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## ANNUAL REPORTS

### MADE AT ANNUAL MEETING

Bert L. Baulch, as president of the C.P.S. during the past year, handed on these worthy observations. "Recognizing the many advantages of stamp collecting to the youth of our country, we must encourage them and hold their interest, we must make it a safe game for them. We must assist in maintenance of safeguards for the advanced collector. We should patronize the conscientious dealer and help to make his business profitable and honorable. Representations to Ottawa which concern all members, should clear through the Society's Executive. The activities of the Society should have greater publicity and it should be the concern of all members to see that articles of general interest are made available for publication."

The membership report indicated 278 new members received against 96 dropped for various reasons. The net increase of 182 brings the total to 1359 as of April 22nd. Mr. McCabe recommended as special committee to co-operate with the local affiliated clubs, to provide interesting programs, speakers, an interchange of local club programs, to encourage local stamp exhibitions and provide suitable recognition by certificates of philatelic awards. He also encouraged members to develop mutual stamp exchanges through the medium of the Official Organ of the Society.

The Financial report showed a balance a year ago of \$102.86. Receipts during the past year amounted to \$3518.00 of which \$2296.40 were from membership fees. Among the expenditures was \$894.90 for Popular Stamps, and \$352.94 as the cost of the Bulletin. Total expenses for the year were \$3270.47, with a balance on hand of \$350.39. The only accrued expense is \$170, for the last two months Popular Stamps which has not yet been billed. Thus the Society is in a better position than at this time last year.

Ken Haigh reported that the Sales Department had circulated 590 books with a sales of \$1996.02, 189 books have been retired and members have received \$1230.49, while after deducting of insurance and commissions there was a balance of \$502.31 on hand towards books still in circulation.

J. T. Scott reported mailing 150 books and about 200 items from the Library Files. The slides and films of the C.P.S. were also much in demand. Expenditures for the Library totaled \$37.76. Many donations of books, and periodicals have increased the Library in the past year.

Junior Activities have this year seen assistance being arranged with Officers of the R.C.M.P. in assisting with the planning and promotion of stamp clubs in the boys' training schools across Canada. We expect to tell more of this story in the July Bulletin.

It is proposed that the Year Book this year shall be issued about September and include a full Membership Directory, Constitution, Library List, Sales Circuit Rules, etc.,

## THE OTTAWA REPORT

Officials of the Post Office Department and club delegates of the Canadian Capital were greatly impressed with the annual CPS convention in Montreal and were loud in their praise for the excellent manner in which the arrangements were carried out by the sponsoring organization, the Westmount Stamp Club, and the National Society itself.

I can tell the members at large that, thanks to the efficacy of the annual meeting, the Philatelic Section of the Canada P.O. and the Canadian Philatelic Society were never more closely associated in their common cause than they are at this moment. Proclaimed as the finest stamp convention and exhibition ever held in Canada, the Montreal meeting has inspired a spirit of co-operation between the government department and sincere collectors that augurs well for the future.

J. R. Carpenter, the new superintendent of the P.O. Philatelic Section, took full advantage of the opportunity to mingle with CPS members at the Montreal gathering to obtain their views and to discuss their problems. I will repeat what I said in a previous Ottawa news letter to the CPS Bulletin that Mr. Carpenter gives promise of being a capable administrator of the philatelic bureau and collectors, as a whole, will be pleased with his management of affairs.

Philatelists have been most pleased with Canada's Newfoundland commemorative of April 1 because of its beauty of design and appropriate theme. Some purchasers of first-day covers, serviced at St. John's, Nfld., did complain about a delay in forwarding cancelled envelopes from that point but it should be borne in mind that the Canada P.O. had no jurisdiction in Newfoundland until one minute past midnight on the date of stamp issue.

I have reason to predict that Canada's next commemorative for the Halifax bicentenary in June will at least maintain the high standard of excellence in design which was achieved in the Newfoundland stamp. The Halifax issue will strike a new note in pictorial attractiveness among Canadian stamps. In a word, it may become one of the world's most popular stamps.

The cat is out of the bag in connection with Canada's new regular postal issues from the 1c to 5c denominations. The new King's stamps, five in all, would have appeared some weeks ago—except for the general elections.

There have been many enquiries about the supply of Newfoundland's mint surplus, 18 items of which are available at the Ottawa Philatelic Bureau. I do not think I am breaking any confidence when I say there are plenty of the Newfoundland remainders.

The Canada P.O. received quantities of the Newfoundland mint stamps prior to the admission of the island colony so that they could go on sale in Ottawa on April 1. But it can be taken for granted that a fairly large stock of these stamps are to be turned over to the Dominion by the Province of Newfoundland after that date under the terms of union. Therefore, the Newfoundland stock at Ottawa may last for some time.

It is understood that the Canadian postal authorities are reviewing the proposal of last year for the removal of stamps from the philatelic list two years after they become "obsolete." I think the collectors should be agreeable to a longer limit of philatelic sale, say for a five-year period unless an item is previously sold out.

Five years should be plenty of time for new collectors, including juniors, to catch up on a Canadian mint stamp at face value—which is the point that is bothering the P.O. officials. But I will say that "badly-centered" mint stamps of a decade ago or more will not do anybody any good in the long run. Perhaps the department will see that the "oldies" are put where they belong—on the upper right corner of envelopes if nothing else.

Along this line, philatelists will be glad to learn that one of the off-center has-beens has disappeared from the P.O. philatelic list here. This is the five-cent blue (No. 170) of the 1935 George V series. That makes one less stamp for some of the boys to worry about.

For a closing paragraph I would like to express personal appreciation to the members who placed an "X" opposite my name on the CPS ballot. To the known and unknown friends I say a sincere "thank you."

#### HALIFAX BICENTARY ISSUE

On the 21st June a special 4-cent commemorative postage stamp will be issued to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the founding of Halifax. The postage stamp will bear a scene based on a painting by C. W. Jefferys, R.C.A., LL.D., entitled "The Founding of Halifax, 1749" and portrays men assembling original structures on the present site of the city. The construction force and military personnel depicted represent the original force brought from England by the Hon. Edward Cornwallis who was commissioned to erect a town on this site and landed at the location on the 21st June, 1749. This stamp will be purple, 1 1/2" x 1" in size and will be purple.

#### OFFICIAL C.P.S. FIRST DAY COVERS

The C.P.S. is pleased to adopt the Cachet designed by the Nova Scotia Stamp Club which is the only Official Cover approved by the Halifax Bicentenary Committee. The design incorporates the Halifax City Coat of Arms and will be printed in four colors on white, linen, bond envelopes. These will be available to those who service their own covers, at \$5.00 per hundred in lots of a 100 or more. The price for a Single Stamp on Cover will be 15c; for a pair on cover, 20c; covers with blocks of four will be 30c; or a Plate Block of four for 75c. Orders must be sent before June 15th. to W. E. #### BIRTHDAY ISSUE

In order that those desiring First Day Covers of the new low values bearing the King's Portraits, a special cover will be available to members. The design will include the Crest of the Canadian Philatelic Society and will be printed in black alone. The standard size envelopes only will be used which allows space to arrange the 5 values. Envelopes will be supplied at 20 for 50c.

First Day Covers mailed from Ottawa will cost 25c each for the five values on a single cover. A set of five covers with blocks of four will

be sent for \$1.00. All orders to be sent to the Editor of the Bulletin not later than May 30th.

#### EXHIBITION PRIZE WINNERS

The Brisley Trophy for the Best Exhibit in the show was awarded to Mr. E. A. Hamard for his display of the "Evolution of the Postal Services of France before January, 1849, and a Study of the First Issue." Mr. Hamard also received the Westmount Grand Award of the Canadian Bank of Commerce Silver Rose Bowl for the same exhibit.

The Canadian Bank of Commerce Silver Tray for the 2nd Best Display went to Mr. C. Mangold for his Stamps of Switzerland with plating studies of the 1850-51 Issues.

The most votes of the visitors to the Exhibition went to select Mr. S. R. Groves' U.S. Commemoratives as the winner of the Canadian Stamp Dealers' Association Trophy. His enlarged map of the U.S. had a related stamp mounted upon each state of the union.

The Lieut.-Governor's Silver Medal, a Westmount Award for the Best Exhibit by a lady collector was won by Mrs. Alice Duff with her Newfoundland entry.

mount Exhibition in Victoria Hall. The official opening took place on Thursday evening, April 21st., with many important guests. Postmaster General Ernest Bertrand, K.C., M.P., extended greetings to the Canadian Philatelic Society, The Canadian Stamp Dealer's Association, and the Westmount Stamp Club. He stated that the evidenced increase in philately throughout this country is phenomenal; while known as the pastime of Kings, stamp collecting has created a bond of international amity and good will. Mayor J. S. Cameron, of the City of Westmount, spoke of the 14 years the Westmount Club has served that community as ambassadors of good will. The work they are doing for over a hundred Juniors every week can be a forceful influence in the upbuilding of a better young Canada. John W. Yaxley, President of the Westmount Stamp Club welcomed not only the Collectors but the Dealers who were also in convention at the same time.

### ELECTIONS AT ANNUAL MEETING

Following reports of the Officers for the past year the results of the elections of Directors was announced. Five new names appear on the incoming Board. Each of these come from different provinces, seven provinces in all being represented. First of all, our new President is the first in many years from outside Ontario. John W. Yaxley was acclaimed by the delegates as the man to guide the destinies of this society for another year. Another delegate elected was Lorne W. Bentham of the R.A. (Recreation Assn. of the Civil Service) Club of Ottawa. Lorne writes in several papers as well as being a philatelic commentator on the radio from Ottawa. Harold E. Canham, of Regina, was well introduced in the letter of the Regina Philatelic Society. We are glad to see he is now on the Board of Directors.

In British Columbia Mr. George Stripp who has been filling in, in the absence of Capt. Binks, was elected this year. He is the donor of the Stripp Trophy, illustrated in the December Bulletin. Our other new member of the Executive is M.A. Wilson, Vice-President of the Nova Scotia Stamp Club at Halifax, who has been elected 3rd Vice-President of the C.P.S. for the coming season.

First and second Vice-Presidents will be Fred Moutrie, of Toronto,

and Norman Clark of Windsor. The remaining members of the Directorate are Bert L. Baulch, Brantford, Wm. Gladish, Ottawa, P. J. McCabe, Mimico, Capt. W. H. Talbot, Winnipeg, and W. A. Teare, Edmonton. Sales Manager, Ken Haigh and Librarian J. T. Scott were re-appointed by the new directors. Other committee heads will be named later.

### ROBSON LOWE AT BANQUET

The culminating banquet on Saturday night was attended by around two hundred guests who heard Robson Lowe's friendly talk. First of all, Mr. Lowe stated he "enjoys reading our Bulletin from beginning to end as he considers it the best piece of Philatelic Literature in North America." He thought that most exhibitions included too much B.N.A. and needed other countries for balance, but they were generally very well organized over here. A good exhibit he said "should be laid out at home in a balanced display, not left to be put up in any order at the show." Mr. Lowe said that in 1951 the British Postal History Society will be meeting at CAPEX, which is to be honoured by a portion of His Majesty's B.N.A. Collection.

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### NEW ISSUES

versary of the birth of His Majesty, King George VI, 6th June, the 1-cent to 5-cent denominations, inclusive, of postage stamps which bear his portrait and which have been current throughout Canada since 1942, will be replaced by new postage stamps issues bearing reproductions of more recent portraits by Dorothy Wilding Portraits Limited, London. The new issues will be of the same size and colours as are now in use.

It is planned to have the new stamps placed on sale at the principal Canadian Post Offices on the dates indicated. First Day Covers for philatelists for the new issue King George VI stamps will be handled only by the Postmaster at Ottawa, Ontario, on the 6th June, and for the new Halifax commemorative stamp by the Postmaster at Halifax, Nova Scotia, on the 21st June.

The Department has found that the cost of handling First Day Covers exceeds considerably the revenue obtained from the sale of postage affixed to these covers and for this reason collectors will be required to pay a service charge of 5-cents for each cover to be returned by ordin-
