Part III is a most enlightening article reprinted from Harpers New Monthly Magazine for February 1862, entitled "Making Money — The American Bank Note Company". In this you can relive a personal visit through this plant in the company of the President of the firm. Much is revealed of the details entailed to make forgery more difficult. Finally an account of the New York City Post Office is given in part IV.

Well illustrated throughout and printed on the finest quality paper this book will appeal to all Canadian Collectors. The book may be obtained for \$2.00 from the Executive Secretary of the A.P.S., H. Clay Musser, Box 800, State College, Pa.

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The A.P.S. will soon re-issue in book form, that fine series of articles by George Marler on the Canadian Georgians which ran in the American Philatelist. We look forward to this appearing.

The "Forest Green Book" of the Stamp Specialist, H. L. Lindquist, New York, contains a 29 page, illustrated article by G. A. E. Chapman on the 1859 Beaver. This should interest all those interested in the varieties of this stamp.

In a series of articles in the American Philatelist entitled The Underworld of Stamps, W. J. Eckhardt illustrates a forgery of the 5c Nova Scotia (Scotts No. 10). The original, perf 12 is finely engraved, with tall, well formed lettering, and the lines of the face formed by fine dots. The forgery, perf 12½, is coarsely engraved, the ink standing out exaggeratedly from the paper. The letters are smaller, and not as well formed; while the coarse dots of the facial lines make the Queen look freckled.

HOW CANADA GOT ITS FIRST POSTAGE STAMP

A little publication has appeared within the past few weeks that for the first time sets out the story of how Canada got its first Postage stamps. It is one of a series of Twenty Tales of Canada; by Lyman B. Jackes, of Toronto, Canada. Mr. Jackes has been interested in Canadian history for several years and has had some recognition as a writer. His articles and stories have appeared in the Saturday Evening Post and other leading journals and his photographs have been given wide circulation by the National Geographic Magazine and scores of other illustrated papers in Canada, the United States and Great Britain. For some twelve years he was engaged in historical research for the Ontario Government.

The little story of the Genesis of our postage stamps is number one in the series of twenty stories and will be the only one that directly deals with stamps. From documents never before published it tells, for the first time, how the late Sir Sandford Fleming was called upon to undertake this task. There is a romance and a story behind the first Canadian postage stamps which cannot be claimed by other stamp producing countries. The booklet is well illustrated and on a good grade of coated paper. It is not a scientific treatise on all the fine, controversial points of stamp collecting. It is a story that every Canadian philatelist should know. Its racy style of composition makes it ideal material to read or tell to children. For the adult, who has access to a collection of early Canadian stamps, it will add interest and zest in their re-examination.

A copy autographed by the writer, Mr. Lyman B. Jackes, will be mailed to anyone sending in a new application for membership in the C.P.S. prior to April 1st.

Trinidad and Tobago have issued a set of seven pictorials to commemorate the Centenary of the colony.

A Newfoundland 60 cent black stamp overprinted in red "air mail. De Pinedo, 1927" was sold in London, Eng., in January for eight hundred pounds (\$3,200.00).

Canada Easter Seals 1949

Easter Seals in support of the crippled children are now in their third year of issue, and have received the same splendid response as those issued in the United States where they are now in their sixteenth year.

Many collectors have already procured the 1947 and 48 issues of this Canadian Seal which may conceivably become the forerunner to a national seal in Canada.

For the benefit of those collectors who have not already procured the previous issues, there is limited reserve stock of these seals available.

They may be had in sheets of 100, perforated or unperforated, also progressive color proofs.

An advance offering is being made to collectors at \$1.00 per sheet perforated or unperforated with a premium of one imperf block with one sheet, and a set of four imperf blocks of progressive color proofs with two sheets. One set with each additional sheet.

THE OTTAWA REPORT

Evening Citizen Stamp Editor

Gentlemen of the Canadian Philatelic Society, please meet J. R. Carpenter, the newly-appointed superintendent of the Postage Stamp Division, Financial Branch, Post Office Department, Ottawa.

Mr. Carpenter is the successor to the late A. Stanley Deaville in the office that is properly known as the philatelic bureau of the Canada Post Office. At the time of my last report to the C.P.S. Bulletin I was able to give everything but the name of Mr. Carpenter in connection with the appointment because I was bound to secrecy as to his identity.

The new official is not a philatelist, according to his own admission, but he has told me that he is anxious to learn something about the great hobby and to meet representative people in Canadian philately. I immediately extended, as a director of the society, an invitation to attend the C.P.S. convention in Westmount, Montreal, on April 21-23, under the auspices of the Westmount Stamp Club.

After conversing with Mr. Carpenter and sizing him up) I feel that the Society can list him as one of the special attractions for the convention program. Although, frankly, we cannot expect him to give a learned discourse on the subject of philately, the meeting will provide the opportunity to meet him, to make him feel at home . . . and to put him on the right track.

Mr. Carpenter sparkles with administrative efficiency, has had government experience with the Civil Service Commission and served with distinction in the Royal Canadian Navy during the last war for which he was awarded the decoration of Member of the British Empire (M.B.E.). I think the Society will find him co-operative and when we sell him the idea of becoming a collector Brother Phil McCabe should sell him a C.P.S. membership.

In the meantime the P.O. Department has been anxiously watching Parliament Hill for the final word on the absorption of Newfoundland into Canadian Confederation as the 10th Province before setting the machinery in operation for the commemorative stamp for the union tentatively fixed for April 1 or thereabout. The stamp, already designed, cannot be printed until Parliament places its stamp of approval on the

agreement with the ancient colony which was discovered by John Cabot in 1497. This gives thought to two dates, 1497 and 1949, which might provide the theme for the coming postal issue.

The next Canadian commemorative will be the issue for the 200th anniversary of the founding of Halifax to be observed next June. But an eye should be kept peeled for a new regular set of values from one cent up to replace the issue of 1942-43. The only thing that can delay the printing much longer, I believe is the complication of a general election which can explode any time from early spring to October.

Stamps that have recently disappeared from the postal department list are the two one-centers, King George V of 1935 and King George VI of 1937 (217 and 231), the Special Delivery 10c Green of 1939 and the George VI coils with 8 perforations. The coil stamps have been replaced by 12 perf. types.

The Responsible Government 4-cent commemorative, issued Oct. 1, 1948, continue to drag on and nobody seems to care much. I hear there isn't much demand for the 16c and 17c special delivery airmails although this type of stamp is disappearing from the regular post offices. There is no raising of eyebrows, either, when the last two eight-cent stamps are mentioned although this denomination is being dropped.

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The United States have already announced the following for this year: March 3rd, Minnesota Territory 3c Commemorative from St. Paul, Minn. April 12th, a 3c stamp commemorating Washington and Lee University's 200th Anniversary. First Day at Lexington, Va. Also, a 3c stamp commemorating the taking of office of the first elected Governor of the Territory of Puerto Rico. We haven't heard where he took it.

Collector's Surplus reports that an American Congressman has proposed a bill to issue a stamp for the "Angora Goat Centennial in America". They warn that in five months this sponsor will be back for another for the birth of America's first Angora Kid!

Delegates from Northern Rhodesia, Southern Rhodesia, and Nyasaland have just adopted a resolution favoring a merger into a new Central African Federation. Their hope is an ultimate Dominion larger than the Union of South Africa.
