Official Bulletin No. 3. May 1935.

The Annual Meeting of the Society was held in Room 7 of the Royal York Hotel in Toronto on the 27th of April. Dr. Ball opened the meeting with a brief outline of the work and activities of the past year and especially commended the several Officers of the Society for their untiring efforts during the past year. Then followed the reading of the minutes of the last Annual Meeting. The reports of the Treasurer, Corresponding Secretary, Sales Manager, Exchange Manager and Auditor followed and showed the affairs of the Society to be in very good order. The reports of the Kingston Stamp Club, Nova Scotia Philatelic Society, British Columbia Philatelic Society and the Toronto Stamp Collectors Club were read, indicating a healthy state of Philately across Canada.

The main business to be transacted was regarding a magazine. Three English publications were discussed and the respective merits of each carefully considered. It was finally decided that the Philatelic Journal of Great Britain, the oldest Philatelic Magazine in the Empire, would be the most acceptable. It is expected that the subscription will start with the June issue. It is also the intention of the Directors to have the Magazine supplemented by the Bulletin which will contain timely information of Canada especially.
