CHRONICLE OF NEW ISSUES.

AFGHANISTAN.—Stanley Gibbou's Monthly Journal mentions three new varieties of the current type as follows:—I Abassi, blue-green on pale rose paper; 2 Abassi, black on white laid batonne; I Rupee, purple on pale-green wove batonne. Will the endless procession of varieties from this place ever cease? To all appearances, No! The worst about the stamps of Afghanistan is that a very large number of them are unobtainable rareties.

BRAZIL.—We see by the *Dominion Philatelist* that the 10 reis Journal Stamp of the latest type is now printed on white paper instead of buff, as was heretofore used:—10 reis, blue on white.

Br. NORTH BORNEO.—Owing to a change in the postal rates the ten cont blue current type have been surcharged? 6 cents" in largetype—adhesive "6 cents" in black on to cents blue.

BR. CENTRAL AFRICA.—A correspondent of the Stamp News states that the whole series of the Br. South African Company (the ½d excepted), have been surcharged "B. C. A." (Br. Central Africa) for use in all countries north of the Zambesi. The values are as follows:—1d black; 2d, green and yellow; 4d, brown and black; 61, pale-blue; 8d, rose and black; 1s., brown; 2s., scarlet; 2s. 6d, lilac; 5sh., yellow; 1osh, green; £1, blue; £2, rose; £5, olive-green; £10, brown.

CUBA.—The 5 cent and to cent have been changed in color. They are now found in 5 cent de peso, green and 10 cent de peso, carmine.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC.—The Stamp News chronicles 3 new values from this place:—50 centavos, violet; I peso, carmine; 2 pesos, red-brown,

JAMAICA.—Mr. H. F. Mooers, of Kingston, Ont., writes informing us of a new discovery he has made, viz:—a 3d, purple revenue used postally and unperforated.

JEYHORE.—Stamps for this place have been issued as follows:—The regular issue of India bearing a new style of surcharge, it is "RAJ'—SERVICE," in small black capitals printed in blue-green.

NEGRI-SEMBILAN.—This State, like many other States of the Straits Settlements, has felt the want of surcharges and have issued the 2 cent Straits Settlements stamp, surcharged "Negri-Sembilan" in black in two lines.

Russia —The current I Kopee, blue, is said to be found imperforate.

UNITED STATES.—Although it is already in use, we have not seen the new post card. The Postage Due Stamps are now printed in a rich claret.

The following have been received with thanks: Revue Philatelic, The Stamp World, The Brooklyn Philatelist, Dominion Philatelist, The Postage Stamp, The Philatelic Journal of America, American Journal of Philatelic Fraud Reporter; Philatelic Record; Curio; Philatelic Fraud Reporter; Philatelic Era, One Dime, American Youth, Quaker City Philatelist, Eastern Philatelist, Missouri Philatelist, Southern Philatelist, Mekeel's Weekly Stamp News. As will be seen by the above list, our exchanges have showed up better during the past month than ever before. We are sorry to see that the publishers of The Philatelic Journal of Great Britain, The Stamp Collectors' Magazine, The Philatelic World, The Stamp Collectors' Companion, and others have not favored us with copies of their publications.

We are also in receipt of the December number of *The Numismatist* published by Dr. Geo. F. Heath, of Monroe, Mich. It is entirely devoted to coin collecting, and contains some very interesting matter in regard to coins, which can be only appreciated by those who collect coins. It is the only collectors' paper we know of that comes out one month ahead of time.

At last the long-suffering and patient philatelic public have been relieved with a sight of the *Dominion Philatelist* with the *pill advertisements* left out. A good step, Bro. Ketcheson.

In our last number we mentioned that Mr. F. Harding, of Kamloops, intended to publish *The Canadian Stamp News*. Mr. Harding writes informing us that he has given up the publication of the same, for the present.

We have received *The Fraud List* published by Mr. A. B. Merrill, of Everett, Mass. The names are arranged in alphabetical order and the book is neatly and artistically printed on fine book paper and well-bound. A valuable feature of the work is: blank pages for addition are interleaved throughout the book. It is a valuable work and should be in the hands of every dealer, publisher and collector. The price is nominal, 25 cents, send to the publisher for a copy. It is invaluable to you!

The Missouri Philatelist, published by The Comrath Stamp and Publishing Co., has been received. It consists of 16 pages and cover, 10 pages of which are filled with reading matter. For a new paper the contents are on the whole very good. A good feature is an engraved cover. We extend to the publisher our best wishes for its success.

It is reported that Canada is to have a new stamp paper, to be called the *Philatelic Herald* and to appear from Quebec. It is to be devoted wholly to advertisements.

NEW BRUNSWICK POSTAGE.

The next of the provinces whose postage stamps will occupy our attention, is New Brunswick. This province issued its first postage stamps in the year 1851, and continued to issue them until 1863, a period of

about thirteen years.

Issue, 1851.—In this year there were three issued valued at 3 pence, 6 pence and 1 shilling. The design was that of a crown in the central part of the stamp, with a rose at the upper and lower parts of the stamp, a shamrock on the left hand side and a thistle on the right. On the two upper sides were the words "New Brunswick," on the two lower sides "Postage," and the value in words. These stamps were all lozengeshaped. The postmasters used often to run short of 3d stamps and to remedy their wants they cut the sixpennies diagonally in two and used the halfs for 3 pence. For colors see reference list.

Issue, 1860.—In this year the necessity for a new issue was occasioned, by a change of the currency from £. s. d. to \$ and cents. The designs of this issue were novel and The set were all alike in one particular-having the words "New Brunswick Postage" and the value in words in an oval: In this oval the various designs were enclosed. The design of the one cent was a train of cars; the five cent, head of Queen Victoria; the ten cent, same as five cent; the twelve and a half cent, a steamship; the seventeen cent, head of the Prince of Wales. For colors

Issue, 1861.—In this year the rarest of New Brunswick stamps was issued. This was the celebrated "Connell" stamp, named

after its designer. This stamp was in use but one day, when it was withdrawn from use, because it bore Mr. Connell's portrait. Proofs of this stamp are plentiful and can be bought for from \$3 to \$5. The original is one of the rarest of stamps.

Issue, 1863.—Two cent orange. Similar design to 1860 issue. Head of Queen Victoria.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Next in order come the stamps of Nova-Scotia. This province began to issue stamps in the same year as New Brunswick, viz:

Issue, 1851.—Three values were issued during this year, 3 pence, blue; 6 pence, green; 1 shilling, violet. The stamps were lozenge-shaped, a crown occupied the centre, above the crown a rose, below it a may-flower, at the right hand side a thistle and on the left a shamrock, on the two upper sides the words "Nova Scotia," on the two lower sides "Postage" and the value in words. In each corner was the value in figures.

Issue, 1853.—In this year the one penny stamp was issued. Design:-Head of Queen Victoria in a lozenge-shaped frame, "Nova" above, "Scotia" below, "Postage" on the right and the value in words on the left and the

value in figures in each corner.

ADDRESS.

To the Members of the Philatelic Society of Canada:

Gentlemen,—It is with extreme pleasure and a great deal of satisfaction that I again address you. The advent of our society has startled the philatelic world. Our rapid growth has astounded other societies, who, hereafter, must be content to follow in our wake. The success of our undertaking has been doubly assured by the adhesion of all the prominent stamp collectors in British North America.

With "Nulli Secundus" as our motto, we are certain to achieve grand results in the future. Let every member during the coming month send in all the names he possibly can for membership. We must have at least 300 before December 31st, and I sincerely trust that those collectors who have not as vet endeavored to increase our roll will do so at once. In our ranks are several reliable dealers, some of them the first and foremost in North America. I would suggest to our members the importance of patronizing them; buy your stamps from them; shun outside dealers who have no record, and take those which have your interest at heart. They will be tound in our ranks

I have been enabled to establish branches in several places, as will be seen in another column, and I trust that wherever it can be done, branches will be formed.

We welcome our American friends, and trust our relations will be cordial. While liberal to all, we will not suffer one member to be hurt by another in his dealings. We have the Executive located at one place, and all complaints sent to the President will be

handed to these officers, who will mete out strict justice to all.

The answer to our calumniators is found in the noble response of our Honor Roll, making this society the Canadian National Philatelic Ass'n of British North America. The Exchange Department will at once be put in operation by one of Canada's foremost collectors, Mr. J. S. Robertson, a prominent lawyer of St. Thomas, and fair dealing, without the interference of a dealers' clique, will be shown. Mr. Robertson himself is an advanced philatelist, possessor of one of the finest collections on the continent, and a gentleman eminently fitted for the responsible position he holds.

By incorporating our society, we do away with personal liability; we secure the older collectors, and we place ourselves on a practical business footing under government regulations. Unincorporated societies cannot collect dues even from members or hold property, and they run the risk of individual members bringing suit for criminal libel if they are expelled and recovering heavy damages, not from the society, but from other individual members.

Branch societies have the benefit of our incorporation, and we shall be pleased to negotiate with any other societies in Canada which may wish to join us as a Branch. Collectors know a good thing when they see it, and our phenomenal success, by doubling our membership in four weeks, shows that a really good national society was wanting.

Branches will elect a President, who will act as Exchange Manager, also a Secretary. These two officers' names should be sent in as soon as possible, so they can be published in the December official organ.

Should mistakes occur in the roll as published, in either names or addresses, or should members not receive the official organ regularly, they will communicate with Mr. Stæbler as soon as possible, in order that he may make the necessary corrections. Members sending their annual dues of 25c. should see that such is acknowledged in the official organ for the following month. shall be happy to reply to every question sent me, and invite our younger collectors to write me on any stamp topic.

The Philatelic Exchange Club and other organizations have joined us in a body. The Editor Canadian Philatelist:

DEAR SIR,—I have been requested to allow myself to be nominated for Exchange Superintendent of the Philatelic Society of Canada. After some correspondence, and taking time to consider, I have consented to accept a nomination, but I think it only proper to state to the members the concessions I required as a sine qua non before allowing myself to be nominated. First, I insisted that the society should be incorporated. I have just had incorporated "The Elgin Historical Society,"-a society for advancing the study of the former history of this county, and have offered to carry through the incorporation of our society for nothing. I may, if elected, take first choice of one book on exchange as a return for my trouble, but no more, and I will not be grudged that I hope. Then I required to to be allowed to make the rules for the department myself, as I have found something lax in the various exchanges we have had. Shortly what I propose to insist on is a "sales" and an "exchange" department. If parties participate in the former it must be "for cash," and if they do not remit they may expect to be cancelled on all other circuits. In the exchange, they must neither expect to receive or pay cash, but exchange and take all credits that may be due them at end of any time in stamps from other exchange sheets. Again I will require an agreement in writing from each one to carry out the rules and remit. This will be to the company and can be realized on by the These agreements will official collector. require to be guaranteed by a responsible person in every case, as I will not make fish of the president and flesh of the members or vice versa. We find no one in banks or financial institutions (not even managers) but have to furnish bonds, and I am sure, as all the good members look for mutual protection, they will not object to give a guarantee, and I am certain that the only ones who will object will be those who will

object intentionally or otherwise to pay any balance due from them for stamps taken. As to first choice of sheets, the constitution provides that six members shall constitute a circuit. I shall number the agreements as they come in. No. 1 will have first choice 1st circuit, No. 7 will have first choice 2nd circuit, and so on till the numbers are exhausted; then No. 2 will have first choice of 1 a circuit, No. 8 will have first choice of 2 a circuit, and so on. Again, if members wish to protect themselves against change of their stamps, they will have to put in ink under the stamp the country denomination or other distinguishing mark of the stamp in the space, and then a change can at once be detected. This will not entail much work and provide a great safeguard. It will be difficult just now for American members to participate in the exchange, owing to the customs duty; but it there are a few members in Detroit and Windsor, or Pt. Huron and Sarnia, it may be arranged. This is a short statement of what I propose if elected, and the members can vote for me if in favor of all my proposals and against me if not. They can rest assured I shall insist on the guarantee before they participate, no matter who they may be; so if I am elected no one need complain if I refuse to send to them without. It is only fair to those who place valuable stamps with the society that they should be protected as far as possible.
