

Owing to the continual illness of the Publisher of the "Collector" and the non-appearance of the Magazine, the Directors of the Society have decided to make other arrangements for the members to receive a magazine. Negotiations are now under way and we trust to be able to make a definite announcement by the time the next bulletin is issued. We are sorry to have put the members to so much trouble in this regard, but we have been as much at sea as anyone, owing to the lack of definite word from the Publisher.

The Society has received a copy of a resolution from the "Winnipeg Philatelic Society" which asks for the issuing of a stamp, preferably of low denomination, to commemorate the founding of Upper Fort Garry in Manitoba. The Directors are heartily in favour and have endorsed this resolution.

The Canadian Jubilee issue will be on sale on May 4th at 23 principal Post Offices and not May 6th as expected, thus avoiding the difficulty connected with the Cartier and Loyalist day of issue on a public holiday. Denominations are 1, 2, 3, 5, 10 and 13 cents. A request to include Jubilee, N.S. as a place of issue has been received and passed on to Ottawa. If interested, write the P.O. Dept. and add weight to the suggestion.

The British American Bank Note Co. Ltd. supplied the above items, while the Canadian Bank Note Co. supplied 1,300,000 - 1¢; 1,000,000-2¢ and 900,000-5¢ postal note stamps.

About one third of the figures of the one to eight cent stamps would cover the 1932 "Medallion" issue, the balance being the 1930 type. The 13¢ Conference represents almost a years normal consumption of this value. Comparatively, the 5¢ will do better but the air mail is a genuine "sleeper". The 10¢ postage due (Scott 235) is another.

The date of the Annual Meeting is the 27th of April, also the date of the Stamp Exhibition of the Toronto Stamp Collectors Club which will be held in the Reference Library at College and St. George Sts. in Toronto. All the members of the C.P.S. are urged to be present at the Annual Meeting and to attend the Stamp Exhibition later.
