FIRST DETAILS OF THE ANNUAL CONVENTION

Plans are now well under way for the next Annuel Meeting and Convention of the Canadian Philatelic Society which will be held in the Public Library, London, Ontario, next April 17th, 18th and 19th, with the London Philatelic Society serving as hosts.

Early in January several members of the C.P.S. Board of Directors, went to London, and conferred with members of the London Committee, headed by Dr. . . Holmes. At this meeting many important matters were ironed out, and your Directors were delighted with the progress and initiative displayed already by the London Committee. Since many of the Committee have no previous experience with the staging of our previous Conventions, some time was spent in review of the experiences of the Windsor and Montreel Conventions for the benefit of the men who will have to take the responsibility this time. At the meeting plans for the Exhibition and the Auction were discussed, and the official announcement of the Committee on these plans is contained in this News Letter. Read them cerefully and act on them promptly. The success of these two features is important to the success of the whole Convention.

Other features of the Convention are now under consideration in London, and details will no doubt appear in next month's News Letter. Such annual events as the Bourse, the Business Sessions of the Convention, and of course the Annual Banquet, will all be worth watching for. Other tentative suggestions, if it is possible to arrange them, will make our Annual Convention an event of major proportions in philatelic circles, but since they are in the formative stage, it is not yet possible to announce them.

"Scratch types" continue to draw many letters. As there are so many of these scratches through "Canadian Bank Note" it would seem that cracks developed in the plates at the imprint location which became heavy jagged lines before they were removed from the press. Examples in possession of Donald B. Thompson run from mere scratches to very heavy jagged lines.

Some time ago, at the Windsor Convention, Director Fred Green heard of a group of collectors in Stratford, who were not organized into a club and decided he should send them some momento of our Society. Learning the name of one interested collector, he forwarded to him a souvenir of the Convention with a first-day cover and information about our Society.

That collector, Mr. Eric Rushton, became a C.F.S. member, and shortly, 15 other collectors met to organize a club - and the Stratford Philatelic Society was an accomplished fact. It is now quite successful and most enthusiastic, and has its quota of CPS members.

More recently he heard of a number of Juniors 8-13 years old in the same area who wanted to join a Stamp Club and again he called on Eric, resulting in a Junior Club with 24 members, meeting on Saturday mornings at Mr. Rushton's home, with an average attendance of 18. They have a well organized group where members are encouraged to talk about their stamps, how best to mount them, etc.

THE C.P.S. DONATION AUCTION

Lest month in the News Letter, we inaugurated a series of small auctions of material donated to the C.P.S. for the purpose of aiding Society finance, Ten lots were put up for auction in the first list, and mail bids were invited from members.

It was not our thought that these lots would be high value sets, or sets out of the reach of the average collector - rather moderate priced items, of a desirable type that would draw bids from the medium collectors rather than the far-advanced ones. In this wey it provides an auction of more general interest, in which most of us can enter. And that was the result obtained, for we received many bids -- not a single lot was neglected -- and the total of the best bid on each lot totalled a little over half catalog. As a result over \$30.00 net was realized for the C.P.S. Treasury. This and subsequent auctions - not necessarily each monthwill help us to maintain the services we have promised to members, despite a seasonal lack of funds.

Meterial for last month's auction were all the donations of the Treasurer and your News Letter Editor. The 2nd Donation Auction, which reaches you in this issue, is material donated to us by The President, The Secretary, and by R. M. Watson, of Montreal. The thanks of the Society to each of them.

Successful bidders have been notified. In one case three equal bids were received for one lot, end in this case we had a person outside our Society drew for the winning bidder. All could not win - but thanks to all who sent in bids - we hope the unsuccessful bidders will try again.

"MENS LETTER" TO CARRY ADVERTISING

Requests have been received from members who wish to run small display or classified advertisements in the "Canadian Philatelist". After consultation on the subject, the Board of Directors, together with the editors of the "Philatelist" and "News-Letter" have decided that small advertisements are not economically practical in the "Canadian Philatelist" but such a service could be given members through the "News-Letter". Also, the "Canadian Philatelist" being a quarterly publication it is not possible to give small advertisers the continuity desired.

It has been decided, therefore, that commencing with the next issue - February - the News-Letter will be enlarged to eight pages instead of four, and space allowed therein for advertising of both classified and display types, as follows:

1. - CLASSIFIED ADVERTISEMENTS - which will appear under a column headed - "MINI-ADS", will be in the same type style as the general columns of the "News-Letter", and will not be displayed, except for the use of Capital Letters in headings or key words. Use them to - offer stamps for sale - seek those you want to buy - seek correspondence or exchanges with other members - or any other way you wish.

THE COST - 25 words or less - \$1.00
Over 25 words - .05 per word extra.

2. - DISPLAY ADVERTISEMENTS - for sale in units of 1 column by one inch depth - or multiples thereof. Advertisements in this section will be typeset, with display headings where required. For illustrations, we require only a printed copy for photographing - no need to send electros. Please note that when the "News Letter" is photographed for reproduction, copy is reduced in size by 1/3. The 1" rate is for the actual printed size appearing in the "News Letter".

THE COST - \$3.00 per column inch.

Minimum circulation of the "News Letter" - 1300 copies monthly. Issued once monthly - closing date for advertising - 15th day of each month. Publication mailing date - 25th of month.

Because most advertisements will be small and the cost low, all advertising copy should be accompanied by remittance, it being impractical to collect small amounts afterwards.
