CAPEX '78 AND CANADA POST

CAPEX '78 will be the high point in Canadian philatelic activities for many years. Never before have the public or collectors in Canada been afforded an opportunity to view such a number of outstanding stamps, collections and significant Canadian philatelic material in one place at one time. Never before has Canada Post participated so fully in a major philatelic event in Canada.

Speaking of the Canada Post, their participation may mark a turning point in the relations between Canada Post and stamp collectors in Canada and around the world. We can but hope that this will be true and there are indications that such will be the case.

Recent conversations with people at Canada Post Public Affairs Branch leads me to believe that we can expect more information of direct interest to collectors of Canadian stamps to come out of Ottawa. What we shall get and how often will, of course, depend in great part upon the financial conditions of the time and upon the amount of bureaucratic entanglement that may prevail.

In any event, we should be getting more information, more frequently than we do now. Any increase must be considered as an improvement.

The Annual Meeting of the Society will be held on Saturday, June 17th at 1 p.m. in the Lecture Room at CAPEX '78.

EXUP XI

L'Union Philatélique de Montréal a émis son "timbre" afin d'attirer l'attention sur Exup XI, l'exposition provinciale qui se tiendra au vélodrome du 12 au 14 mai 1978. Environ 20,000 timbres courants à 1c. (motifs floraux) ont été surcharges comme suit: EXUP XI/12 au 14/mai/1978.

Le timbre est vendu en feuilles ou en demi-feuilles, la feuille porte en marge l'inscription "Do not use for postage, Ne pas utiliser pour l'affranchissement du courrier".

Le premier jour d'émission fut le 20 décembre 1977 et on peut s'attendre à un immense succès de curiosité, puisqu'on envisage un tirage additionnel de 10,000 exemplaires! Les intéressés doivent s'adresser à l'Union Philatélique de Montréal, C.P. 398, Station A, Montréal, P.Q., H3C 2T1.

The Union Philatélique de Montréal has issued its own "stamp" in order to draw attention to EXUP XI, the provincial exhibition which will be held at the Montreal Velodrome, May 12 - 14. Approximately 20,000 of the 1c. floral stamps have been overprinted in black with: EXUP XI/12 au 14/mai/1978.

The stamp is sold in sheets or half sheets, inscribed on the selvage "Do not use for postage, Ne pas utiliser pour l'affranchissement du courrier".

The first day of issue was December 20, 1977 and apparently was so successful as a curiosity that an additional printing of 10,000 was considered.

Those interested in the stamp should write to l'Union Philatélique de Montréal, C.P. 398, Station A, Montréal, P.Q. H3C 2T1.

In spite of the notice not to use the stamps for postage, they have been used and have been appropriately cancelled. However, they were accompanied by the correct postage in such cases.

CANADIAN POSTAL SERVICE

In this philatelically and postally important year, it is fitting that we are able to present to our members a brief sketch of "The Beginnings of Postal Service in Canada" by the late W. E. Durant Halliday, one time Clerk of the Privy Council.

This is not the first long article by Mr. Halliday that the R.P.S.C. members have had the opportunity to read. In three consecutive issues of the C.P. (vol. 15, no. 6, 1964, vol. 16, nos. 1, 2, 1965) his earlier handbook, "Notes on the Postal History of Canada" was presented in its entirety as removable insets.

We shall follow the same procedure with the present article and will publish four pages at a time, in the form of a centre spread. Our readers, if they so wish, will then be able to extract them from the issues and put them together, thus forming a complete handbook which will be compatible with the earlier handbook.

We thank R.P.S.C. Director, Colin H. Bayley for making this article available to us.

CANADA POSTAL MUSEUM TO USE NEW CANCELLATION

Postal cancellation collectors should note that the National Postal Museum will be using a different cancellation device beginning 1 May 1978 until a new device, chosen from the design competition, is put into use.

This cancellation is similar in appearance to, although smaller than, the one now being used. The date line will be laid out following the curvature of the design rather than in a straight line.

Collectors desiring first day of use covers bearing the new cancellation to be used 1 May 1978, should submit self-addressed covers bearing Canadian postage to the National Postal Museum prior to the first day of use of the new cancellation device.

You are reminded that as of 1 April 1978 first class postage for a one-ounce letter in Canada, the U.S.A. and its possessions and territories, and the islands of St.-Pierre and Miquelon will be 14 cents; the

rate to other countries (including Britain and the Commonwealth countries) will be 30 cents for one-ounce letters.

Provision may also be made for registered covers. Registration fee is \$1.25 plus first class postage.

VANCOUVER STAMP BOURSE

Regularly scheduled stamp bourses appear to be becoming popular across Canada. We have recently learned of the Vancouver Stamp Bourse which has been held since last October. It is held in the Sheraton Landmark Hotel, 1400 Robson St., Vancouver on the last Sunday of each month.

It is principally intended to offer a place where collectors can dispose of their duplicates and surplus material. There is an average of 20 dealers or seller booths at the bourses and a bulletin is prepared for each day. It lists the tableholders and their main areas of offers. Future bourses will be on 21 May, 30 July, 27 August and 24 September.

POSTAGE DUES

"With reference to the note in the Canada Post News section of The Canadian Philatelist, Mar.-Apr. issues, I question the statement that only the 5c. stamp of the 1969 issue has dextrine gum as the Canada Specialized Catalogue lists all six (6) values as being issued on plain paper with dextrine gum. A clarification on this would be appreciated as I would like to know which gum varieties actually exist in order to complete my collection of postage dues."

Ed. note. Is the Canada Specialized entirely correct or are there other gums on the 1969 postage dues? We would like to know too.

WHY USE METERS?

"I have been a R.P.S.C. member for just less than a year. I have no complaints about The Canadian Philatelist itself, as it is a great publication, full of information and interesting reading.

My beef is with its mailing — by metered mail! The R.P.S.C. promotes stamp collecting with emphasis on our own Canadian stamps. Why can't stamps, not meters, be used on the mailings of The Canadian Philatelist?

There appears to be a trend towards the hoarding of all new commemorative issues in unused condition thereby creating a bit of scarcity of used ones. It would be a good idea if the R.P.S.C. helped to reverse the trend by using postage stamps on the mailing of its publication. I for one collect both mint and used Canadian stamps and enjoy very much going through envelopes, soaking off stamps and finding well cancelled commemoratives."

Ed. note. We appreciate Mr. O'Neill's concern about the franking of The Canadian Philatelist with a postage meter impression. It does seem incongruous that a philatelic society does not use postage

stamps for its largest mailings but there are good reasons for not using postage stamps.

The main reason is the saving of time; the time it would take to apply the stamps and the time it would take the post office to cancel the stamps.

Our current mailing amounts to 5,583 copies of the Canadian Philatelist. If there were commemorative stamps of the appropriate denominations, how long would it take to put one on each envelope? But there are no 20c. commemoratives so for 4,000+ copies that require 20c. postage (pre April 1 rates), we would have to use a 12c. commemorative plus two definitives to make up the balance. Thus three stamps would be needed and more time to apply them.

What combination of commemoratives and definitives would be needed for the 1,000+ copies that require 25c. postage or the 200 that require 50c. postage?

Our situation is not unique. Any philatelic organization, dealer or publisher that has a large mailing list cannot afford the cost of the time required to buy stamps, select the appropriate values and put them on the mail. The way to get around that is to use postage meters or permit mailing. That is a situation which collectors will have to accept since there is no other solution available at present.

A MEMBER COMPLAINS TO THE PMG

"I wish to complain about the printing job done on the current issue of definitive stamps. It is not impressive. In the 50c. booklet now on sale the blue on the 12c. appears to have curdled; the denomination and the (hidden) date impinge on the border; on some stamps there appears to be a spatter of purple. The bas-relief

profiles are blurred and without definition and any comparison with the inscription blocks originally issued by the Philatelic Service is fortuitous. On the 1c. stamp the colours have slipped and do not fit into the outline. This is true, too, of the 15c. & 25c. stamps. Yet to be seen is a maple stamp where the colour fits entirely within the outline. A shoddy spectacle.

The 1978 Stamp programme, as announced in the current issue of the Canadian Philatelist, contains no mention of a stamp honouring the Silver Jubilee of the Coronation. This, it is to be hoped, is an omission on their part. About forty Commonwealth countries have already signified that they intend to recognise this, and their stamp issues will be contained in a collection; as was the case with the Accession series. Canada's contribution to that series was hardly inspiring - perhaps a message to the rest of the world that we, as a nation, do not set much store by this particular event. Whatever the reason, our performance is there to be judged whenever a complete collection of the Jubilee issues is examined."

**MONTREAL REVIEW —
COMMENTS AND INFORMATION**

"I was very pleased to see the two-part article "Montreal Review" in the last two issues of The Canadian Philatelist. It is a well-written and comprehensive introduction to the subject of the philately of the Montreal '76 Olympic Games.

A lot more information has already been published on this subject with the best material appearing in the newsbulletins of IMOS (Internationale Motivgruppen Olympiaden und Sport), a Germany-based society devoted to sport and olympic philately.

Manfred Winterheimer, president of IMOS, has just published a 200 page illustrated catalogue of the postmarks, postal stationery, cancellations and postage meter slogan cancels from the whole world for the Innsbruck '76 and Montreal '76 Games. He has previously published similar catalogues for the 1964, 1968 and

1972 Olympic Games.

Charles Mallory and I, both of Montreal, are currently engaged in putting under press an approximately 120 page book which will be basically an English translation of the Montreal section of Mr. Winterheimer's book. Its scope will be expanded to include illustrations and listings of the stamps issued by the participating nations, and mention of the stamps issued by other nations. There will also be added background information, comments on varieties, etc.

Information is still lacking, which your readers may be aware of, and which could still be incorporated (duly acknowledged) in the book. In particular, only 700 or so of the approximately 2350 postage meter numbers with Olympic slogans are known, and most of these are from Quebec and Ontario. There may be unknown '76 meter impressions from the U.S.A. and other countries. Finally, we do not know, as yet, the exact lieu/venue numbers of the five temporary post offices in Kingston."

FIRST CAPEX '78 STAMP RELEASED

On January 18th 1978, Canada Post Office released the first stamp in a planned series of issues commemorating CAPEX 78, Canada's second international philatelic exhibition.

The first sheet of the new stamp was presented to CAPEX 78 Executive Secretary, Kenneth Rowe (right) by Lloyd Francis, M.P., representing the Post-

master General, at a special ceremony in the Canadian Postal Museum in Ottawa.

The 12 cent stamp depicts a steel engraved reproduction of a pair of the 1851 12 Pence Black, one of Canada's rarest stamps. It is the first in a series which includes three other matching designs and, for the first time in Canada's philatelic history, a postally valid souvenir sheet.

SOUVENIR SHEETS FOR CAPEX 78

Among the philatelic souvenirs that will be available at CAPEX '78 is a set of specially printed limited edition souvenir sheets that have been prepared by the three security printing firms that print all of Canada's postage stamps.

The sheet produced by Ashton-Potter Ltd., of Toronto, demonstrates the various steps in the production of a postage stamp by the process of offset colour lithography. An actual issued Canadian stamp depicting the painting "April in Algonquin Park" by the famous Canadian artist Tom Thomson,

is used to show the eight stages and colours of the printing from initial colour to the completed stamp.

The Canadian Bank Note Company of Ottawa has depicted the purity of intaglio printing on a beautiful engraved sheet which combines the original engraved die design and the completed postage stamp produced from it. The subject in this case is the 20c. Express Delivery stamp of 1935.

The sheet produced by the British American Bank Note Company utilizes

both the process of intaglio engraving and lithography to demonstrate the versatility of a combination of two processes. The design chosen is that of the 1934 3c. Cartier Quadracentenary stamp and not only is an impression of the original die and the completed stamp shown, but an example of the artist's original drawing is also included on the sheet.

The sheets will only be available for purchase by visitors to the exhibition and will be restricted to one set per admission ticket. Only 10,000 sets have been prepared and each sheet is serially numbered and each set will contain sheets with matching numbers.

Due to the limited printing, mail or bulk orders cannot be accepted.

Members of the Royal Beaver Club of CAPEX 78 will receive a matched set of sheets as part of their membership privileges when they pick up their catalogues at the Exhibition.

Canadian Philatelists Celebrate The 85th Birthday Of Vincent G. Greene

On February 11th, 1978 over thirty-five members of the philatelic fraternity in Canada and the United States met in Toronto to help Vincent G. Greene celebrate his eighty-fifth birthday. Guests, for the most part, were chosen because of their association with Canadian Philately as well as philately in Canada and included representatives from major societies as well as prominent members of the trade. Of course, all these people are also close friends of "Vinnie".

Directors and Officers of the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada included Harry Sutherland, Kenneth Rowe, Dr. Henry Hicks, Andrew Hinrichs, John Ayre, Dr. Robert Chaplin, Dr. Fred Stulberg and Arthur Leggett. Also among those present were Fred Jarrett, Dean of Canadian Philately, and Leslie Davenport, senior Canadian dealer. Robert Pratt, Chairman of the Board of the British North America Philatelic Society represented that organization.

Included among the many presentations to Vinnie Greene was the first proof strike, in 22k gold of the CAPEX '78 medal. This was not only in recognition of Mr. Greene's contribution to philately but also in his capacity as General Chairman of CAPEX.

Within recent years Vincent G. Greene has endowed a Philatelic Research Foundation which bears his name. Its aim is to establish a permanent home for philately in Canada as well as to promote and stimulate the dissemination of philatelic knowledge. It also provides an expertization service for B.N.A. material which is quickly becoming accepted as one of the most authoritative in this field. The opinions of many specialists, most of whom were present at the birthday party, are solicited on a regular basis.

The R.P.S.C. extends to "Vinnie" many more years good health and active collecting.

1978 Stamp Programme

Below is the latest revised list of the 1978 stamps still to be issued as received from Canada Post on March 13th. The changes include the inclusion, on July 6 of the 'Street Scene' stamps which were announced but not issued last fall. The designs are the same but the 60c. denomination will become 80c. while the other two remain the same (50c., 75c.). The \$1 National Park stamp will be postponed until 1979.

The other changes in the list is the change of date of issue of the four Inuit stamps from Sept. 6 to Sept. 21.

We now shall have 35 stamps and 1 souvenir sheet at a total cost of \$10.21.

Capex '78 Stamps

CAPEX '78, Canada's second international philatelic exhibition, to be held in Toronto, Ontario, June 9 - 18, 1978, marks the centenary of Canada's entry into the Universal Postal Union.

To commemorate this event, Canada Post will issue on 10 June three special stamps and one souvenir sheet, Canada's first, which incorporates the three special stamps. A fourth stamp of the CAPEX '78

series was issued on 18 January.

Canada Post has also developed nine special pictorial cancellations to correspond with the nine theme days at CAPEX '78.

Adhesive postage stamps came into existence in May 1840, with the reformation of Great Britain's postal service by Rowland Hill. Among the many things that Hill's plans called for was "a bit of paper,

just large enough to bear the stamp and covered at the back with a glutinous wash which might, by applying a bit of moisture, attach to the back of the letter so as to avoid the necessity for redirecting it."

Collection of these stamps began almost immediately and reached such proportions that in 1842, the weekly magazine *Punch* editorialized on them stating that "a new mania had bitten the industriously idle ladies of England . . .". The term given to such collecting was 'timbromania'.

Fortunately, in 1865, Monsieur Herpin coined the term 'philatelie' to replace 'timbromania', thereby saving all of us from becoming timbromaniacs.

In 1874, national postal reforms were so advanced and international traffic was so heavy that 22 nations formed a general postal union. This served to vastly simplify international transfers, e.g., where there had been 1200 different rates for mail exchanged between participating countries, there was now only 1!

On 1 July 1878, Canada entered the international organization gaining what the then Postmaster General L. S. Huntington (best known for his Pacific Railway scandal revelations) described as "a voice in the future settlement of the conditions of postal intercourse between the nations of the civilized world . . ."

So many other countries joined that the organization changed its name to the Universal Postal Union (U.P.U.). The U.P.U. became a specialized agency of the United Nations Organization in 1947.

The design of the three CAPEX '78 stamps of 10 June is the same as the earlier

issued CAPEX stamp, i.e., a stamp format which uses imperforate pairs of each of three of Canada's classic stamps, a pair for each denomination.

All of the four stamps were designed by Carl Brett of Toronto, engraved by Robert Couture from the original stamps, which may be seen at the National Postal Museum, Ottawa, and printed by the British American Bank Note Company, Ottawa, by one colour steel engraving and one or two colour gravure process.

The stamp size is 36 mm x 30 mm in a horizontal format in a pane of 50 stamps. They are printed on coated-one-side paper, P.V.A. gummed and perforated 13.

Marginal inscriptions bearing the names of the printer, designer and engraver, face in at the sides at the four corners of the pane.

The 14c. first class letter rate stamp will be printed in a quantity of 33 million and will bear the general tagging. This stamp reproduces a pair of the 10 pence blue Jacques Cartier stamp issued in 1855. The portrait was originally engraved after an 1839 painting of Cartier by Russian born Francois Riss. The painting now hangs in the Hotel de Ville in St. Malo, France. The design of the 1855 stamp was suggested by W. H. Griffin, Deputy Postmaster General and 222,000 of the stamps were ordered from Rawdon, Wright, Hatch & Edson, New York.

The second of the 19 June issue is a 30c. stamp for the first class letter rate for overseas mail. It will be printed in a quantity of 23 million and will also bear the general tagging. It depicts a pair of ½ pence rose Queen Victoria issue of July

1857. The cameo head of the 1857 stamp was adapted from the contemporary 4d engraved stamp of Great Britain which, in turn, was adapted from the head on the William Wyon medallion of 1837. This stamp was also ordered from Rawdon, Wright, Hatch & Edson, New York, in quantities totalling 2,600,000.

The third of the 10 June stamps is \$1.25 for the basic registration fee, and will be printed in quantities of 19 million and will not be tagged. It features a pair of the H. R. H. Albert, Prince Consort stamp issued in May 1851. The original of this stamp, 100,400 of which were printed in slate-violet on vertically laid paper by Rawdon, Wright, Hatch & Edson, New York, are prize collector items.

The above three stamps have been incorporated in Canada Post's first souvenir sheet which was designed by Newton Frank Arthur & Company of Toronto, Ontario. It has the 14c., 30c. and \$1.25 CAPEX '78 stamps se-tenant plus engraved symbols of CAPEX '78 and the U.P.U. on a silver background. The dates of the exhibition are under the CAPEX '78 symbol and under the U.P.U. symbol is the

date marking Canada's entry into the U.P.U.

The souvenir sheet measures 99 mm x 76 mm in a horizontal format. There will be 3.5 million printed by the British American Bank Note Company, Ottawa by 3 colour steel engraving and 3 colour gravure process on P.V.A. gummed paper. Only the 14c. and 30c. will be general tagged.

The entire sheet can be affixed for postage or the individual stamps, which are perforated, may be removed for postal use.

To complement the three stamps and souvenir sheet for Canada Post Day (10 June) at CAPEX '78, Canada Post will have nine special pictorial cancellations. One of these will be used at CAPEX '78 on each of the nine theme days.

The cancellations will be available for handback service at the exhibition on each specific theme day only. There will also be mailback service for stamped self addressed mail deposited in mail boxes at the exhibition.

These cancellations will be exclusive to the exhibition. They will not be available at Ottawa or by mail order.

CANADA POST NEWS**PRECANCELLED FLORAL DEFINITIVE**

The National Postal Museum's Pioneer Post Office released for sale the precancelled 1c. floral stamp (#705) on February 1, 1978. Other precancelled low value definitive stamps are expected soon as rumour has it that Canada Post is planning to precancel the 1c. - 14c. definitives.

12c. CAPEX '78 USED BIASECTED

It was inevitable that some adventurous collectors would attempt to pass letters through the mail franked with one half of the 12c. CAPEX '78 stamp of 18 January. After all, the stamp on stamp is a 12 pence stamp, so why not use one half of the stamp for the 12c. first class letter rate?

Evidently other people, not collectors, thought the same way and used one half of the stamp and got away with it, as did many collectors.

Illustrated are two such uses on one half of the 12c. stamp. One was mailed from Winnipeg to Guelph (stamp was cleanly cut in half), the other was mailed in Winnipeg

to the Greater Winnipeg Gas Co. (stamp was roughly torn in half). It is obvious that such usage would or could easily be overlooked in the larger post offices because of the volume of mail. However, the smaller post offices could detect such an improper use more readily and reports of letters franked with one half of the 12c. stamp bearing postage due are, perhaps, indications that the smaller post offices were involved.

A new 50c. booklet with floral design covers and a pane of 4 x 2c. floral stamps, 3 x 14c. QEII stamps and 1 label appeared unannounced in vending machines in Guelph, Ont., during the week of April 9th.

The recently introduced cover stock with wavy lines on the outside has been used and the motifs are the same as those of the earlier floral design booklets but are printed in grey-green ink.

The inside of the back cover has the following bilingual text: Code it - post it! / Please remember to use the Postal Code/ in the mailing address - and in your/ return address/

Codez et postez! / N'oubliez pas d'indiquer le code postale/dans l'adresse du destinataire - et dans/votre adresse de réédition.

The booklet is sealed, as before, with a strip of clear rubber cement.

The samples seen in Guelph have been trimmed too close to top so that the stamps in the upper row are approximately 23.5 mm high while the lower stamps are approximately 24.5 mm high.

On 6 April 1851, Great Britain transferred the responsibility for the operation of the Post Office to the Province of Canada. Canada's first postage stamp was issued shortly thereafter, on 23 April 1851. It was a red three-penny stamp designed by Sir Sandford Fleming of Toronto for the Postmaster General, the Hon. James Morris, and depicted a beaver in its natural environment. The second denomination, a six-penny stamp printed in slate-violet, was distributed to post offices sometime between 2 and 17 May 1851. This stamp depicts a vignette of Albert, the Prince Consort, from an engraving by W. H. Egleton after a portrait drawn by W. Drummond. The highest denomination in this series was a Twelve-Penny stamp issued on 14 June 1851.

All the stamps were engraved by Alfred Jones (1819-1900), an accomplished British portrait engraver. All sources agree that of the total printing of 51,000 stamps, 1,510 were distributed to postmasters throughout the Province of Canada and of these, sixty were returned by the postmaster at Ingersoll, Ontario. The stamp was printed in sheets of 200, arranged in two panes, each having 10 rows of 10 subjects. From

Post Office records it is known that the Twelve-Penny stamp was available for use until 4 December 1854, when it was withdrawn from sale. On 1 May 1857, the remaining stocks of this stamp were destroyed in accordance with Post Office procedure.

In 1851 Canadian Post Office authorities believed there were no printing firms in Canada capable of producing the high quality engraving which was required for postage stamps. Rawdon, Wright, Hatch & Edson of New York City, had gained a reputation as security printers of high quality banknotes and postage stamps. This firm, together with several others, formed the American Bank Note Company in 1858. Prior to being awarded the contract to print Canada's first stamps, Rawdon, Wright, Hatch & Edson had established an agency in Canada and had undertaken work for a number of private banks. No doubt this factor was taken into consideration when the Hon. James Morris (Postmaster General 1851-1853) awarded the contract to the New York firm.

In the matter of choosing the designs for Canada's first stamps, the postal administration for the Province of Canada sought to demonstrate a measure of independence from Great Britain. It appears certain that, for a short time, consideration was given to use only the beaver design prepared by Sandford Fleming. The existence of a one shilling essay containing Fleming's design would appear to substantiate this theory. Post Office authorities, however, eventually adopted the policy that all letters addressed to foreign destinations should bear the effigy of the sovereign. As the Twelve-Penny stamp was expected to primarily serve this purpose, it was decided that the most suitable likeness of Her Majesty Queen Victoria would be used. The beaver design was retained for the three-penny stamps, which was the rate for internal mail.

The vignette for the Twelve-penny stamp as taken from the portrait of Queen Victoria in her Robes of State, painted in 1837 by Alfred Chalon, R.A. (1781-1860). The painting was presented by Her Majesty to her mother, the Duchess of

Kent, as a memento of the Queen's first visit to the House of Lords on 17 July, 1837. The Chalon portrait was the basis for many postage stamps issued by British Colonies, notably New Zealand. Canada also utilized this vignette for two other postage stamps—the 7-1/2-pence, issued in 1857 and the 12-1/2-cent, issued in 1859—as did the provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

"Twelve Pence" was used to identify the value of the stamp rather than "One Shilling", to avoid confusion between the monetary values of British Sterling and Colonial currency.

The Postal Museum is fortunate in having an original 24" x 36" engraving after the Chalon portrait. This rare engraving was formerly in the collection of Mr. Gerald E. Wellburn of Victoria, B.C., a prominent Canadian postal historian and charter member of the Postal Museum Advisory Committee. The engraving is the work of Samuel Cousins, A.R.A., and was published on 28 June 1838 by Francis Graham Moon of London, England. Mr. Wellburn presented the engraving to the Postal Museum in 1975.

The "Bank Note Companies" in Canada and the United States place great importance on their engravings, since they were used many times for various purposes. Correspondence between the Canada Post Office and the printers in New York suggests the design for the Twelve-Penny stamp was prepared in Canada and taken personally by the Postmaster General to New York. The engraving was done by Alfred Jones under the direction of James Parsons Major, a script engraver and designer, and head of the engraving department at Rawdon, Wright, Hatch & Edson.

The Twelve-Penny stamps do not bear the Rawdon Wright, Hatch & Edson imprint. Imprints did not appear on the sheet margins of Canadian stamps until 1852. When the first and only consignment of Twelve-Penny stamps reached Toronto in May 1851, problems became apparent. An exceedingly thin grade of transparent laid paper had been used by the printers, which brought criticism from the Postmaster General. A theory to explain this

would be the company's use of an existing supply of paper which was not normally used for postage stamp printing purposes. The paper used for the "pence" stamp was manufactured by the Ivy Mills of Chester, Pa., a company noted for its quality banknote papers. It seems quite possible that the laid paper printings were in fact printed on a type of banknote paper.

Thirty-five die and plate proofs are known to exist for the Twelve-Penny stamp. This figure includes the contemporary plate proofs and the composite die proofs that were made from 1859 to 1878. Some authorities claim that the last printing of composite die proofs was probably authorized in 1878 by A. C. Goodall, President, American Bank Note Co.

Based on reliable authority, it is believed that there are between 100 and 145 of the Twelve-Penny stamps, both mint and used, in existence. The same source suggests the following quantities exist:

- (1) 5 mint pairs
- (2) 50 mint singles
- (3) 3 to 5 covers
- (4) 2 used pairs
- (5) 75 used singles

Why the stamp saw such limited use has been discussed among philatelists for many years. The consensus is that it prepaid seldom used rates such as the following: 12d per ounce to Newfoundland and the British West Indies via Halifax and Liverpool; double weight letters to the United States; quadruple-rate domestic letters. The sale of so few Twelve-Penny stamps during the period of its availability, must have been a matter of some concern to Post Office authorities, and the reason for its unpopularity may therefore be only part of the story. Some other significant reason may yet be uncovered to clarify this explanation further.

In his Epilogue to the Provincial Issues on page 216 of Vol. 1 Boggs states that in 1902, "The various dies and plates (of both the pence issues and the decimal currency issues of 1859) were cut apart and thrown into a river some miles from Ottawa, after having been lying in the vaults of the Department for years." There is no evidence that this occurred. The Twelve-

Les philatélistes se sont demandés pendant bien des années pourquoi ce timbre avait été si peu utilisé. De l'avis général, il servait à payer des taux peu usités, par exemple: 12d par once pour Terre-Neuve et les Antilles Britanniques, via Halifax et Liverpool; lettres de poids double pour les États-Unis; taux quadruple des lettres du régime interne. Ce peu de succès du timbre de douze pence pendant toute la période où il fut en vente dut inquiéter les autorités postales de l'époque, et cette raison qu'on avance pour son manque de succès n'est peut-être qu'une partie de l'histoire. 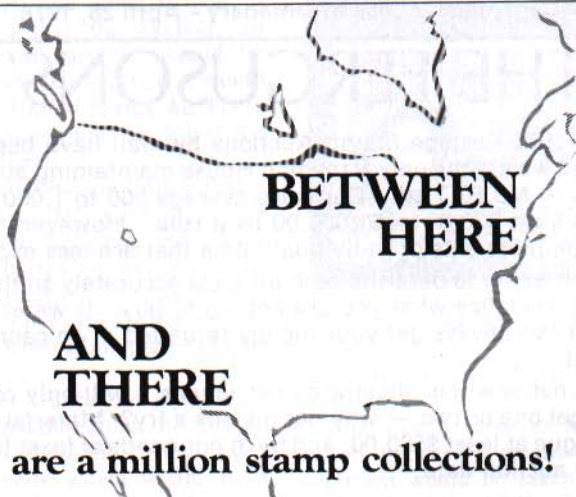
Penny plate that was sent to Canada on 26 March 1857 was not destroyed, since it is now on display at the National Postal Museum.

In 1963 Post Office officials attending the annual convention and exhibition of the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada in Windsor, Ontario, surprised those assembled by bringing a sealed box to the banquet. When this box was opened during the dinner, all were astonished to see that it contained defaced printing plates of early postage stamps of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, including the plate for the Twelve-Penny stamp. It is interesting to note that the name "J. Garside, N.J." is stamped into the metal on the reverse side of the plate. Perhaps this is the name of the supplier of the original steel plate.

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The Story behind the Overprints

by GEOFFREY F. BRIGINSHAW

On July 15, 1963 two of the 8d and 10d Bahamas definitives, which had been in regular use since January 1954, were overprinted 'Bahamas Talks 1962' and issued - somewhat belatedly!

What we now know as Scott 181 and 182 have a catalogue value of more than eight times the value of the basic stamps (Sc. 166, Sc. 167).

Scott catalogue tells us that they 'Issued to commemorate the meeting of President John F. Kennedy and Prime Minister Harold Macmillan, December 1962'. But who can remember what the talks were about?

In the early 1960's, discussions concerning a nuclear deterrent had taken place between the U.S.A. and Great Britain. It had been decided that the Skybolt, an air-launched ballistic missile, should be developed and produced and that it would be carried by the United States Air Force Strategic Air Command and the Royal Air Force V Bomber Force.

However, in early 1962 the United States Defense Department decided to scrap the project as Skybolt had not yet flown successfully and it was no longer considered to be cost-effective. The Americans decided instead to use the Polaris missile which would be fired from their nuclear submarines.

Britain naturally wanted to obtain the maximum compensation from the U.S.A. for their cancellation of the British order for the 100 Skybolts which would have extended the capacity of the V Bomber Force by at least a decade. The Americans did not wish to weaken the Anglo-American Alliance but they did want to dilute Britain's independent control of the deterrent.

President Kennedy and Prime Minister Macmillan met in Nassau on December 18, 1962 to discuss the implications of the

cancellation and to agree on an alternate solution.

While the talks were in progress, the USAF achieved a satisfactory flight of the Skybolt but it was felt to be too late. The Prime Minister was simply told that the previous agreement was no longer valid

but that he could have Polaris missiles instead.

This was a blow to Royal Air Force morale because it meant that the nuclear deterrent would be taken away from the RAF and given to the Royal Navy who would be allowed to build four Polaris submarines, but with only two operational at any one time.

It must have been an unhappy Christmas for Mr. Macmillan; instead of the expected 'gift' of 100 Skybolts from Mr. Kennedy, he would receive only four Polaris missiles.

Twenty pages of information on Carl Linnaeus, the Father of Flora, who is honoured in the latest Swedish stamp booklet.



This year the Swedish botanist and scientist Carl Linnaeus (Carl von Linné), 1707-1778, will be celebrated in many parts of the world. It is now 200 years since the death of this renowned natural scientist, the man who introduced the binomial system

with a generic name and a specific name for both plants and animals.

"Linnaeus' Travels"

On Linnaeus' birthday, 23rd May, Sweden will issue a stamp booklet containing six commemorative stamps. The motifs celebrate Linnaeus' famous journeys of discovery in his native land. The original MSS of these research reports are preserved today at The Linnean Society in London.

One of the stamps shows Linnaeus in Lappish costume with a Dutch doctor's cap on his head and a Lappish drum on his stomach. This motif is taken from a contemporary engraving.

The stamps were engraved by the Engraver to His Majesty the King, Czeslaw Slania.

A commemorative booklet about Linnaeus will be issued simultaneously with the new stamps. It will contain all six stamps postmarked on the first day in addition to an interesting presentation of Linnaeus and a description of the background to the stamps. His three-year journey via Germany to Holland and England is also touched upon. The text is in English, German and Swedish. Among the numerous illustrations are several of Linnaeus' own drawings.

The Beginnings Of Postal Services In Canada

by W. E. DURANT HALLIDAY

Some months before his death on 19 September 1976 Mr. Halliday showed me the manuscript of his article. I read it and considering it to be a noteworthy record of an interesting period in the history of the Canadian posts, I asked his permission to submit it to CP for publication. To this he readily agreed and its publication in the present issue will serve as a tribute by the Society, to one who will be remembered as Canada's first postal historian.

August of 1963 marked the bicentenary of the establishment of the first post offices in Canada in direct land communication with New York, then the "Chief Post Office" for the American Colonies. Actually, a post office had been at Halifax, Nova Scotia, in 1755, but in communication only by sea with Boston.

In commemoration of the bicentenary, the Postmaster General authorized the issue of a special five cent stamp showing a mail carrier, or post rider, as he might have carried the mails between Quebec and Montreal in the summer of 1763 (Fig. 1).

The opening of these offices was made possible, of course, by the end of the struggle between Britain and France for supremacy in North America. The fortress of Quebec had capitulated in September, 1759, and the French forces at Montreal surrendered the next year. Finally, three years later, under the Treaty of Paris of February, 1763, New France

and its dependencies were ceded to Britain and a proclamation of that year designated the St. Lawrence settlement as the Province of Quebec.

There had been a rudimentary postal service in the St. Lawrence Settlement under the French regime. A system of official messengers, known as Royal Couriers, had been started in 1705 for the carriage of government dispatches, and these men had been allowed to take private letters at fixed fees (1). At the time of the occupation, there were four such couriers (2). What was of great importance, however, was that a road, with bridge and eight ferries, had been constructed between Quebec and Montreal, and was open for through travel by carriage by the summer of 1735. Post houses were established on this road, at intervals of about nine miles. They were under "maitres de poste" whose function was to provide travellers with horses and carriages, or sleighs, at fixed rates. As evidence of the quality of the road, in August of that year, the "Grand Voyer", or general overseer of the roads, Jean-Francois Eustache Lanouillier de Boisclera, made the trip "en chaise" in four and a half days (3). In addition there was the Porte du Fond up the Richelieu River and various lateral communications. Land communication was maintained with New York through the "Champlain Gap", that is, by way of the Richelieu River, Lake Champlain, Crown Point and Albany on the Hudson River.

After the occupation, the senior British military commander, General Amherst, divided the country into three districts, each with a military governor. These districts were Quebec, Three Rivers, and Montreal under, respectively, Brigadier James Murray, the senior officer, Colonel Ralph Burton, and Brigadier James Gage. One of Amherst's first acts was to place the "maitres de poste" under the control of the governors and to provide for new rates and new commissions.

Correspondence between Amherst and the governors indicates that a number of arrangements were made - not always too satisfactory - for handling dispatches and letters, including carriage "by hand" by officers, special couriers, merchants and other travellers; the provision, under military control, of a more or less regular courier service, and the collection, sorting and dispatch of letters for the occupied country arriving by ship at New York. There is, in fact, one record of the direct forwarding of letters by colonial posts and the imposition of postal charges, most of which could not be met because they were too expensive. Here, it must be remembered that it was quite usual in those days to

send letters unpaid, especially business ones, with the charges to be collected from the recipient.

Gage, the Governor, at Montreal, wrote Amherst with some feeling in August, 1762, that:-

"A messenger is arrived here with a large Packet of Letters, dispatched from the Post Office at New York, most of which will be returned. The Postage is so very high, the Public can not afford to pay for them and the merchants who have got Letters made a terrible Murmuring at the price of them." (4).

The posts on the Atlantic coast had been started as local colonial ventures but began to be developed into a postal system under the British Postmaster General with the granting of a patent in 1692 to the Master of the Mint to operate posts in the American Colonies. This authority was put on a statutory basis in Queen Anne's time by "An Act Establishing a General Post Office for all Her Majesty's Dominions," of 1710. At the time of the occupation of New France there were two Deputy Postmasters General for the American posts, the Northern District being in charge of that versatile gentleman, Benjamin Franklin.

The 1710 Act established a "Chief Post Office" at New York, as referred to before, and set out rates based on the number of sheets, from there to the "Chief Towns" of the various colonies. There was also provision for rates for distances up to 60 and up to 100 miles. These charges were in shillings and pence sterling.

At the time, the principal coinage in the Americas was the Spanish (or Mexican) silver dollar - the "piece of eight" - and its subdivisions. Practices such as clipping and filing affected the weight of silver in the coins, and lower denominations were often of baser metal. The result was that currency values varied with the sterling worth given the dollar. In consequence, the practice of "currency by tale" arose, that is, expressing sterling amounts in Troy weights of silver. Payment for postage then could be collected in any acceptable money which was equal to the required weight.

Following the Treaty of Paris in February, 1763, as mentioned above, the St. Lawrence settlements in Canada were proclaimed the Province of Quebec. During that summer, the colonial postal system on the Atlantic coast was extended to the new province. A

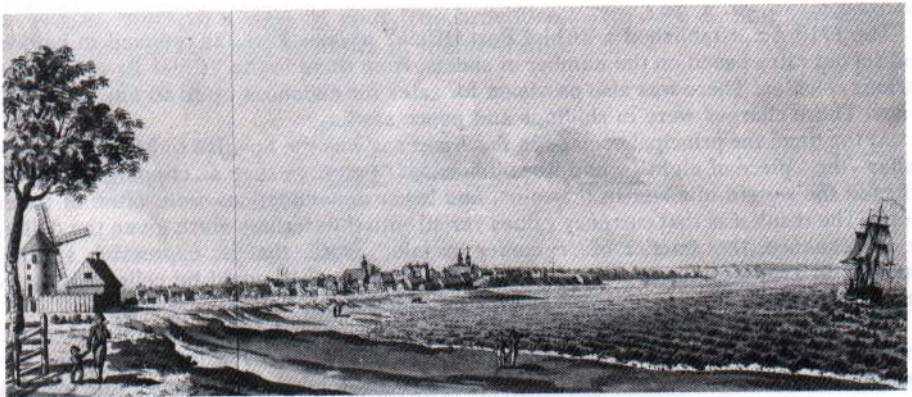
transcript of one of the proclamations about the new postal services has happily survived. It was issued by the Governor of the Three Rivers district and, although undated, its issue towards the end of August, 1763 is confirmed by a circular sent out by the same Governor dated August 23rd, dealing with letter-carriers, and the use of the "Maitres de poste" in the system. These very interesting documents (4) read as follows:-

"Whereas by Act of Parliament passed in the ninth year of the Reign of Queen Anne, a General Post Office was established for the countries belonging to the British Empire, and the Superintendent of the said Post Office having thought fit, for the general benefit of commerce and more particularly for that of this Province, to establish a Post Office at Quebec and to appoint Mr. Finlay to administer it, In conformity with the terms of the said Act, he has opened a Post Office in this town of Trois-Rivieres in the house of Mr. Hart, merchant, We order as follows, that is to say, that all masters or commanding officers of vessels or ships arriving at the port of Trois-Rivieres or the dependencies thereof, as well as those who compose the crew or have travelled on the said vessels or ships, immediately after their arrival to deliver to the postmaster here the letters with which they have been entrusted, the said postmaster paying them one sou a letter, for which they will give him a receipt. There are excepted the letters of merchants or owners of vessels concerning the said vessels and their cargoes which the masters may deliver, either personally, or by those whom they wish to employ, to the persons to whom they are addressed, excepting, also, all documents relating to legal proceedings, or letters sent by travelling friends, or by express messenger concerning private affairs, under penalty of paying a fine of five pounds British currency for each contravention.

Moreover, We forbid, conformably with the said Act, any person whatsoever to receive, take, order, deliver or send, by land or water, letters or packets (other than the letters or packets above excepted) under penalty of a fine of five pounds, sterling; half of the said fines belonging to His Majesty, as is set forth in the said Act, and the other half to go for the benefit of those, who will lay the necessary information, and will prosecute the defaulters, who will be condemned with costs in case of conviction.

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HAISLA —

A New British Columbia Post Office

By W. G. ROBINSON

On July 5, 1976, a new Post Office was opened to serve the 700 residents of the Kitamaat Indian Village. This follows the precedent of the "Waglisla" Post Office at Bella Bella, B.C. which was opened in 1975 (cf. Can. Phil., vol. 27, no. 2, page 75, 1976).

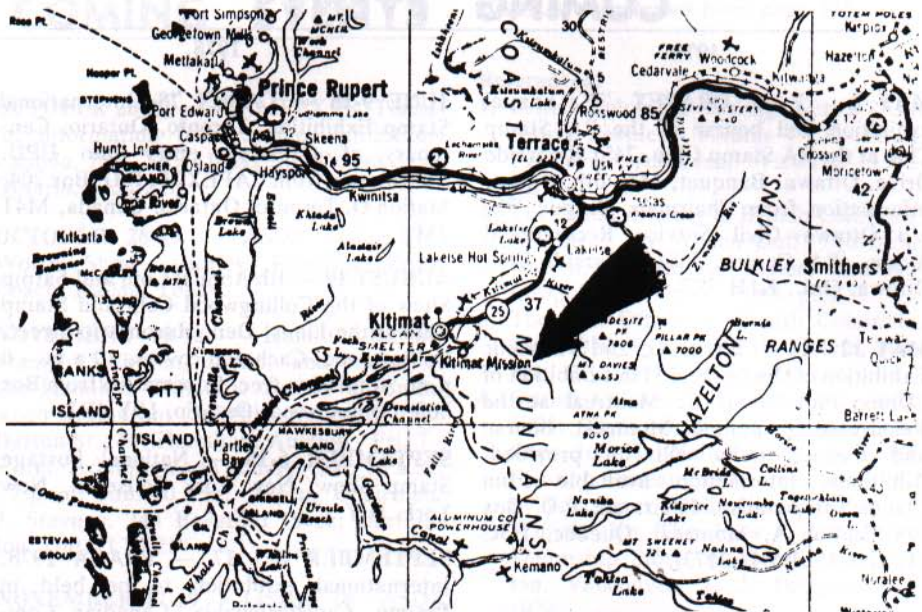


Fig. 1. Location map. 1 inch = 34 miles.

Kitamaat Indian Village is located about three miles south-east of the town of Kitimat, site of a large Aluminum Company of Canada smelter, across the Kitimat Arm of Douglas Channel, an inlet of the Pacific Ocean. Access to the village is by boat, or by a paved road from Kitimat. The site is about 500 air miles north-west of Vancouver. A general location map is shown in Figure 1.

The new Post Office is administered by the Kitamaat Village Council, and is located in the Band's Public Safety Building. The name "Haisla" refers to the dialect group of the Kwakiutl Indian Nation who live in the region of Douglas Channel and Gardner Canal.(1)

A Methodist Mission was established here during the 1880's by a Tsimshian lay teacher named George Edgar(2). He was succeeded in 1893 by Rev. George Henry Raley, a native of Barnsley, Yorkshire, who came to Canada in 1883, and was the first Postmaster when "Kitimaat" Post Office was opened at the Mission on March 1, 1900(3). This name in the Haisla dialect means "people of the snow" and this is literally what the residents are during the long winters.

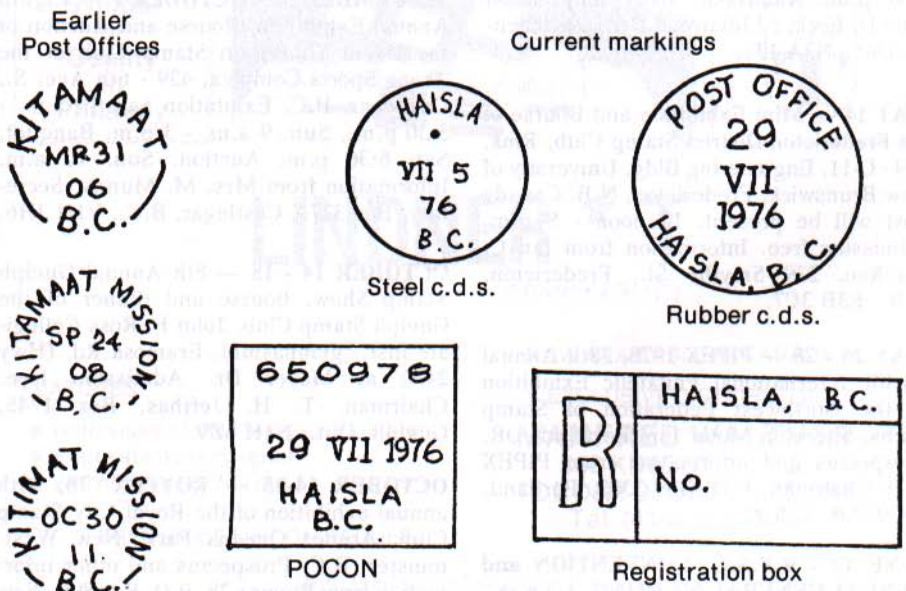


Fig. 2. Postal markings.

On May 1, 1908, the Post Office name was changed to "Kitamaat Mission", and in December, 1908, the spelling was altered to "Kitimat Mission", which the Office retained until it closed on April 25, 1943. Postal markings from these earlier Offices are scarce, and those known to the writer are illustrated in Figure 2.

Walbran(4) shows the name "Kitimat Arm" adopted by officers of the Hudson's Bay Company about 1837, and placed on the Admiralty chart by Captain Daniel Pender, RN, during his hydrographic survey on the "Beaver", in 1867. The name "Raley Point" was given to a prominent feature on Kitimat Arm by Captain John T. Walbran during surveys in C.G.S. "Quadra", 1898, after Rev. G. H. Raley, the first Postmaster at "Kitamaat".

Mail travelled to and from the earlier Post Offices in the area by steamers of the Canadian Pacific Navigation Co., the Union Steamship Company of B.C.(5). Grand Trunk Pacific Steamships, and Canadian Pacific B.C. Coast Steamships. All mail now goes from "Haisla" to Kitimat and Terrace by road, thence by Canadian Pacific Airlines to Vancouver.

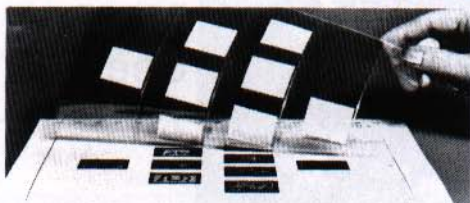

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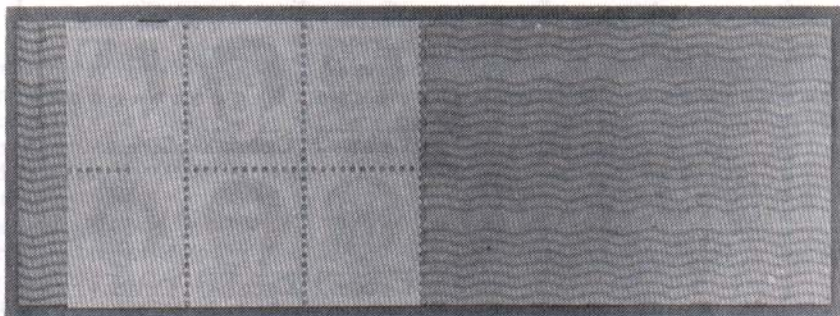


" Interim " 50 cents Caricature Booklets

By Andrew Chung

The latest find to be noted in #586c, the 50c. caricature booklet, is a group of wavy longitudinal lines on the inside of the booklet cover only. These have been described earlier (Can. Phil., vol. 29, No. 1, p. 29, 1978). In addition to the wavy lines, there are also several paper and printing varieties of the stamps found in this "interim" booklet.

The lines vary from a deep to a pale buff colour. The pale buff colour is most easily seen as barely noticeable lines which indicate that they are printed on the cover stock. The pattern of the lines is regular and constant. There are thirteen wavy lines which form a band measuring about $21\frac{1}{2}$ mm in width. Between each band is a 4 mm gap. There is at least one complete band per booklet and its position varies from one booklet to another. Figure 1 illustrates the pattern of the lines.

The order in which the booklets were dispensed from the vending machines was:

1. CF-100 Canuck Jet Fighter

This arrangement differed from that of the earlier booklets with the plain, unlined covers. The earlier booklets followed this order:

1. CF-100 Canuck Jet Fighter
2. Stranraer Flying Boat
3. Mosquito Fighter Bomber
4. Fokker Super Universal
5. Burgess Dunne
6. Gibson Twin-Plane
7. Curtiss HS-2L Flying Boat
8. Nieuport Scout
9. Junkers W-34
10. Argus Subhunter/Reconnaissance

I have noted four degrees of paper

fluorescence of the panes of the interim booklets. If you also consider differences on the gummed side as I do, there is a total of seven papers. They are:

- a) Hibrite/Hibrite gum
- b) Hibrite-/Hibrite- gum
- c) Hibrite-/Hibrite- gum*
- d) Fluorescent-/Fluorescent- gum
- e) Fluorescent-/Fluorescent- gum*
- f) Dull/Dull gum
- g) Dull/Dull gum*

seen is a pane which was miscut at the right hand edge. Figure 2 illustrates this variety. Half of 'g' and all of 'e' of the word 'postage' and part of the '0' of the '10' are upside down to the rest of the pane. This is clear evidence that the 50c. panes were laid out tete-beche on the plate.

At A of figure 2 the tagging bar is 4 mm wide and equal in width to a complete tagging bar at, for example, B. The distance between the outer edges of the '0'

The "-" after Hibrite or Fluorescent indicates either a low Hibrite or a low Fluorescent paper. The fluorescence on both sides of the paper are about the same. A "*" indicates a slight difference on the gummed side. The cover is very dull deep purple under UV light.

The printing varieties of the panes in the lined covers are described below.

- a) The most fascinating variety I have

in '10' to the upside down '0' is 3.5 mm at C. This is also equal to the distance between the outer edges of '0' in '10' to the 'C' in 'Canada' at D. At E, the perforations at the bottom of the pane overlap. The pane opposite this one would also show a similar over-lapping of the perforations but they would appear at the top of the pane.

- b) Weak inking on the hair and face lines at either the top or bottom 1c. stamps

was also seen. This is not a constant variety.

c) A blob of fluorescent ink on the selvage of the pane. This is not constant.

d) The pane's selvage peels off easily from the cover indicating a lack of moistening.

e) The oddest variety I have is one in which the gummed side of the paper is thinned or scraped at the lower right corner of the pane. There is a piece of cellulose tape placed over the scraped area. Booklets before and after this one were undamaged and showed no other variety.

f) Some rather unusual markings have been found on the selvage of a few panes (Figure 3). These are in the form of small semi-circles (Fig. 3A) or, as found on one pane (Fig. 3B) what appears to be the tops of five digits or a combination of digits and letters. These cannot be identified since most of them has been trimmed off.

These markings appear to be hand printed with a black felt tipped pen. What are they? Do you have any suggestions?

Finally, the question of the significance, if any, of the wavy lines is posed.

The Sales and Market Development Branch of Canada Post stated that the lines

serve no purpose whatsoever. The cardboard is simply new stock. It is also used for the new 50c. booklets with the 12c. Queen stamps, but on these, the lines are on the outside of the cover.

Incidentally, some of the "new" booklets have appeared without the lines on the cover. But the new booklets are another study.

Even CAPEX '78 could not escape the comedy of errors. As you will have heard by now, the 12p black stamp for CAPEX has been mistaken by some who bought the stamp as two 12c. stamps. A number of them have been torn or cut in half and were used on letters that passed through the mail without postage due. Then someone at the Bank Note Company may have thought that since we already have a stamp with a 'mole on the forehead' variety, why not make a 'mole on the chin' variety? Stamp No. 23 on every fourth sheet shows a 'mole on the chin' on the left stamp. This is a heavy black dot which is clearly visible with the naked eye. Now to make things worse, (not for collectors) this spot was retouched and the spot "removed" to the extent that it is smaller and less noticeable. These varieties will make a nice showing in any collection.

Hinton, Alberta, started the idea of overprinting the 1c. flower stamp with PAX 77 for their exhibition. These were used on envelopes. Montreal has followed their example with an overprint that reads EXUP XI/12 au 14/MAI/1978 for their forthcoming exhibition. Some 20,000 were overprinted and some have been used on covers. The are, of course, not legal issues but if not used for postage (some went through) there is probably nothing wrong with this. Naturally, it would be difficult to check every letter going through the post office for this incorrect usage of such stamp.

It did not take long before the 14c. coil was found imperforated. All of the previous coil stamps now exist imperforate vertically. Although not plentiful, blocks exist which are made from two side by side coil strips which show only a very faint horizontal scoreline. These coils cannot be

separated except by cutting them apart. Nevertheless, it appears that such items are not in much demand. Presumably they are regarded as blind perforations rather than a imperforates. On U.S. stamps, such items demand a premium. The War Issue of 1940 exist with such blind perforations and these normally bring about 15 to 20 dollars in pairs.

By the time this column appears a number of new literature items will have been issued. The Lyman catalogue is to be issued very early this year. There are so many changes to the layout, photos, information as well as prices that the entire catalogue looks completely different from previous editions. The cover is about the only page which is the same. These kinds of improvements make such a catalogue more valuable every year, especially to the average collector. One may not always agree with the pricing, but we will have more to say about that subject one of these days.

The First Day Cover Catalogue has now been printed in colour. A very attractive catalogue and certainly a key philatelic literature item.

The Walburn Precancel Catalogue should be out by now. No basic changes were made to the style but the prices have skyrocketed. The No. 21 Montreal roller precancel is still missing from the catalogue.

The Canadian Military Postmarks by Major Bailey lists the many basic types of these cancels. This handbook should be of interest to all collectors of Canadian stamps.

The Confederate States Ten Cent Blue Lithograph is a small booklet written by B. M. Green who is assistant curator of the

Philatelic Foundation. Although the reproduction of the stamps is poor, the information about this special stamp issue is very interesting.

Peter Sem, well known German philatelist brought out two special books on Bavaria and one on Baden. These lists cover all issues, varieties, cancels and their prices. A must for any old German States collector.

If you do not want to be caught buying a forged stamp manufactured by the famous Sperati, we suggest The Identification of Sperati's Reproductions. Mind you, it may cost you just \$500.00 for the book.

There is also the American Stampless Cover Catalogue, a field which is still accessible to the average collector. A Recent U.S. auction listed over 1000 such items, most of which were estimated at 2 to 5 dollars.

A number of sheets of the 10c. flower stamp precancelled have shown up with the dark green imprint from the engraved plate shifted 6 mm to the left. This effects the value, CANADA, Postes and Postage and the outline of the flower. At first it looks like a doubling of the flower but it is not. Many similar shifts have been noted. The 12c. Queen exists with a shift of about 2 mm. Booklets often show a shift. A nice major variety was found on the last 50c. booklet. More about that one next time.

The \$2 Quebec City stamp (No. 601) has been unavailable at post offices for some time. It has now reappeared in Ottawa (March 29) from plate 2 and perf. 13. It should be in other post offices shortly.

By the time this reaches you the 1977/78 season will be drawing to a close as will be my stint as Chapter Co-ordinator. It has been a busy but enjoyable five years. I have made many friends in that time and have found over and over again that the experience gained as a longtime member of the Executive of the Barrie District Stamp Club has enabled me to be of real service to many of our newer Chapters in the resolution of some of their problems.

It has been both an honour and pleasure to serve philately at the National Level for the past five years and I hope to continue in another capacity in the future.

THE SALES CIRCUIT --

Things are happening in the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada. Every time I read the Canadian Philatelist the list of new members seems to get longer and longer. We will soon be assigning membership number 16,000 and among these new members there are many who wish to participate in the Sales Circuit, either as buyers or as seller.

This is fine but I am getting weary from answering the many letters of inquiry about the functioning of the Sales Circuit. An article on how the circuit operates would help to answer many of the questions that both new and old members may pose.

There are two parts to the Sales Circuit, buying and selling.

Buying:

If you wish to receive circuits on a regular basis you should write to me stating your R.P.S.C. number and the countries in which you are interested. Your name will be placed on our list and you will be sent a circuit (6-8 books) once every three months.

I am making no promises at this time but by the fall or early in 1979 I hope to be able to send circuits once a month or less frequently if that is requested. Last September we asked members to pay postage and registration both ways. So far this seems to be working well. The cost of posting a member's circuit has been \$2.14 in Canada and \$2.62 to the United States and, as we all know, this will have

increased by the time you read this (Registration is now \$1.25. Ed).

Chapters as well as individuals can take advantage of this service. If you belong to a stamp club and wish to receive circuits you could contact Michael Millar who is Chapter Coordinator at the present time. I understand that it is relatively easy and reasonable to become a Chapter of the R.P.S.C.

At present I send circuits on a monthly basis to 62 Chapters from coast to coast. Your club could become a chapter and receive circuits too. The stamps in the Sales Circuit books are of good quality and range from quite the rare highly priced ones to the more common and cheaper varieties. I try to have books from nearly every country around the world with the main emphasis on Canada.

Selling:

If you have duplicates which you wish to sell, the Sales Circuit is ideal. I have blank books for sale at 3 for \$1.00. These have 16 pages and spaces on each page for 12 stamps. When you receive the books, the instructions inside are quite clear so you should have no difficulty arranging your stamps. If you wish to know what stamps are needed, please consult the Sales Circuit section in *The Canadian Philatelist*. At the present time almost anything is acceptable except Central and South America. There have been many requests for Canada MNH and lately there have been requests for the British Commonwealth and other countries MNH as well.

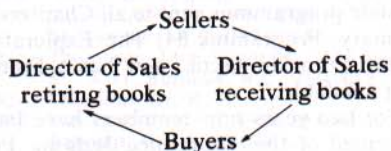
When you have filled a sales book you send it to me. It will be acknowledged with a receipt which lists your book(s) and its/their selling value. All books are covered by insurance as soon as they are received. The books are then placed in the circuits which go to our Chapters and individual members.

The books are retired after 12-18 months and are returned to you along with the money they have earned less 16% for commissions and insurance.

Since your stamps are covered against all losses by insurance as soon as they reach me, it is possible to put very good

stamps in the circuit and feel secure.

The Sales Circuit is exactly what it is called, a circuit and like a wheel, it must run smoothly. There are three parts to it: the sellers, the buyers and me. If any part of this wheel goes flat, it slows down all the others so you can see that the Sales Circuit could not operate without the cooperation of the Society's members and Chapters.



I hope I have helped to make the operation of the Sales Circuit a little clearer and I invite you all to help keep the wheel rolling.

I shall be at CAPEX '78 in June and hope to see as many of my philatelic friends as possible.

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Literature Reviews

REFERENCE MANUAL OF BNA FAKES, FORGERIES AND COUNTERFEITS. Releases Nos. 2 and 3, Kenneth W. Pugh, 134 - 20th Street, Brandon, Manitoba, Canada, R7B 1L4. 50 pages each [approx.], 3 hole punched for standard binder, \$6.75 each from publisher or many dealers.

These new releases follow the pattern established by the author with his initial release last year. For the most part, one page is devoted to a single item, either genuine or irregular, with a large illustration of the example. Both illustrations and text are clear.

Release number 2 deals with many aspects of the subject. Included are fakes and forgeries of the Cents Issues of Canada as well as the Maple Leaf Provisional Issue in some depth. Some items of the Large Queens and the Admirals are also included. More than half of the pages cover the Newfoundland issues from the pence stamps onward and this alone is full justification of the work. Two pages of this release explain some of the aspects of the "Ottawa Crown" cancellation, both genuine and forged.

Almost all of release number 3 is an in depth study of the Pence Issues of Canada. It includes examples of most of the known forgeries together with related items. Of interest to the collector of the Centennial Issue of Canada is documentation of the counterfeits and forgeries of these stamps. Five pages are devoted to the 1897 Provisional Issue of Newfoundland.

Release number 1 (reviewed in a previous issue) is still available but in short supply. Subsequent releases are in demand by those who wish to maintain this excellent series. Those who wish to start now would be well advised to act quickly and those who have not kept up to date may be disappointed if they wait too long.

HARRIS REFERENCE CATALOGUE OF POSTAGE STAMP PRICES OF THE UNITED STATES, UNITED NATIONS, CANADA AND PROVINCES. Spring/Summer 1978 Issue. H. E. Harris & Co., Inc., 645 Summer St., Boston, MA 02210, U.S.A. 13.5 cm x 20.9 cm, 220 pages, illus., flexible covers, 1978. US\$ 2.25 + 50c. postage and handling from the publisher. Available from many dealers.

What can be said about this well known and popular catalogue other than to say it shows staggering price increases in many American stamps and the slower increases in Canadian ones. It is interesting to note that interest in plate blocks appears to have levelled off somewhat. This catalogue serves not only as a Harris price list but as a handy barometer of the price changes that occur during intervals between editions.

THE BRITISH PHILATELIC FEDERATION CONGRESS HANDBOOK, Blackpool 1977. The British Philatelic Federation, 1 Whitehall Place, London, SW1A 2HE, England. 13.4 cm x 21.6 cm, 48 pages, illus., flexible covers. £1 from the publisher.

In addition to a list of officers and information on the BPF, there is the programme of the 59th BPF Congress at Blackpool. However, the bulk of the booklet, and perhaps the most important part, is made up of the texts of the presented papers. The papers were: Ernest G. Good's "Grass Roots" which is a critical look at the BPF; Oskar Winter's "Promoting Philately" in which he discusses what is being done and what should be done, and Kenneth F. Chapman's "The Purpose of the Philatelic Press". Mr. Chapman, recently retired after 25 years as editor of "Stamp Collecting", Britain's only weekly philatelic publication, and knows whereof he speaks. All three papers are worth

careful consideration. Also included is "The Royal Philatelic Collection" by John B. Marriott in which the history of the collection, some of its contents and the interest shown by its several owners, are discussed.

B.P.F. PHILATELIC SOCIETIES'DIRECTORY 1978. The British Philatelic Federation Ltd., 1 Whitehall Place, London, SW1A 2HE, England. 12.2 cm x 18.2 cm, offset, flexible covers. £1.50 from the publisher.

This is a handy directory of philatelic societies that are members of, or affiliated with the British Philatelic Federation. These include those in Great Britain and throughout the world, business members and a list of individual collector members. The inclusion of information on the BPF, its expert committee, value-added tax, a list of philatelic lectures and displays and much other information makes this very useful if one visits Great Britain or wishes to contact some dealers of societies there and abroad.

EUROPAISHE BLOCKS, 2 Aufalage. Seiger Verlag, Postfach 1160, Am Venusberg 16, 7073 Lorch/Wurttemberg. 10 cm x 20.7 cm. 608 pages, illus., coated paper, flexible covers, 1977. DM 5 [approx. \$2.75].

This Seiger catalogue is devoted solely to listing, illustrating and pricing miniature and souvenir sheets of all European countries. In all, 1040 are listed, described as to size, perforations and numbers printed, and 2600 prices (net prices) are provided. These include both mint and used prices for most of the sheets.

The text is entirely in German and prices are in D Marks. However, this should not deter a collector of these items since occasional reference to a dictionary would make the catalogue readily understandable. This is a most useful catalogue and is well printed and clearly illustrated as are other Seiger catalogues.

COLOUR: UNIVERSAL LANGUAGE AND DICTIONARY OF NAMES and ISCC-NBS CENTROID COLOR CHARTS. U.S. De-

partment of Commerce, National Bureau of Standards, Washington, DC 20234, U.S.A. 20.2 cm x 25.9 cm, viii + 18 + vi + 158 pages, illus., flexible covers, 20 pages [color charts]. 1976. US\$ 19.00.

If you have ever wondered how to distinguish some of the colours that are given in Scott Catalogues or just what some of those named colours looked like, this publication may be of use to you. The two parts of this kit are required for the proper and full use of either part.

The book part is in two sections. The first discusses colour designations and the Inter-Society Color Council-National Bureau of Standards (ISCC-NBS) Centroid Colors. The second, and most extensive part is the Color Name Dictionary. For philatelists, this is the most useful part since it contains the results of the work of Wm. H. Beck toward a simplification and classification of the colour names used in the Scott catalogues. He matched 4,000 stamps with their names in the catalogue and with another colour notation. These were then converted to ISCC-NBS designations.

To use the kit, one notes the colour designation in Scott then goes to the dictionary, locates that designation and notes the ISCC-NBS colour number which is opposite it. Then one consults the colour charts to find the colour chip that has that number. This should give one a very clear correspondence to the colour of the stamp as described in Scott.

The ISCC-NBS method of designating colours contains 267 colour names. The colour charts have names and spaces for all of these but only 251 of the 267 centroid colours could be produced in the glossy paint squares for the charts. Thus, there are only 251 colours with which to compare stamps. The missing 16 probably would not cause much inconvenience.

SCANDINAVIAN INTERNATIONAL PHILATELICALY, Vol. IV, No. 2, March 1978. P.O. Box 8042, Rotterdam, Holland. 15.9 cm x 21.0 cm, 18 pages, typewritten, offset, paper covers. Quarterly, Dfl 2.50/issue or Dfl 10 per year.

This is a combination of information service and price list of Scandinavian philatelic literature. The present issue has a note on "How to Start Your Own Reference Card Index on Scandinavia" (2 pages), a list of abbreviations used in the 7 pages of references. This is followed by catalogue and magazine prices and a list of Scandinavian specialist philatelic societies. It would be of use if Scandinavia is of interest to you.

HJMR NEWSLIST: Philatelic Literature Edition, Mar/Apr. 1978. HJMR Co., P.O. Box 610308, North Miami, FL 33161, U.S.A. Tabloid newspaper format, 28 pages. 25c. in stamps or coins from publisher.

HJMR have changed their Newslister. Formerly it combined philatelic literature

and stamps and covers. There are now two editions; a Philatelic Literature List, as indicated above, and one devoted entirely to stamps, covers and postal history.

The literature listing is alphabetical by country and offers capsule reviews of recent publications.

A NEW MAJOR BOOK FROM THE PHILATELIC FOUNDATION. The Philatelic Foundation has announced plans for publishing COLOR IN PHILATELY, a major book that is scheduled for release in the fall of 1978. It will be a hard cover book of some 150 pages of text, line drawings, graphs, and 16 full colour plates. The printing will be limited to 1500 copies.

The book will encompass the broad subject of colour identification and will be organized into three sections:

The First Section will provide the collector with the fundamentals of colour science, as it pertains to stamp collecting. It will include a discussion of inks, pigments, dyes and colorants as well as alterations of colours. Because shades,

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tints and dyes can affect stamp values, this area is discussed.

The Second Section of the book will be for the advanced student who may wish to study the subject in detail. This section will include discussions on the various instruments used in colour science, non-destructive ink analyses of stamp colours and cancels and how they may be applied in determining authenticity.

The Third Section will comprise an anthology of pertinent articles on colour science and review studies that have been performed on specific stamps, covers and

cancellations.

The pre-publication estimate of the cost of the book is \$35.00; however, collectors, societies and others are urged **not** to send in checks or cash but merely indicate interest in the book. Everyone doing so will be notified by The Foundation of the actual date of publication and the exact cost. Canadian Philatelic Literature

This is a newsy bulletin, entirely 'en français' with items relating to club affairs, always a page or two of comments by the president plus notes of new Canadian issues, Belgian stamp programme, etc. There has been a continued series of notes on Olympic issues, Canadiana on stamps of other countries and a similar assortment in the past issues. All in all, it is a fine society bulletin.

LA PHILATELIE AU QUEBEC. Le Fédération Québécoise de Philatélie, 1415 est, rue Jarry, Montréal, Québec, H2E 2Z7. 21.1 cm x 27.5 cm, 20 pages, incl. covers, offset. \$4 per year (10 issues).

This periodical is entirely in french and contains, among others, matters concerning the Fédération and its member societies. The most recent number at hand, Vol. 4, No. 6, Feb. 1978, has part 16 of "Histoire de la Poste Ambulante" by J. G. Dalpe et F. Belanger. This part discusses and illustrates the cancellations of the North Shore Railway. There is also "Les Duplex Modernes, Part 19, Ontario," listing the dates and types used at the several post offices listed in this first part

of the Ontario listing. Regular features include *Littérature Philatélique Spécialisée* by Jean Lafortune — reviews of pertinent books; *La documentation philatélique* by Cimon Morin - brief notes on recent literature, and finally, *Place aux Jeunes*. There are also reports on le Salon de la Philatélie in Montreal, an article on Austrian stamps, Part 5 of an article on thematic collections and the history of a postal employee.

This is an interesting an informative journal which is useful for keeping informed on philatelic activities in Québec.

There is always at least one feature article of philatelic interest which may carry over into succeeding numbers. Recently they have had articles on Ascension and St. Helena by Max Rosenthal who also writes for the C.P.

This is essentially a newsletter designed to provide members with information about club affairs, meeting, new members, and the like. However, it often contains brief notes, short articles, etc. of other matters. For example, there have been articles on the squared circle cancellations of Great Britain, the "Mail Must Go Through", a regular feature "Gleanings, by an 'olde Stamp Licker'" which is just what the name implies - comments of happenings, findings, etc. in the philatelic world, and all very interesting.

It is a readable and frequently informative bulletin which the members of the NSSC should be pleased to receive.

The content of this newsletter varies with each issue. The first part is a report on forthcoming meetings and comments on immediately past meetings. This may take up half of the page. The rest of the page contains brief notes of current interest on such topics as Israel new issues, FDC's, Canadian new issues, printings, varieties, etc. and announcements of exhibitions. There is a lot of good and useful information packed into this one page each month.

This exhausts the supply of philatelic literature for review. I am always on the look out for more to add to the current list. Do you know of any?



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
