

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
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EDITOR'S NOTES

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Letters to the Editor

"PHIL-EX" LET-DOWN

I wish to express my disappointment, and annoyance, at PHIL-EX. The name implies "Philatelic Exhibition" as a widely-recognized abbreviation. Their advertising states "International Stamp Show". Well ... it was certainly NOT an exhibition! The name of the show is totally misleading. Other than a very few frames of Boy Scouts and Girl Guides stamps (that's all I saw), it was a bourse and nothing else! Having to pay to get in is like having to pay an admission fee to the Eaton's Centre!

For many years now I have been "out" of philately, but I still enjoy viewing a display of good stamps; but there's no point in wandering about a bourse and bothering everyone when I have no intention of buying anything. How can I be sure of interpreting your "Coming Events" column correctly? Can we please have an official definition, or at least some guidelines, as to what exactly is meant by "exhibition" or "show"?

(You have raised a very "prickly" problem and one which I am certain will generate much diverse opinion. I hope that if both Dave Bastedo (owner of PHIL-EX) and Michael Madesker (owner of STAMPEX and STAMP MARKETPLACE) read your letter that they will respond accordingly, as these are perhaps the four largest "commercial" shows in Canada held annually.

I would imagine that the optimum word is "exhibition" vs. "bourse". The "Coming Events" column was I believe originally meant as a service (free) to Chapters and Clubs to promote their annual club shows, which invariably feature an exhibition. This was extended to the larger "commercial" shows as they booked paid advertising space and naturally expected the "freebie" as well. Nowhere in the PHIL-EX advertising does it state that there will be an exhibition of stamp frames, with prizes, awards, etc. But I do agree that just the name is totally misleading! PHIL-EX is simply not a "PHIL-EX" and perhaps Dave

Bastedo would consider changing the name to more accurately reflect the true nature of his show.

I have attended several "PHIL-EX"'s over the years, and I would never classify it as a stamp exhibition. It is a commercial stamp bourse conducted for profit - pure and simple! However, this type of bourse does have its role in philately. What your admission covers is the opportunity to view, select and purchase philatelic material from an array of dealers not normally available for your personal scrutiny. Of course there is the added advantage of purchasing new issue material from many postal administrations and agencies at FACE VALUE, many of whom do not normally deal directly with collectors.

I am certain that neither Messrs. Bastedo nor Madesker have gotten rich over the years in their efforts to promote philately to the great unwashed, and both do a large amount of public advertising, promoting membership in Clubs and Societies, but I do agree that to have a pre-conceived notion that just because the bourse is called "PHIL-EX" it will contain an exhibition, could be construed as misleading advertising. — Ed.)



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Canadian Stamp Varieties — 15

15.0 Catalogue Varieties.

As a change of pace, this column is about varieties that are well known. Or rather, about varieties that should be. It is a list of the varieties on Canadian stamps that should be in any specialized catalogue. Although some of these varieties have been catalogued and are indeed familiar, sadly most have been ignored. This includes many noteworthy constant plate flaws and several major errors such as the 1979 Frederick Grove and Emile Nelligan imperfs and the 2¢ Wildflower with missing colour.

For each variety in this list, there is a letter identifying the type (tagging, plate, gum, etc.), a number which serves to enumerate varieties of the same type, a description, and a reference if the variety has been written up in philatelic literature. For the most part I have limited this list to varieties on stamps issued since 1953 since the specialized catalogues list most of the major varieties on the earlier stamps. There are a few exceptions where what I consider to be an important variety has been neglected. For such cases, I list all the varieties for that stamp, not just the neglected one. Varieties which were "deliberately" issued and have received recognition in the catalogues (eg: perforation changes, stamps regularly issued with and without tagging, etc.) are not listed. Only the varieties on sheet and coil stamps have been listed. Booklet varieties are not included. An excellent treatment of booklets will be found in the catalogue compiled by Bill McCann (McCann, 1984).

Before presenting the list, I would like to make some general comments on each type of variety.

C - colour. This includes missing colours and major shades. It does not include doubling of a specific colour due to a blanket offset, a type of variety that occurs on lithographic stamps. It also excludes socalled "repellex" varieties because I do not believe such varieties are catalogable and in many cases I question whether they are genuine.

F - paper. This is limited to varieties which are distinguishable with the naked eye. The description of any varieties listed, however, usually mentions any major differences in the fluorescence as seen under an ultra-violet lamp. Ribbed paper varieties on stamps issued after 1970 are listed if the effect is easily seen. Ribbed paper exists on many stamps issued prior to 1970. In fact the 1954 QE II definitives come on both horizontally and vertically ribbed paper. I have arbitrarily omitted all of these.

G - gum. This includes stamps printed on the gum side and major differences in the gum (eg: gum arabic as opposed to PVA). P - printing. This includes all varieties caused by the printing method which are not covered under other categories. Examples include the 5¢ St. Lawrence Seaway with inverted centre, the missing surcharge on the 7¢ Jet Plane overprinted 8¢, and gutter pairs produced because a sheet was improperly guillotined. Excluded are catalogued varieties resulting from a change in printers (eg: 1972 \$1.00 Vancouver definitive, 1977 Floral definitives, 1978 50¢ Prairie Street Scene definitive. etc.). Jump strips on coils fall under printing varieties but are not listed because they are well recognized by the catalogues.

S - separation. This consists of major perforation errors. All the imperforate errors after 1953 are listed as are sheet stamps line perforated in one direction only. Also included are partly imperforate stamps produced because one row of perforations or one strike of the comb is missing (eg: the 1957 5¢ Mining Industry and the 1973 2¢, 6¢, and 8¢ Caricature definitives). Stamps with doubled perforations are not listed. Also excluded are perforation gauge changes since these are already catalogued. T - tagging. This consists of missing tagging varieties on stamps issued since 1984 and constant differences of at least 1 mm in the width of the tagging. For missing tagging varieties prior to 1984, refer to Ken Rose's handbook (Rose, 1984). Stamps regularly issued with and without tagging, and with both Winnipeg and general tagging are not listed.

V - plate. This consists of constant plate varieties, primarily those which are easily observable with the naked eye. Less noticable varieties are listed if they are important from a philatelic point of view. For example the "white dot in moustache" on the 1980 "O Canada" miniature pane might not normally be listed; however, it is important because it is constant on all the Three Composers stamps in the panes on which it appears, and indicates that Ashton-Potter used two red plates, one with and one without the variety, to print the stamps. The description identifies the position of the stamps in the pane, indicates if the flaw occurs on one or all the panes of the sheet (where known), and gives the Thirkell position of the flaw.

You can play a number of games with this list. The first game of course is trying to acquire all the varieties. Unfortunately the game will be very expensive and impossible to finish given the rarity of some of the items. The second game is to follow the prices of individual items and varieties of the same type in auctions, dealer lists, and catalogues. In many cases, you will find a surprisingly wide variance. I suggest you play the second game before the first. The third game will tell you just how good your favourite specialized catalogue is. Count the number of items in this list that

appear in your catalogue. Are there any catalogued varieties missing from this list? The final game is one which will not amuse the printers. In 1968 the post office abandoned its policy of awarding stamp printing contracts for extensive periods, and began giving contracts for individual stamps first to British American Bank Note Co. (BABN) and then to Ashton-Potter Ltd. in addition to Canadian Bank Note Co. (CBN). Count the number of major errors each company produced since 1970. This will provide considerable insight into the quality control exercised by these three security printers. The game is somewhat oversimplified because definitives are lumped together with commemoratives even though the latter have much smaller production runs. However I think one printer will stand out as being particularly negligent in its quality control.

Do you have varieties that are missing from this list? If so I would appreciate learning about them.

1897 Queen Victoria Maple Leaf definitives

3¢ Carmine

s1 - Imperf (issued by favour).

s2 - Imperf left margin. The leftmost column of perforations is missing on a sheet. The left margin of the stamps in column 1 is imperforate.

1927 Sixtieth Anniversary of Confederation

12¢ Map of Canada

s1 - Imperf (issued by favour).

s2 - Imperf vertically (issued by favour).

s3 - Imperf horizontally (issued by favour).

s4 - Imperf right margin. The right-most column of perforations is missing on one sheet. All ten stamps in column 5 of the pane have an imperforate right margin. (Saskatoon, 1982).

v1 - "Rosette crack". Marked hairlines running between stamps 9/3 and 9/4, 10/3 and 10/4 due to plate cracks.

20¢ Special Delivery

s1 - Imperf (issued by favour).

s2 - Imperf vertically (issued by favour).

- s3 Imperf horizontally (issued by favour).
- s4 Imperf top margin. The top row of perforations is missing on a sheet. The top margin of the stamps in row 1 is imperforate. (Saskatoon, 1982).

1942 King George VI War definitives

3¢ Rose violet

- p1 Gutter pair. A sheet from plate 10 was improperly guillotined leaving on two panes the vertical gutter and almost two columns of stamps from the ajoining panes (Wegg, 1971).
- s1 Imperf (issued by favour).

7¢ Airmail

- s1 Imperf (issued by favour).
- s2 Imperf right margin. The right-most column of perforations is missing on a sheet. The right margin of the ten stamps in column 5 is imperforate. (Saskatoon, 1982).

1949 King George VI with "POSTES - POSTAGE"

3¢ Rose violet

 p1 - Gutter pair. A sheet was improperly guillotined leaving on two panes the vertical gutter and a portion of the adjoining panes.

1950 definitives

50¢ Oil Resources

s1 - Imperf top margin. The top row of perforations in the sheet are missing. The top of the five stamps in row 1 is imperforate. (Saskatoon, 1982).

1953 definitives

50¢ Textile

- v1 9/1 Left vertical frame line retouched and engraver's slip at bottom left of the design (G1-H1). (Reiche, 1973).
- v2 10/2 Bottom frame line retouched and engraver's slip extending from below the third "A" of "CANADA" to the "T" of "POST-AGE" (G9-G10). (Reiche, 1973).

1954 definitives

3¢ QE II carmine rose

s1 - Imperf vertically. (Pugh, 1973).

4¢ QE II violet

p1 - Gutter pair. Bileski attributes this to a paper fold which occurred prior to guillotining the sheet. In one of its price lists, Saskatoon Coin and Stamp Centre Ltd. illustrates a block with two gutter pairs caused, it would appear, by a diagonal paper fold. (Bileski, 1975), (Saskatoon, 1981b).

5¢ QE II bright blue

- p1 Gutter pair. Bileski attributes this to paper fold which occurred prior to guillotining the sheet. This is the only example of this type of variety listed by the Canada Specialized. (Bileski, 1975), (Maresch, 1984).
- s1 Imperf vertically. (Saskatoon, 1980b).

15¢ Gannet

s1 - Imperf right margin. Listed in the Canada Specialized but otherwise not known to me. (Maresch, 1984).

1955 commemoratives

5¢ Whooping crane

 V1 - Cracked plate. Plate 1 developed a notable crack in the left pane margin opposite stamp 1/1 part way through the printing. It can be seen on UL plate blocks. (Pugh, 1973).

v2 - Repaired crack. The plate 1 crack was repaired. This appears as a 12 by 6 mm rectangular white area in the area of the crack. Much of the crack can still be seen. (Pugh, 1973).

1957 commemoratives

5¢ Loon

 v1 - 1/1 "Food for loon". There is a small dot in the water on the third ripple from the left edge of the design (top of F1).

5¢ Mining Industry

s1 - Imperf top margin. The top row of perforations is missing on a sheet. The top of the ten stamps in row 1 of the pane is imperforate.

1959 commemoratives

5¢ St. Lawrence Seaway

p1 - Inverted centre.

1962 QE II Cameo definitives

4¢ Red

p1 - Gutter pair. A sheet was improperly guillotined leaving on some panes the vertical gutter and part of the first column of stamps of the adjoining panes.

t1 - 8 mm centre band. The Winnipeg tagged stamp was originally issued with a 4 mm centre band.

t2 - 4 mm band on either the left side or the right side of the stamp.

5¢ Blue

s1 - Imperf. (Bileski, 1975).

s2 - Imperf horizontally.

1962 commemoratives

5¢ Education

 c1 - Red brown missing. Probably caused by a paper fold which occurred after the black ink had been printed and prevented the

red brown from being printed. (Pugh, 1973).

5¢ Jean Talon

p1 - Missing "5¢". The denomination is missing on the upper right stamp on one pane. The variety was probably caused by a paper fold prior to printing. (Saskatoon, 1981a).

1964 definitives

7¢ Jet Plane surcharged 8¢

p1 - Pair, one without the surcharge. Probably caused by a paper fold preventing the surcharge from being printed. According to an article by Mercantini, stamps 9/1 and 10/1 on one pane are without the surcharge. Thus only two pairs of the variety are known. (Mercantini, 1965).

1966 commemoratives

5¢ Newfoundland (Pitcher plant)

v1 - 9/1 "Petal flaw". There is a break in the red lines on the rightmost flower (C9). Occurs on all panes of the sheet. (Speirs, 1985).

1967 definitives

Note: the paper and gum difference are not listed as these are well treated in existing catalogues.

1¢ Brown, PVA gum, untagged

g1 - Printed on the gum side.

p1 - Gutter pair. It appears that a sheet was printed with the design shifted 7 mm to the left. It was then perforated and guillotined as though the colour shift had not occurred. As a result the right side of several panes includes the full gutter and part of the stamps from column 1 of the adjoining pane. (Knox, 1978).

6¢ Black, CBN printing, untagged g1 - Printed on the gum side.

6¢ Black, CBN printing, general tagged.

t1 - 3 mm wide phosphor bars. The general tagged stamp was originally issued with 4 mm bars.

6¢ Orange coil s1 - Imperf.

6¢ Black coil

s1 - Imperf.

7¢ Green coil s1 - Imperf.

8¢ Slate coil s1 - Imperf.

1969 commemoratives

6¢ International Labour Organization

f1 - Cream, dull fluorescent paper. The normal paper is white, hibrite.

6¢ Sir William Osler

 f1 - White, hibrite paper. The normal paper is cream, dull fluorescent.

6¢ Charlottetown

f1 - Cream, dull fluorescent paper. The normal paper is white, hibrite.

6¢ Christmas (children praying)

c1 - Black colour missing. (Bileski, 1975). Note: the printing of the 5¢ and 6¢ Christmas stamps was subcontracted by CBN to another printer, Rapid, Grip, and Batten. Imperfs of these stamps are from proofs released by the subcontractor. (Anonymous, 1977).

1970 commemortives

6¢ Group of Seven

v1 - 9/2 "Flaming tree". Red spot at the base of the second pair of evergreens from the left (G3, measured from the top of "Canada"). Constant on all panes.

1971 commemoratives

6¢ Maple Leaf in Spring

 s1 - Imperf. Several panes were discovered imperforate except for the bottom margin. (Bileski, 1975).

7¢ Maple Leaf in Autumn

c1 - Grey colour (lettering) missing. (Bileski, 1975).

7¢ Paul Kane

v1 - */1 "Tear in teepee". Diagonal black line at the top of the centre tent on all stamps in the first column (right edge of D6).

6¢ Christmas (snowflake)

f1 - Dull cream paper. Exists both untagged and Winnipeg tagged. The normal paper is white, hibrite.

1972 Landscape definitives

An excellent summary of the major printings and paper varieties was published in **Maple Leaves**. (Harris, 1979).

 A. Original issue, perf 12.4 by 11.9, Winnipeg tagged.

10¢ Forest

 f1 - Smooth paper. The normal paper is vertically ribbed.

Original issue, perf 12.4 by 11.9, general tagged, 3 mm wide tagging bars.

10¢ Forest

 f1 - Smooth paper. The normal paper is vertically ribbed.

15¢ Mountain Sheep

 f1 - Smooth paper. The normal paper is vertically ribbed.

v1 - 1/10 2 to 3 mm scratch which slices through the top right side of the mountain (A7). Occurs on one of the three panes on the cylinder. (Beaudet, 1984).

20¢ Prairie Farm

f1 - Smooth paper (note: this variety is actually on very lightly horizontally ribbed paper; a smooth paper exists but is extremely scarce). The normal paper is vertically ribbed.

25¢ Polar Bears

 f1 - Smooth paper (note: also exists on lightly horizontally ribbed paper). The normal paper is vertically ribbed.

50¢ Seashore

 f1 - Smooth paper. The normal paper is vertically ribbed.

C Perf 12.4 by 11.9, 4 mm wide tagging bars. The design of all values except the 20¢ is noticeably altered in some way. However even the 20¢ should be listed in the catalogues based on the wider tagging.

10¢ Forest

 f1 - Vertically ribbed paper. The normal paper is smooth, creamy, dull to low fluorescent.

f2 - Smooth, white, high fluorescent paper.

15¢ Mountain Sheep

 f1 - White, hibrite paper. The normal paper is creamy, dull to low fluorescent.

 v1 - 1/10 2 to 3 mm scratch which slices through the top right side of the mountain (A7). Occurs on one of the three panes on the cylinder. (Beaudet, 1984).

20¢ Prairie Farm

 f1 - Vertically ribbed paper. The normal paper is smooth, creamy, dull to low fluorescent.

f2 - Smooth, white, high fluorescent paper.

1972 high value definitives

\$1.00 Vancouver, Ashton-Potter and BABN printing (engraving and lithography, untagged)

fl - Horizontally ribbed paper. The

f1 - White, hibrite paper. The normal paper is smooth, creamy, dull to low fluorescent.

8¢ World Health Day

f1 - Horizontally ribbed dull paper. Occurs on untagged and general tagged stamps. The normal paper is smooth, high fluorescent. 8¢ Indians of the Plains - thunderbird and belt.

f1 - Smooth, high fluorescent paper. The normal paper is vertically ribbed, dull to low fluorescent. Comes on both the untagged and general tagged stamps.

8¢ Indians of the Plains - costume

f1 - Smooth, high fluorescent paper. The normal paper is vertically ribbed, dull to low fluorescent. Comes on both the untagged and general tagged stamps.

8¢ Krieghoff

v1 - */4 "Broken door frame". Horizontal black mark in the door frame at right on all stamps in column 4 (F12). Occurs on both the untagged and general tagged stamps.

 f1 - Dull fluorescent, horizontally ribbed paper. The normal paper is smooth and varies from null to medium fluorescent.

- f1 Dull fluorescent, horizontally ribbed paper. The normal paper is smooth and varies from dull to medium fluorescent.
- g1 Printed on the gum side. (Smith, 1977).
- s1 Part imperf. The bottom perforation strike is missing on some panes. The bottom horizontal

The bird on the totem is not coloured but the design is embossed in the paper. I believe this is an inking variety and not a constant flaw on the black engraved cylinder. If it were a cylinder flaw, there would not be any embossing.

f1 - Creamy, dull fluorescent paper. The normal paper is white, high fluorescent and there is a scarce white, medium fluorescent shade.

\$2.00 Olympics ("Diver" by R. Tait McKenzie)

f1 - Creamy, dull fluorescent paper. The normal paper is white, high fluorescent and there is a scarce white, medium fluorescent shade.

8¢ Subarctic Indians - artifacts

s1 - Part imperf. This stamp was perforated left-right by CBN with a 1 row H comb. The strike separating the stamps in the fourth and fifth columns was shifted right by 30 mm leaving the right half of the stamps in column 4 and the left half of the stamps in column 5 imperforate. (Robertson, 1976).

8¢ Subarctic Indians - way of life

 s1 - Part imperf. This stamp was issued se-tenant with the artifacts stamp and thus comes with the same perforation variety.

8¢ Subarctic Indians - costume

v1 - "Smallpox" flaw. Most stamps on certain panes have a smattering of red dots spread over the design. Although the dots vary from stamp to stamp on the pane, they are constant from one pane to the next.

8¢ Lucy Maud Montgomery

v1 - 3/3 "Albino hair" flaw. Vertical, curly white scratch just above the girl's head (border of C5-C6). Constant on one of the four panes of the sheet. This flaw occurs on both philatelic and post office stock, but not on the proof sheets.

8¢ Louis Hemon

 v1 - 3/2 "Red light in window". Red spot in the window next to the door (F2). Constant on one of the four panes of the sheet.

8¢ Marguerite Bourgeoys

f1 - Smooth paper, comes in two fluorescent shades, dull and low. The normal paper is dull fluorescent, horizontally ribbed.

 v1 - 2/1 "Red thumb" flaw. Red spot on Bourgeoy's thumb (border of H6-H7). Constant on one of the three panes of the sheet. Occurs on all papers.

8¢ Alphonse Desigrdins

f1 - Smooth paper, comes in two fluorescent shades, dull and low. The normal paper is dull fluorescent, horizontally ribbed.

25¢ Olympics Field Sports (running) Note: stamps with the lettering in greenish blue rather than the normal reddish grey are colour changlings.

50¢ Olympics Field Sports (hurdling)

f1 - Creamy, dull fluorescent paper. The normal paper is white, high fluorescent.

8¢ Calgary

v1 - 4/* Blue dot in the "n" of "Canada" on all five stamps in row 4
 (A3). Constant on all panes.

8¢ + 2¢ Olympics Combat Sports (fencing)

s1 - Part imperf. The bottom perforation strike is missing on some panes. The bottom horizontal perforations of the ten stamps in row 5 are missing as well as half the vertical perforations and all

those in the pane margin. (Saskatoon, 1982).

8¢ Supreme Court

gl - Dark green gum. The normal gum is pale green.

1976 Commemoratives

8¢ + 2c Olympics Team and Gym Sports (basketball)

s1 - Imperf top margin. The perforation strike at the top of the pane is missing. The top margin of the ten stamps in row 1 and the top pane margin are imperf.

8¢ Royal Military College (cadet with sword)

c1 - Design doubled. All the colours are printed twice as though the sheet went through the press twice. One impression is shifted about 4 mm with respect to the other. (Bileski, 1982).

s1 - Part imperf. This stamp was perforated top-bottom by CBN using a 1 row H comb. On at least one pane, the perforations separating rows 2 and 3 were shifted down 25 mm and the next strike was shifted down 11 mm. Although this variety is a perforation shift rather than a missing strike of the comb, it left a large part of the stamps in row 2 imperforate. (Saskatoon, 1980b).

 v1 - 4/5 "Extra flagstaff". Vertical black line between the left and main towers (I3-H3). Constant on all panes. (Beaudet, 1981b).

 c1 - Design doubled. This stamp was issued se-tenant with the previous one and has the same doubled impression variety.

s1 - Part imperf. Same variety as the previous stamp.

- c1 Red colour and tagging omitted.

 The red colour is missing on two panes, most of the third, and part of a fourth. The tagging is also missing on these panes. The missing red can be simulated by exposing the stamp to sunlight for several weeks. (Bileski, 1982).
- v1 1/1 "Raised eyebrow". There is a grey band over the Queen's eyebrow (C2-C3). Constant on one of the six panes of the cylinder.

c1 - Purple engraved colour missing.
 In addition, the horizontal per-

forations are shifted down 4 mm and the pane was improperly guillotined. The result looks like printer's waste. (Venus, 1980).

- s1 Imperf and part imperf. Several panes were found with blind perforations or no perforations at all in the lower left corner. On some of the affected panes, stamps 10/1 and 10/2 are imperforate between and on one or more other sides. (Saskatoon, 1982), (Beaudet, 1982).
- v1 1/1 "Raised eyebrow". There is a grey band over the Queen's eyebrow (C2-C3). Constant on one of the six panes of the cylinder.

v2 - 6/5 "Queen's goatee". Dark area around the Queen's chin (bottom half of D2). Constant on one of the six panes of the grey cylinder. Occurs on engraved cylinder 2 printings.

v3 - 9/9 "Crying Queen". Black dot below the Queen's eye (bottom of C2). Constant on one of the six panes on the cylinder.

32¢ Dark blue, grey, and black (or is it very dark blue?)

v1 - */9 "Comet" flaw. This flaw is produced on the cylinder which prints the phosphor bars. To the left of the tenth bar, there is a phosphor spot preceded by a long tail. This flaw may occur on any stamp in the ninth column of the pane. (Beaudet, 1984).

v1 - 9/4 Red dot between the two stones holding up the three top stones (D9). Constant on one pane of the sheet.

s1 - Part imperf. This stamp was perforated left-right by CBN using a 1 row H comb. The third strike of the comb is missing on at least one pane leaving the right side of the ten stamps in column 2 and the left side of the ten stamps in column 3 imperforate. (Empire, 1978).

17¢ Canadian Authors - Frederick P. Grove Note: this and the se-tenant Emile Nellingan stamp were printed by CBN using six colour lithography. The Canada Specialized lists the pair with two colours doubled. Examples illustrated in a Maresch private treaty sale catalogue indicate that the doubling is shifted by different amounts throughout the pane. Because not all colours are doubled and because of the non-constant shift, I suspect this variety is caused by a blanket offset and should not be catalogued. (Maresch, 1982), (Maresch, 1984).

s1 - Imperf and part perf. Four panes were found in Quebec with the first column and the left half of the second imperforate. This stamp was perforated left-right by CBN using a 1 row H comb. On the partly imperforate panes, the two leftmost strikes are missing. (Anonymous, 1980), (Knox, 1980).

Although the dots vary from stamp to stamp on the pane, they are constant from one pane to the next. The dots are most easily seen on the white background of the tent stamp, but they also exist on the se-tenant igloo stamp.

17¢ Christmas - wooden horse

p1 - Gutter pair. A large paper fold occurred on one sheet after it was perforated but before it was guillotined. As a result, one pane comes with right gutter (including one pane inscription) and the majority of the top two rows of the adjacent pane. The fold produced two gutter pairs. (Saskatoon, 1984).

35¢ Christmas - knitted doll

c1 - Gold colour missing. (Anonymous, 1981).

1980 commemoratives

17¢ "O Canada" - Three Composers

v1 - "Phantom inscriptions". On some panes there is a faint in-

scription in the three corners without the regular inscription. (Beaudet, 1981a).

v2 - */* "Dot in moustache". On the same panes as the "phantom inscriptions", there is a white dot in the red moustache of the left-most composer on all the Three Composers stamps in the pane. (Beaudet, 1981a).

35¢ Inuit - spirits (shaman)

v1 - 6/2 "Frostbitten toe". A quarter of the middle toe of the shaman's foot is blue rather than black (H10). Occurs on all panes of the sheet.

17¢ Christmas (Christmas post cards)

v1 - 8/4 Black scratch through the first "S" of "CHRISTMAS" and "E" of "NOEL" (H4-13-14). Occurs on one pane of the sheet. (Beaudet, 1981c).

1981 Maple Leaf definitives

f1 - BABN and CBN were awarded contracts to print this stamp simultaneously. BABN printed it on thick, coated paper with a white glossy surface while CBN used a thin, uncoated creamy paper.

 c1 - Exhibits the same colour variations as the 1893 map stamp since they were issued se-tenant.

30¢ Constitution

v1 - 8/3 There is a phosphor guideline in the bottom pane margin
below stamp 8/3. Note that the
pane has eight and not ten rows
of stamps. The guideline is a
cross with the horizontal member
11 mm long and the vertical
member 2 mm long. It was incorrectly placed in the pane margin rather than the part of the
sheet which is cut off and discarded as waste.

35¢ RCMP

 v1 - 1/4 "Red thread" flaw. A long irregular red hairline wanders in the background above the policeman's horse. (Sullivan, 1984).

60¢ Airplane - Fokker Super Universal

s1 - Imperf right margin. The perforation strike on the right margin of the pane is missing on several panes. The ten stamps in column 5 are imperf on the right side as is the right pane margin. (Beaudet, 1983).

s1 - Imperf right margin. This stamp was issued se-tenant with the Fokker Super Universal stamp and shares the same perforation error.

g1 - Printed on the gum side. (Beaudet, 1985a).

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The "Admiral" Booklets of Canada



Part V - The Three-Cent Carmine

The three cent carmine Admiral booklet stamp was the last one issued for booklet use. This booklet was issued early in December of 1923 and initially utilized the left-over covers of the 3¢ brown (Photo #1), thus the reason for the brown covers with a spine. Later editions had the appropriate red covers in both, English and French, with only a staple and without the spine.

The stamps were printed from plates 1 to 4 of 168 subjects each. There were two panes of 4 stamps each in the 3,027,000 English and 168,000 French booklets. In addition to the single value booklets the 3¢ carmine stamps were also incorporated into combination booklets. Single value booklet panes were 68 mm x 50 mm while those incorporated into combi-

nation booklets were 71 mm x 50 mm (Photo #2). There is also a difference in the thickness of the paper on which the two were printed with the combination booklet stamps being on much thinner paper than in the single value booklets.

Postal rates for domestic mails were the same as to the U.S.A. as seen on the illustrated cover mailed on March 27, 1924 (Photo #3). Of the "exotic" covers we have a re-directed registered letter using a strip of two booklet pane stamps from top and two from the lower row side by side (Photo #4).

The Imperial rate between July 1, 1926 and December 25, 1928 was 3¢, seen here paid with a 3¢ carmine Admiral booklet pane stamp (Photo #5).



3c postal letter rate to the U.S.A. prepaid by means of an Admiral tooklet pane stamp from the upper right corner of a pane. It is characterized by the meeting of the straight upper horizontal edge with the straight right vertical edge.

The letter originated at 5:00 P.M. on March 27, 1924 at Chatham, Ontario and was addressed to Hamilton, Ohio.

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36 Government Rd., Toronto, Ontario, Canada, M8X 1V9 The 12s registered letter rate to the U.S.A. (2s letter rate established July 1, 1926 and the 10s registration fee) in prepayment of a letter from Vancouver, B.C. to Newton, Mass. and rerouted to Magnolia, Mass., 8 miles South of Cloucester, Mass Newton, west of Boston, is approximately 50 miles South-West of Gloucester.

Letter originated at Vancouver on September 25, 1926, arrived at Seattle, Wash. on September 26, Newton, Mass. on October 1, 1926 and transferred to Gloucester on the same day. There was, apparently local delivery, rural route, from the Gloucester postal station to Magnolia.

The stamps used for prepayment were from the 3¢ carmine booklet pane, a pair from the upper row and the pair from the lower row, side by side.

As of July 1, 1926 the universal letter rate was 3¢ to all destinations. This letter from Toronto, Ontario to London, England was mailed on January 18, 1928. Prepayment was by means of a 3¢ Carmine Admiral booklet stamp from the centre of the upper row of a pane.

The return to the Z: Empire rate was not until December 25, 1928.

Second Combination Booklet

The second combination booklet consisted of one pane of four stamps each of the 1¢ yellow, 2¢ green and 3¢ carmine. There was a total of 1,791,000 English and 86,000 French booklets issued in December of 1923. In effect the booklet composition was much the same as that of the first combination booklet except that 3¢ brown was replaced by the 3¢ carmine Admiral (Photo #6). The booklets were in covers stapled without a spine.

The 1¢ yellow in the first combination

booklet was printed on thicker paper than in the second and, in fact, the second had almost a translucent quality. The frame size of the pane in the first combination booklet was 71 mm x 50 mm while in the second it was 68 mm x 50 mm (Photo #7).

Stamps of the 2¢ green Admirals in both booklets follow the same recognition points as those of the 1¢ yellow above (Photo #8).

This concludes the Admiral booklets of Canada.



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
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A REGULAR FEATURE

What is believed to be a new forgery of the 5¢ Beaver stamp has been seen with a grid cancel. The engraved forgery has the following characteristics which should easily identify it:

- the "R" of "VR" is leaning toward the left side.
- the beaver has no visible ears,
- both numerals have a curved top tail,
- the cross above the crown stands separated,
- the trees on the right side are unclear, and
- the diameter of the cancel is 24 mm.

The Canadian catalogue scene is becoming more and more confusing. Many attempts at improvement have been tried, but to date all have failed. The differently-owned and edited catalogues each use their own system and none is very useful to the majority of readers. The structure is such that all have major faults, often making it difficult to locate information at a glance. The layout is poor in many cases, espcially when dividing grades and varieties clearly. Here there seems to be confusion as to what should be included for general or specialized use. That decision should be made before a catalogue is prepared, and not afterwards, which appears to be the case with existing catalogues.

The present situation has lead to an almost The so-called general comical point. catalogues include major and minor varieties, but in one case deleting major general issues. The specialized ones include varieties, but in some instances omit those which are even included in the general catalogues. Numbering of varieties is also a major problem. The worst is the catalogue which omits most of the reference numbers for varieties, making easy reference impossible. Major imperf. issues such as the Admirals, are listed in some as pairs, in another no indication is given, and still others omit them completely.

With the advances in information systems, it appears strange that none have taken the step to integrate their numbering system into an automated system. Michel has led the way in catalogue automation and it is only a matter of time before others will follow this trend, even if it requires some catalogue numbering adjustments.

Two catalogues give almost no indication of how to grade stamps, and one which does, does not seem to understand the basic principles, including for example damaged stamps under "good" condition. It is about time that a grading system in the form of an illustrated matrix was included in every catalogue. It should include all grades and the "hinged" factor must be included.

The pricing is yet another example of the current confusion. Each individual catalogue has the right to price stamps as they see fit, but there remain some very strange prices in many catalogues. The pricing often appears to have little relevance to the actual market. When market prices take a dip, those in catalogues appear to do just the opposite! Of course, catalogue pricing is done many months before publication and this can influence the pricing. But there are some prices which must be typographical errors, but having been repeated in successive editions, they give the appearance of being legitimate. These include: a single coil priced higher than a pair, a block of four price lower than three singles, a "fine" grade price lower than "good", a more elusive shade variety priced lower than the regular shade, etc.

And ... what about the colour reproduction? ... in many cases, horrible!! The reason is unclear because good colour reproduction today is not a problem unless corners have been cut for sake of cost. And this brings up the question whether one can rely on the printed colour

to selecting a stamp? Take Newfoundland as an example. The description "Prince of Wales" does not indicate if this means voilet brown, gray brown, brown, or brown lilac. Reproductions are so poor that these cannot be used for identification. What should the collector do?

Myself and others have tried for years to advise catalogue editors but to no avail. What is your opinion?

RECENT ISSUES



August 30, 1985

Louis Hebert, the first French apothecary in the New World, and the man Canadian pharmacists consider the father of their profession, was featured on a 34¢ stamp released on 30 August.

The stamp also pays tribute to the 45th International Congress of Pharmaceutical Sciences of the International Pharmaceutical Federation which was held in Montreal in early September.

Ashton-Potter printed 18 million stamps, designed by Clermont Malenfant of Montreal.



September 3, 1985

The Inter-Parliamentary Union is the focus of a 34¢ stamp issued on 3 September.

Founded in Europe in 1889 to promote international peace and Co-operation, some 700 delegates from 103 countries attended this year's meeting in Ottawa. Ashton-Potter printed 18 million stamps depicting a stylized map of the world over the Centre Block and Peace Tower of the Canadian Parliament Buildings.



September 12, 1985

Canadian Girl Guides were honoured on the 75th anniversary of their founding with a 34¢ stamp issued on 12 September.

Guiding was first established in England in 1909 by Lord Robert Baden-Powell, who appointed his sister Agnes to lead the organization. His wife Olave organized the movement at the international level. It is estimated that more than 275,000 young girls participate in Guiding in Canada.

Printed by British American Bank Note in a quantity of 18 million, the design illustrates a Guide and a Brownie in their colourful uniforms.

(Information for this column has been hampered in recent months due to the fact that Canada Post has been releasing its new issue bulletins after the stamps have been issued. — Ed)

1986 STAMP PROGRAM

Judge Rene J. Marin, Chairman of the Board, recently announced Canada Post's stamp program for next year. At this early stage the program is generally very tentative, and will undoubtedly go through many revisions.

At first glance the program appears to be a relatively good mix of historical, topical and Canadian achievements in various fields. Both EXPO '86 in Vancouver and the 1988 Calgary Winter Olympics will be promoted through new stamp issues. A listing of the complete program follows.

CANADA POST CELLO-PAQS AND SOUVENIR ARTICLES, - Section 5 of a series making up, The Canadian Stamp Handbook edited by Michael Milos and prepared by C.F. Black, published by Unitrade Assoicates, 127 Cartwright Ave., Toronto, Ont. M6A 1V4, 15.3 cm x 23 cm, 22 unnumbered pages, black and white illustrated, three hole punched for loose leaf insertion into a binder, \$3.95. Available from dealers or the publishers. (If ordering by mail include \$1.00 for postage and handling.)

The 5th section of the Canadian Stamp Handbook series was released in early summer. This is a very interesting listing of Celo-Pags and souvenir articles such as Stamp Cases, the History Card series issued from 1959 - 1972, souvenir booklets of Canadian Stamps as well as Annual Souvenir Collections of Canada postage stamps. Also included are books and novelty items. All items listed contained genuine Canadian stamps and were offered to the public at large by Canada Post. The listings are comprehensive and include technical aspects such as printers, papers, paq inscriptions as well as prices for all items and varieties listed in this section. Many items show the quantities issued and the date they first became available. Primary Scott catalogue numbers are used throughout the section.

Philatelists who already have other sections of the Canadian Stamp Handbook such as the Admirals 1911-1925, the Centennials 1967-1973 etc. will want to add this section. Most philatelists have many of the items listed. This section is therefore of interest to all collectors of Canadian stamps. Matching binders to hold sections of the Canadian Stamp Handbook are available at \$4.95 per binder. Further sections of the handbook are planned for release from time to time in the future. Unitrade Associates are to be commended for their initiative in assembling sections that will eventually be a comprehensive handbook of Canadian philately. (JEK)

CANADA SPECIALIZED STAMP CATA-LOGUE, 1986, 11th Edition. Published and edited by William H.P. Maresch and Arthur Leggett of Canada Specialized Ltd., 330 Bay St., Suite 703, Toronto, Ont. M5H 2S8. Distributed by Lighthouse Publications (Canada) Ltd., 210 Victoria Ave., (Westmount), Montreal, Que., H3Z 2M4. 12.1 cm x 21.3 cm., 157 Pages, Black and white illustrated, soft bound, \$7.50.

The 1986 Canadian Specialized catalogue of retail prices of British North America has several new sections. The Four Hole Perforated O.H.M.S. Officials have been listed for the first time since 1979. These were dropped from the 1980 edition due to the numerous forgeries that appeared in the late 1970's. A listing of the Five Hole Officials has been added. Another new section is a Commemorative Index to assist the philatelist in locating a stamp by its subject matter. A listing of the Bahamas Special Delivery Stamps used on cover from Canada has been provided. The Specimens of the 1897 Jubilee issue are now listed and priced. Newfoundland Complete Booklets are listed.

Many revisions and additions have been noted throughout the catalogue. Cover prices have been extended to the 1898 Map stamp. New dates of issue for the Leaf, Numeral and Admiral issues are noted.

The "Canadian Numbering System" has been used throughout the catalogue. For those philatelists using the Scott numbering system a cross index (Scott Numbers) is provided on Pages 119 and 120. A major revision of numbering has taken place in this edition. The old "Canadian System" numbers have been retained in italics beside the new "Canadian" numbers. It is apparent that the Canadian Numbering System known as (CS), has undergone a major revision. The system reflects recognition of all stamps available for use by the public. Only postage dues, officials etc. have been left at the back of the book. Philatelists will be the ones who will eventually accept or

reject the (CS) system. It appears more and more that this will become the acceptable system even though many philatelists insist that Canada's first stamp was the ½ Large Queen of 1868 (CS No. 18) (SCOTT No. 21) and not the Province of Canada's 3 pence Beaver. (J.E.K.)

POST OFFICES OF ALBERTA, edited by William G. Robinson, 5830 Cartier St., Vancouver, B.C. V6M 3A7, 60 pages, paperback. \$10 plus \$1 postage from the author.

This checklist follows the format introduced in the earlier companion volume dealing with Post Offices of British Columbia. It lists an identification code for each office, the name and any change in name or status, date established or closed, type of cancellations used, and a physical location according to the Dominion Lands Surveys system.

This volume does not include the rarity factors contained in the B.C. book as at the present time there is insufficient data to make the listing a significant one. Similarly, MOON's and POCON's will be included when more data is available.

Bill is to be congratulated on the amount of time and work it takes to produce such a comprehensive listing, one which any collector with an interest in Canadian postal history will certainly appreciate.

THE AEROGRAMMES OF AUSTRALIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES, 1944-1980, by Robert C. Stein. Published by the American Philatelic Society, P.O. Box 8000, State College, PA 16803. 18 cm x 26 cm, illus., 188 pgs., hardbound. \$20.00 US (\$16.00 for APS members) from the APS.

Given the geographical location of Australia and its dependencies and the impact of World War II on airmail service, it is little wonder that these territories have had a varied usage of aerogrammes.

This well-researched work not only catalogues the various aerogrammes, but it chronicles their historical basis for development and describes their production, distribution and usage. Covered in this work are the following: Australia, Australian Antarctic Territory, Christmas Island, Cocos (Keeling) Islands, Nauru, Norfolk Island, Papua New Guinea, British Solomon Islands, Fiji, Gilbert

& Ellice Islands, New Hebrides and Vietnam.

The book defines and categorizes the 84 species of aerogrammes produced by or under contract with the Australian postal authorities, including definitive, commemorative (including Christmas-related), military, official, stampless and territorial. Nearly 100 examples are illustrated.

Where known, specific information is given concerning first day of issue, history and design, format, dimensions, paper, printing, varieties, special flights, cachets and cancellations. With its additional data and notes on reference literature, this book is a must for Australian aerogramme collectors, or anyone wishing to delve deeper into this most interesting part of philately.

STANLEY GIBBONS STAMP CATA-LOGUE, Part 21, SOUTH EAST ASIA, 2nd ed. Published by Stanley Gibbons Publications, Unit 5 Parkside, Christchurch Road, Ringwood, Hants BH 24 3SH England. 14.5 cm x 21.5 cm, x + 295 pages, illus., flexible cover, 1985. \$26.95 Cdn.

Perhaps more than any other single Gibbons catalogue, this part is a definite must for any collector of this area, as it lists stamps and countries such as Vietnam, Kampuchea and Laos not adequately covered in Scott's.

There are also extensive revisions in the Philippines section with regard to modern varieties and errors, and substantial price revisions as well. Other countries include Bhutan, Burma, Indonesia, Nepal and Thailand.

STANLEY GIBBONS SIMPLIFIED CAT-ALOGUE, STAMPS OF THE WORLD, 1986 EDITION, Volume 1, Countries A-J. Published by Stanley Gibbons Publications, Unit 5 Parkside, Christchurch Road, Ringwood, Hants BH24 3SH England. 21.3 cm x 30.4, 1088 pages, soft bound, 1985. \$22.95 Cdn.

Over 3700 stamps and 950 illustrations have been added to this new volume, and this only includes about half the world! Significant price revisions have been noted for China, Denmark, Faroes, Finland, Greece, Greenland, Hungary and Iceland.

This catalogue (and its Volume 2 companion due in late October) remains ideal for the worldwide or topical collector.

STANLEY GIBBONS PART 1 BRITISH COMMONWEALTH CATALOGUE, 1986 edn. Published as above. 21.5 cm x 30.5 cm, xiv + 880 pages, illus., hardbound. \$35.00 Cdn.

The perennial favourite "red book" has once again reached North America and has again proven that the British can do a better job on Commonwealth stamps than their American counterparts. Especially with Scott's disastrous Volume 1 this year, for those collectors who have never given Gibbons a chance, perhaps more than ever now would be a good time!

To commemorate the 50th anniversary of the first 'omnibus' issue, coverage of the vignette plate varieties on the 1935 Silver Jubilee issue has been expanded. Notes have also been added on various countries experimental "frama" labels, including Canada's "stick 'n tick" experiments.

Following catalogue policy, the issues of Bequia, Union, Cayes of Belize and the various Tuvalu outer islands have been accorded Appendix listings only.

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
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
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
