

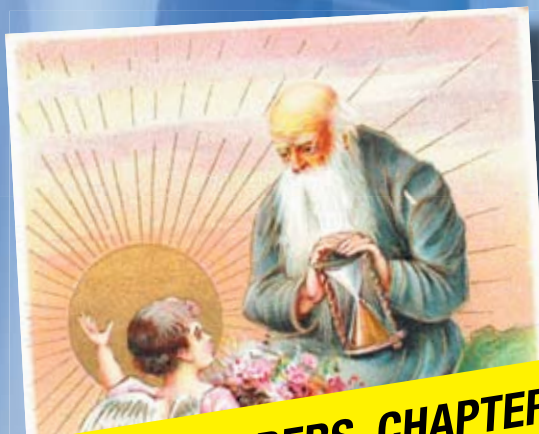

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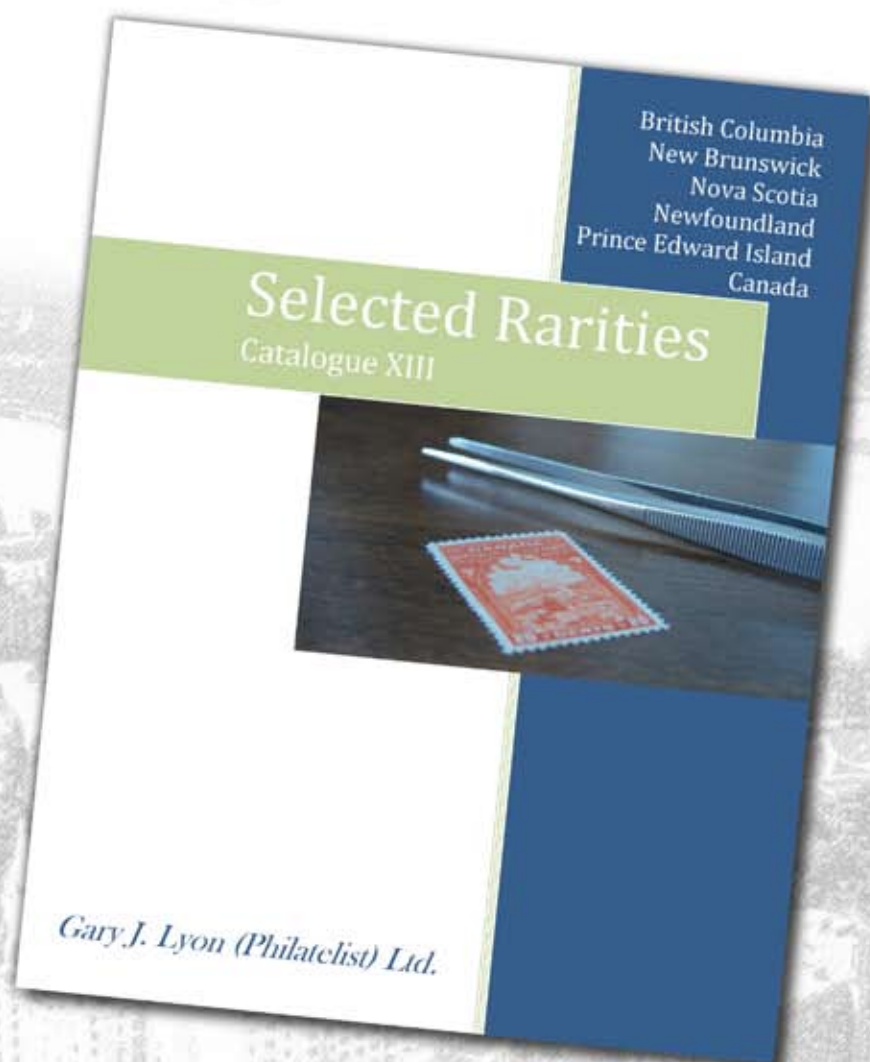

THE CANADIAN PHILATELIST - The international award winning bi-monthly magazine of The RPSC, it provides stamp collectors information and news – for members and from the members. Each year, the author of the best article published in *The Canadian Philatelist* receives the Geldert medal.

PERSONAL COLLECTION INSURANCE - Group insurance is available for members to obtain coverage for their personal collections. Chapters can arrange third party liability coverage to protect the club and its events. Both policies have substantially lower premiums than non-members would pay for similar packages. Details are available on both types of insurance, upon request, from the National Office.

SALES CIRCUIT - The Sales Circuit is a useful method of disposing of surplus material and acquiring other material for your collection. Details on request.

ANNUAL MEETING - An annual convention held in a different locale each year provides an ideal opportunity to meet friends, exchange ideas, and get advice on your collection or exhibition at which exhibitors can qualify for international shows. Has your primary collection reached a point where you are unable to expand it because the material you need is either not available or it is prohibitively expensive? If so, you are not alone. If you still derive pleasure from owning it, giving up on it completely, or selling it, might not be an appealing option.

But ignoring it on your bookshelf or keeping it locked away is practically guaranteed to cause you to lose interest in it. Sooner or later most collectors will lose interest in a collection that they do not work on actively. What, then, is the solution?

One answer may be to cast a wider net and expand the collection by adding collateral material.

For example, one study group that I belong to specializes in squared circle cancellations. These attractive cancellations came into use in 1893. Some of these strikes have survived in very limited quantities, either on stamps or on covers, and there are simply not enough to go around for all the collectors that want them. One solution, then, is to look at cancels in concurrent use.

Used during the squared circle hammer era were the two- and three-ring circular date stamps known as orbs. The first orb cancellations appeared in 1891 and were used alongside squared circle strikes throughout much of their lifetimes although in significantly fewer post offices. They were used only in large city post offices such as, for example, Ottawa, Montreal and Toronto; the little town of Seaforth, Ontario, is a notable exception. To compensate for the few offices that made use of orb cancels, several of them had multiple hammers assigned to them that can be differentiated from one another and provide a challenging area of study.

Of course, there were other handstamps in use alongside the squared circle hammers such as the popular circular date stamps, split rings, duplexes and many others, to say nothing of the machine cancels that also came into use at several of Canada's largest post offices only three years after the squared circle hammers were introduced.

Any one of these obliterations can, arguably, serve as material for a collateral collection. I have

Vous est-il difficile d'ajouter quoi que ce soit à votre collection de base parce que les pièces dont vous avez besoin ne sont pas disponibles ou parce qu'elles vous sont offertes à un coût prohibitif? Si oui, vous n'êtes pas le seul. Si votre collection vous procure toujours du plaisir, la perspective de la remettre ou de la vendre n'est sûrement pas reluisante.

Mais si vous laissez la poussière s'accumuler sur votre collection où si vous la gardez sous clé, il est à peu près certain que votre intérêt va diminuer avec le temps. Tôt ou tard, un collectionneur délaisse la collection à laquelle il ne se consacre pas activement. Quelle est donc la solution?

Vous pourriez peut-être lancer votre filet plus loin et agrandir votre collection en lui ajoutant du matériel connexe.

Par exemple, un des cercles d'étude auquel je participe se spécialise dans les oblitérations en cercle encadré. Ces attrayantes oblitérations sont apparues en 1893 et certaines d'entre elles n'ont survécu qu'en très petites quantités sur des timbres ou sur des plis. Il n'y en a tout simplement pas assez pour satisfaire tous les collectionneurs qui les recherchent. Une solution serait alors de considérer les autres sortes d'oblitérations utilisées à la même époque.

On utilisait, durant la période des cachets d'oblitération en cercle encadré, le cachet à date circulaire à deux ou trois cercles connus en anglais sous le nom de *orb* (globe). Les premières oblitérations à date circulaire sont apparues en 1891 et ont été utilisées parallèlement aux oblitérations en cercle encadré durant la plus grande partie de l'existence de ces dernières, mais dans un nombre restreint de bureaux de poste. On ne les utilisait que dans les bureaux de poste des grandes villes comme Ottawa, Montréal et Toronto; mais, la petite ville de Seaforth, en Ontario, est une exception digne de mention. Pour compenser le fait que peu de bureaux utilisaient les oblitérations à date circulaire, plusieurs d'entre eux s'étaient vus confier de nombreux cachets que l'on peut différencier les uns des autres et qui peuvent présenter un champ d'études stimulant.

Bien sûr, on utilisait d'autres oblitérations parallèlement aux oblitérations en cercle encadré; citons le populaire cachet à date circulaire, l'oblitération en cercle interrompu, les duplex et bien d'autres, sans parler des oblitérations à la machine qui sont apparues dans les grands bureaux de postes du Canada seulement trois ans après l'introduction des oblitérations en cercle encadré.

Toutes ces oblitérations peuvent sans doute servir de matériel pour une collection parallèle. Je me suis uniquement

merely zeroed in on the orbs as they have much in common with squared circles, such as the two and three rings that served much the same purpose (to cancel the postage stamp) as the horizontal bars and side pieces of the squared circle hammer.

With a bit of imagination, we can all come up with ideas to keep our interest alive in a seemingly dormant collection that pumped our adrenalin when we first began assembling it and has given us so much pleasure over the years.

Philately is known as the King of Hobbies and the Hobby of Kings. And for good reason. Counted among noted individuals that have pursued and enjoyed our great hobby are kings and presidents. Two of them, King George V and Franklin Delano Roosevelt, figure prominently in articles featured in our first issue for 2012.

Longtime author Joseph Monteiro reviews the stamp releases for the LONDON 2010 FESTIVAL OF STAMPS honouring King George V. Also known as the Philatelist King, he assembled a 328-album collection during his lifetime.

The 1897 Diamond Jubilee issue is without a doubt one of Canada's most controversial philatelic releases. Including two denominations that were instantly recognized as ideal for financial speculation, post offices, especially in Toronto and other large centers, were hard pressed to keep a semblance of order while customers overwhelmed staff that was largely unprepared to meet the demand for the ½- and 6-cent values. Lane Robson reviews some of the contemporary literature that describes the mayhem at one Toronto post office and how local law enforcement officials attempted to cope with the unruly clients crowding postal counters and the lineup of people that extended down the street.

We hope that our other selections in this edition will be equally informative and of interest, perhaps even entertaining.

concentré sur les oblitérations à date circulaire, car elles ont plusieurs choses en commun avec les cercles encadrés, notamment les deux ou trois anneaux qui servaient essentiellement à la même chose (l'oblitération du timbre-poste) que les barres horizontales et les côtés du cachet d'oblitération en cercle encadré.

Avec un peu d'imagination, nous pouvons tous trouver des idées pour raviver notre intérêt pour une collection qui semble endormie, mais qui a bel et bien soulevé notre enthousiasme lorsque nous avons commencé à la bâtir et qui nous a procuré un immense plaisir au cours des ans.

La philatélie est reconnue, avec raison, comme le roi des passe-temps et le passe-temps des rois. Elle compte en effet, parmi ceux qui ont éprouvé le grand plaisir de s'y consacrer, des rois et des présidents. Deux d'entre eux, le roi Georges V et Franklin Delano Roosevelt, occupent une place de choix dans des articles de notre premier numéro de 2012.

Notre collaborateur de longue date, Joseph Monteiro, se penche sur les timbres émis à lors du festival des timbres de Londres de 2010 et qui honorent le roi Georges V. Connu sous le nom de « Roi philatéliste », il a rassemblé au cours de sa vie une collection de timbres répartie en 328 albums.

La série du Jubilé de diamant de 1897 est sans conteste l'une des plus controversée du Canada. Deux de ses valeurs nominales furent identifiées sur le champ comme idéales pour la spéculation financière. Les bureaux de poste, spécialement à Toronto et dans les grands centres, furent bien en peine de maintenir un semblant d'ordre pendant que les clients pressaient de toute part un personnel qui n'était, dans l'ensemble, aucunement préparé pour répondre à la demande pour les valeurs de 1/2- et de 6-cents. Lane Robson revoit certains extraits d'écrits contemporains qui soulignent le désordre qui a sévi dans l'un des bureaux de poste de Toronto et de quelle manière les principaux responsables des forces de l'ordre essayèrent de maîtriser la foule indisciplinée qui envahissait les comptoirs postaux ainsi que la file de gens qui s'étirait dans la rue.

Nous espérons que vous trouverez les autres articles de cette édition aussi instructifs, intéressants et même amusants.

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DEAR EDITOR,

I enjoyed the recent article "The Postal History of Kananaskis, Alberta", especially because I have done some hiking in this beautiful area, as well as having an uncle who was interned there during WW II! As a Scouter, however, I must point out that the section "Other Special Events" was woefully inadequate and inaccurate! The article states "The Alberta Scouts hosted a provincial jamboree in the valley in 1993....." No further mention is made of Scouting activities there, when in fact Kananaskis was the site of three of Canada's largest jamborees. In 1981, the 5th Canadian Jamboree "CJ81" was held there, attended by 19,000 Scouts! In 1983, the 15th World Scout Jamboree in Kananaskis was attended by 15,000 Scouts from over 100 countries. And finally, in 1993, the jamboree mentioned in the article was another Canadian Jamboree the 8th, or "CJ93", not a provincial one as mentioned. For philatelic interest, each of these jamborees would have had an on-site, fully functional post office that used a special commemorative postmark, as is shown in Figure 15 in the article.

Maybe Mr. Speirs could research and write an article on "The Postal History of Canada's Scout Jamborees" as penance; I'm sure it would make a good read!

BNAPS YOUTH CONTEST WINNERS

To further youth philately, the British North America Philatelic Society sponsored a 2011 contest that solicited philatelic children's games, activities, projects and lesson plans from teachers, stamp club leaders and scout masters. Three entries will each receive a \$100.00 grant from the Society.

The award for Best Classroom Activity went to Aimee Devine of Janesville, Wisconsin, for "Stamping Through Time". Using stamps with historic significance, students develop a chronological sequence of events, attaching the stamps to index cards clipped to a string across the classroom.

The award for Best Activity for Junior Stamp Club or Youth Activity Table at a Stamp Show" went to Karen Weight of Middleton, Wisconsin, for "What George Am I?" Using large blow-ups of the two-cent definitive U.S. Washington issues of 1908-1921 and other graphics, students are made aware of the variety of features on a stamp and are asked to identify the various issues, using an identification work sheet and chart.

The award for Best Program for Scouts went to Brian Jones, San Jose, California, for "Boy Scout Stamp Collecting Merit Badge". His entry is quite expansive, including a Power-Point presentation he developed for scouts to use at various stamp shows. Brian points out that stamp collecting is now the 5th least merit badge sought by scouts of 120 available. His goal is to expand the support needed to offer the stamp collecting merit badge to many more scouts.

Four \$50 awards were also granted to: Aimee Devine, Anne Marie Sweden (two awards) from Paxico, Kansas, and to Robert W. Martin of Sparks, Nevada.

GRAND AWARD WINNER

Hendrick Burgers won the Horace W. Harrison Grand Award at BNAPEX 2011 at North Bay, Ontario. BNAPEX is the annual convention and exhibition of the British North America Philatelic Society. Burgers, an Ontario resident, showed Canadians in Russia 1918-1919: The Last Contingent of World War I.

The jury was deadlocked when awarding the Allan Steinhart Reserve Grand Award and made two awards. One to Richard Thompson who exhibited The Large and Small Queens of Canada 1869-1897: One, Three, Twelve and a Half and Fifteen Cent Values. The second was awarded to David McLaughlin for his display of The Maple Leaves 1897-1898.

The awards are named for the late Horace W. Harrison of Baltimore, Maryland, a prominent collector and author of Canadian Registered postal history and a President of the Society. The late Allan Steinhart was a noted Toronto postal history student, collector and dealer and had served as the Society's Chairman of the Board.

VGG AWARD WINNERS

Brian T. Stalker and H. Mike Street were presented the Vincent G. Greene Award at the annual convention of the British North America Philatelic Society. The award is named for the late Vincent G. Greene, a prominent Toronto philatelist and is given for the best article appearing in the Society's journal, *BNA Topics* the previous year.

Stalker and Street's article, "Labrador Winter Mail Challenges and Heroics – Mail Courier Ernest B. Doane's Crossings of the Strait of Belle Isle, 1910-1911: A Centennial Tribute," describes the Labrador Winter Mail services in the late 19th and early 20th century, and in particular, the role of Ernest B Doane, who in the winters of 1909-10 and 1910-11 made at least four crossings of the Strait of Belle Isle. This perilous endeavor across the 15 km wide ice-strewn strait saved 70 to 80 days in the time required to transfer mail from St. John's Newfoundland to coastal Labrador.

Brian Stalker, a fellow of the Canadian Philatelic Society of Great Britain, has collected Canadian Railway postmarks for thirty years with a particular interest in the people, places, mail-cars and steamers behind the postmarks of Newfoundland and Labrador's Travelling Post Offices. Mike Street collects a wide variety of Canadian material including the 1946 Peace Issue rates, Barrel cancels, Ancaster, Ontario, postmarks and military mail.

- Tommy Douglas and the birth of Medicare
- 150th anniversary of the Royal Hamilton Light Infantry and the Montreal-based Black watch regiment

Images for these stamps were not available when the magazine went to press.

2012 ORAPEX

"ORAPEX" stands for the Ottawa Recreational Association Philatelic Exhibition. The Ottawa Recreational Association (more commonly known as the "RA") is home to the RA Stamp Cub. Each year, the RA Stamp Club in partnership with Canada's oldest stamp club, the Ottawa Philatelic Society, hosts this major Canadian stamp show. ORAPEX is one of only three or four stamp shows in Canada that are recognized as national level stamp shows by Canada's national philatelic society, The Royal Philatelic Society of Canada. In view of this, the show attracts attendees, exhibitors and about 40 stamp dealers from all across Canada.

Every year, ORAPEX has a theme. In 2012, the theme will be the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II. Consequently, the John M. Hillmer award is being offered for the best traditional Canadian Elizabethan II exhibit shown at the show. As well, each year ORAPEX honours a Canadian philatelist who has contributed in an important way to philately in Canada. In 2012, ORAPEX will honour Ian Kimmerly, an Ottawa stamp dealer, philatelic writer and exhibitor.

There are about 30 philatelic exhibits at ORAPEX each year. The judges, who come from all over North America, award more than 25 prizes and medals to the winners in three categories of exhibits: multiple frame, single frame and youth. There is also a regional level class of exhibits for new exhibitors who are not yet ready to exhibit at the national level. This two-day event includes seminars on different aspects of philately, including collecting and exhibiting. Approximately 40 dealers will be there with worldwide stamps and other philatelic material.

ORAPEX will be held in the RA Centre at 2451 Riverside Drive in Ottawa on Saturday May 5 and Sunday May 6, 2012. The show is open to the public and admission and parking are free. ORAPEX offers anyone a great opportunity to find out what their old stamp collections are worth.

Canadian Letters to the U.S., 1851 - 1859

George B. Arfken and Charles G. Firby

Canada (C.W. and C.E., now Ontario and Quebec) took charge of its postal system on April 6, 1851. The domestic postal rate was set at 3d (3 pence) per ½ oz. between any two post offices in Canada independent of the distance. The rate to the U.S. became 6d per ½ oz. from any place in Canada to any place in the U.S., except to the West Coast. The rate to California and Oregon became 9d per ½ oz. To pay these as well as other rates, Canada quickly issued stamps of three denominations: 3d Beaver, April 23, 1851; 6d Prince Consort; May 12, 1851 and 12d Twelve Penny Black, June 14, 1851. This article is a study of how Canadians used their First Issue stamps to pay for their letters to the U.S.

Figure 1 shows an 1856 cover to Bryant Pond, Maine. The endorsement specified the Grand Trunk Railway, the railway to Portland. The red handstamp at upper right stood for Young, James & Co. of Montreal. The 6d postage was paid with two 3d Beavers orange red on thin wove paper. Firby [1] has recorded 235 covers to the U.S. franked with two 3d stamps. So two 3d Beaver covers to the U.S. are common. However, excellent covers still bring excellent prices, \$4,312 for this cover in Firby's Wilkinson sale, June 2007.

The 6d Prince Consort was issued specifically to pay the single rate postage to the U.S. as well as the double rate Canadian domestic postage.

The cover shown in Figure 2 was addressed to J. Kennedy, Esq., Banker. The bank was the Bank of Montreal. There is a large Kennedy correspondence. Much of Canada's Post Office dealings with Rawdon, Wright, Hatch and Edson, the stamp printers, was handled through Kennedy and the bank. The 6d stamp on this cover is deep slate purple on laid paper. Laid paper 6d Prince consorts are found on covers dated May 12, 1851 through August 14, 1856.

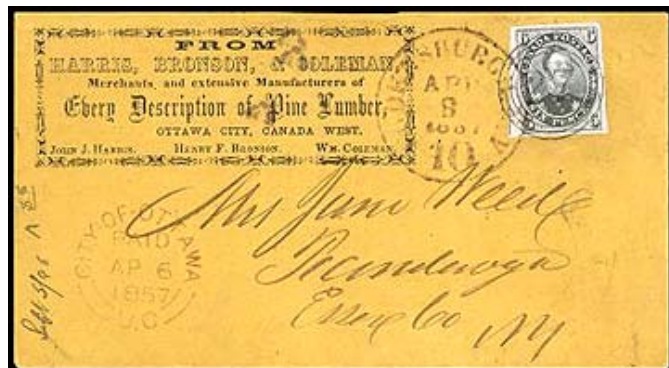


Figure 3. This cover from Ottawa, U.C. was dated April 6, 1857, and addressed to Ticonderoga, N.Y.

The next cover, Figure 3, is included because it has a nice advertisement, "Every Description of Pine Lumber." [2, 185]. Advertisements on covers of the 1850s are rare. The 6d Consort is on medium wove paper. The 4-ring 27 cancel was used exclusively in Ottawa, U.C. The Ogdensburg (N.Y.) date stamp marked the border crossing where the cover entered the U.S.

On August 1, 1857 Canada issued a stamp. The immediate reason was that a ½d stamp was required on all transient newspapers not over 3 oz. Actually the stamp saw more use in paying for printed circulars.

Figure 4 shows a cover to the U.S. franked with 12 ½d stamps. Why 12 ½ds when a single 6d Prince consort would do? Perhaps the writer just liked the pink (rose) stamps. Perhaps the writer had purchased 20 or more ½d stamps to get the government 5% discount [2, 84]! This is the only cover to the U.S. franked with 12 half-penny stamps [1].

An American visitor in Toronto tried to pay the 6d Canadian postage with a 10¢ U.S. stamp, Figure 5, [2, 181]. It shouldn't have happened but it did. It shouldn't have succeeded but it did! The Toronto postal clerk had stamped the cover CANADA 10 Cts in black, meaning due 10¢. (Within the British Empire red meant paid and black meant unpaid.) Whether this was understood in non-British Detroit is not clear. The Detroit postal clerk stamped a red PAID over the black CANADA and also stamped the red oval CANADA 10 CENTS. The cover went on to Superior, Wisconsin without any charge. In later years the Toronto postal clerk would have sent the cover to the Dead Letter Office and that office would have sent the addressee a letter requesting 6d in Canadian stamps or 10¢ in U.S. stamps.

Figure 6 shows an 1853 Canadian money letter sent to Detroit. The manuscript “Money Letter” meant that in Canada there was a record of when the cover was mailed and a record kept of its travel. There was little or no extra security. The U.S. had no formal money letter system and no registration system at this time. So, in Detroit, the money letter cover probably became just another cover. The stamps are orange vermillion on laid paper.

Canada initiated a formal registration system of letter mail on May 1, 1855 [3]. The U.S. started formal registration on July 1, 1855 [4]. Written agreement came in October 1856 for the continued registration in the U.S. of any registration begun in Canada.

A registered cover with a 6d Prince Consort to pay the postage and a 3d Beaver to pay the registry fee to the U.S. is shown in Figure 7. The 3d is a deep red while the 6d is a greenish gray. Both stamps are

on medium wove paper. Only three covers registered to the U.S. with this 3d + 6d franking have been reported [1].

On July 1, 1851, U.S. domestic rates had become 3 cents per ½ oz. for up 3000 miles and 6 cents per ½ oz. for over 3000 miles. This “over 3000 miles” was interpreted as beyond the Rocky Mountains, specifically to California and Oregon. Accordingly the rate to California for Canada became 9d per ½ oz. The 3000 mile distance differential was dropped on July 1, 1863. The rationale behind the 9d charge (rather than the 6d rate for letters to eastern or midwestern U.S.) was the problem of transportation to and from the west coast with the Rocky Mountains in the way. Some mail went by the Butterfield stage route going south of the Rockies along the U.S. southern border. Most of the mail, U.S., Canadian, and British, went by the United States Mail Steamship Co. from New York to Aspinwall / Colon, Panama. There was a very difficult trail through the rain forest across the isthmus to Panama (city). A railroad across the isthmus was opened on January 25, 1855. From Panama, ships of the Pacific Mail Co. carried the mail to San Francisco [5].

Only one pence-franked cover from Canada to the West Coast has been reported. This unique cover is shown in Figure 8. Franked with three 3d Beavers, the cover went to California via Montreal and probably via Panama. The three 3d Beavers are red on thin wove paper.

The first eight pence covers here have all been single rate covers. Now we turn to double rate covers, 12d for up to 1 oz. An 1852 double rate cover to D.S. Kennedy, Bank of Montreal is shown in Figure 9. The 12d postage was paid with two 6d Prince Consorts both slate violet on laid paper.

Note. The U.C. for Upper Canada (now Ontario) was replaced by C.W. for Canada West in 1841. However, frugal Canadian postmasters tended to use the old U.C. date stamps as long as possible.

The 12d double rate to the U.S. could also be paid with the Twelve-Penny Black. This stamp would also pay the single rate to Newfoundland, Bermuda and the West Indies. However, no covers documenting these overseas uses have survived. The Twelve-Penny Black could pay the 4-fold domestic rate but, again, no covers documenting this use have survived. However, there are five Twelve-Penny Black covers to the U.S., all to New York.

A point of interest is that the stamp was not labeled one shilling. Nova Scotia and New Brunswick as well as most other British colonies each issued one shilling stamps in 1851. The Canadian stamp, in contrast, was labeled 12 pence. Writers have speculated that the reason for this was that the Canadian shilling was not tied to the British shilling nor to the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick shillings, and might cause confusion in foreign commercial use. Since Canada's largest trading partner was the U.S., it made sense to use an amount more readily understood in the U.S.

One of the five surviving Twelve-Penny Black covers to New York is shown in Figure 10. The stamp, black on laid paper, is tied with a blue target cancel.

Note. The authors are in the process of writing an article on the existing twelve-penny covers and hope to see the article published within the next several months.

Four triple rate covers to the U.S., paying the 18d for up to 1½ oz., have been reported, making them rarer than the Twelve-

Penny Black covers. One of the nicest of these four is shown in Figure 11. The 18d was paid with a block of 6 of the 3d Beavers, brown red on medium wove paper.

The Canadian Post Office Department changed from using the British pence and shillings system to the U.S. dollars and cents system. The pence-denominated stamps were replaced by cents varieties on July 1, 1859. The pence stamps were never demonetized and could be used today. The pence stamps in private use were still accepted for postage.

All 11 covers shown here are from the former collection of Warren S. Wilkinson. The authors appreciate the privilege of using his covers to illustrate this article.

London 2010 – Festival of Stamps

Festival of Stamps

I. INTRODUCTION

In 2010, the world's philatelic eyes were on London. Philatelists and philatelic agencies from around the world gathered for the philatelic event of the year, London 2010 - a world exhibition of stamps and literature held every ten years. The exhibition was to focus on the centenary of King George V's accession to the throne. It was also to commemorate his love for philately and to treat stamp enthusiasts to the finest printing techniques so that they could enjoy faithfully recreated stamps of beauty that make for truly collectable items.

The London 2010 Festival of Stamps began with the release of a fabulous miniature sheet on June 5, 2010 in honour of the Accession of King George V. The sheet contains the contemporary design of two stamps from the accession celebrations. The first features a First Class Stamp bearing the profiles of both Queen Elizabeth II and King George V. The second stamp displays the original and later profiles of George V. In addition, special numbered limited edition Press Sheets (numbered 2010) were issued featuring twenty miniature panes with the colour codes at the top of the pane. The sheet of five rows and four columns with a small gutter in between has the miniature panes in each column printed tête-à-beche with respect to those in the next column.

Another big hit of the London 2010 Festival of Stamps with collectors was the release of The Kings Stamps on June 8, 2010 in

miniature sheet format. It features the elegant designs of the stamps of the British Empire Exhibition of 1924 and the widely loved 'Sea-horses' stamps. This miniature sheet contains two 1st class stamps of the former designs and two £1 stamps of the later designs printed in contrasting colours using the original intaglio process.

To reveal its printing format, specially numbered limited edition Press Sheets (numbered 2010) were issued featuring nine miniature panes. The sheet of three rows and three columns has the caption LONDON 2010 FESTIVAL OF STAMPS at the top. In addition, there was a prestige stamp book, a wonderful collector's item, with expert commentary by Douglas Muir, Curator of the British Postal Museum and Archive, on the Philatelist King. It includes four special stamp panes. Three of them contain the stamps in the above described miniature sheets in unique combination and a fourth contains a mixed selection of Machin definitive stamps (four 1st class stamps each at the pane's four corners, two 2nd class stamps each at the top and bottom in the pane's second column and two 50p stamps at the ends of the pane's second row with a stamp of the head of George V in the centre of the pane) unavailable elsewhere in this format.

Equally impressive were the Exhibition products. The first was the Jeffrey Matthews London 2010 Stamp Sheet. This sheet displays the 11 gummed low value Machin definitive stamps from 1p to 1.46 pounds using Matthew's vibrant colour palette. The

second was the Exhibition Sheet of 20 1st class stamps with attached London landmark labels, specially created to mark the festival. Third was the facsimile pack with the Postal Union Congress Stamp printed from copies of the original printing plate. Finally, there were other products such as a George V postcard pack, Mug and Coaster and Pin Badge.

The World International Exhibition held under the patronage of the International Federation of Philately was held in the Business Design Centre, Islington, London. The Exhibition featured the finest competitive exhibits from collectors around the world, stamp dealers, auctioneers and postal administrations, including a major presence from the Royal Mail. It was a Show of Shows.

II. THE 2010 STAMPS

A. Commemoratives

1. Classic Album Covers (January 7, 2010): The Royal Mail began 2010 with the release of ten 1st class stamps to transport the Brits back to their era of the past. The stamps are described as “one of our biggest hits of 2010. Undoubtedly significant culturally, the big attraction in album art for many of us is simply that particular designs vividly transport us back to our era.”[1] The iconic designs of the stamps evoke memories of legendary contemporary artists. They display albums by Pink Floyd, Coldplay, Blur, New Order, The Rolling Stones, The Clash, Mike Oldfield, Led Zeppelin, Primal Scream and David Bowie. A special souvenir sheet was available of ‘Pink Floyd’ with ten gummed stamps.

2. Girlguiding-UK (February 2, 2010): ‘Girl Power’ can be traced to 1908 with the creation of the Girl Guides movement by Agnes and Robert Baden-Powell. To commemorate the Girl Guides centenary, the Royal Mail issued a set of four stamps (1st, 56p, 81p, and 90p) in a miniature sheet. The designs of these lively stamps display four different features reflecting four age groups within their movement. They show colourful drawings of rainbows, brownies, guides and a senior section. Each of these stamps also show girls of different age groups from their movement.

3. The Royal Society (February 25, 2010): Three hundred and fifty years of astonishing achievements of the Royal Society was celebrated by the Royal Mail in a set of ten 1st class stamps. The Royal Society founded in 1660 was instrumental in many of the most important scientific discoveries in Britain’s history. The designs on the stamps show portraits of Fellows and representations of their greatest work. The renowned scholars depicted are: Boyle for chemistry; Newton for optics; Franklin for electricity; Inner for vaccination; Babbage for computing; Wallace for evolution; Lister for antiseptic surgery; Rutherford for atomic structure; Hodgkin for crystallography; and Shackleton for earth science.

4. Battersea Dogs and Cats Home (March 11, 2010): To indicate the heart-warming feelings for pets, Royal Mail has issued a set of ten 1st class stamps to thrill pet lovers and philatelists. It displays “... an extraordinary monument of the remarkable affection with which English people regard the race of dogs ...”.[2] This display took tangible appearance when the first temporary shelter for lost and stray dogs was opened in England by Mrs. Mary Tealby in 1800. Later, in 1860, the Battersea

dogs and cats home was founded. The designs on the stamps show three cats and seven dogs. The three cats shown on the stamps are named Button, Mr. Tumnus and Tigger; the seven dogs shown on the stamps are named Pixie, Herbie, Tatka, Boris, Casey, Leonard and Tia.

5. House of Stewarts (March 23, 2010): The Monarchs of England have attracted a great deal of attention as they set the standards for the rest of the world. In 2008, the Royal Mail began with the first series: the Houses of Lancaster & York followed by the second series the House of Tudor in 2009. The third series features the House of Stewart consisting of seven stamps: 3x1st; 2x63p; 2x81p. They show the portraits of James I, James II, James III, James IV, James V, Mary, and James VI. In addition, a miniature sheet with four stamps (2x1st class and 2x81p) was also printed. These stamps show designs or portraits of St. Andrews, College of Surgeons, Court of Session and John Knox. For lovers of English history, it is an educational set.

6. Mammals - Action for Species 4 (April 13, 2010): Many of Britain’s mammals face uncertain outcomes, living on the edge between survival and extinction. To encourage the action of conservationists, Royal Mail launched the Action for Species series in 2007. The species of British mammals threatened are the feature of the fourth action for species issue. The ten 1st class stamps depict the following mammals: the humpback whale; the wild cat; the brown long-eared bat; the polecat; the sperm whale; the water vole; the greater horseshoe bat; the otter; the dormouse and the hedgehog. While some of these mammals have been decimated partly because they send a chill up one’s spine, they still deserve protection as there is a fine ecological balance between the insect, bird, plants and mammal species on this planet. Once extinct they are gone forever.

7. Britain Alone (May 13, 2010): The spirit that brought ordinary British people through the dark months between late 1940 and June 1941 is celebrated in a set of atmospheric stamps issued by the Royal Mail. This spirit was rightly stated by Winston Churchill: “We shall defend our island, whatever the cost may be, we shall fight on the beaches, we shall fight on the landing ground, we shall



fight in the fields and in the streets, we shall fight in the hills, we shall never surrender.”[3] This set of commemorative stamps (2x1st, 2x60p, 2x67p, and 2x97p) is a fitting recognition to UK’s finest hour. The designs in black-and-white images depict Churchill, Land Girls, Home Guard, Evacuees, Air Raid Wardens, Women in Factories, Royal Broadcast and Fire Service. Additionally, a miniature sheet with four stamps (1st, 60p, 88p and 97p) was also printed with a moving quotation by Winston Churchill. These stamps show designs of the desperate British evacuation of Dunkirk.

8. House of Stuart (June 15, 2010): The House of Stuart is the fourth set in the Kings and Queens series covering a period from 1603-1714 that was released by the Royal Mail. It was an interesting period in English history when the Stuarts reigned with gunpowder, treason and plotting, and civil wars. A period that witnessed the Great Plague, the Great Fire of London and the Glorious Revolution. This fourth set consists of seven stamps: 3x1st; 2x63p; 2x81p. They show the portraits of James I, Charles I, Charles II, James II, William III, Mary II, and Anne. In addition, a miniature sheet with four stamps (1st, 60p, 88p and 97p) was also printed. These stamps show designs or portraits of William Harvey, The Civil War, John Milton and John Vanbrugh. For lovers of English history, it is a fine educational set.

9. London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games (II) (July 22, 2010): The second special stamp issue of the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games (II) was released by the Royal Mail. This set of beautifully crafted stamps has even more insight into Olympic and Paralympic sports, states writer Ian Cole. The set consists of 10x 1st stamps. Their designs depict the following sports: rowing, shooting, pentathlon, taekwondo, cycling, table tennis, hockey, football, goalball and boxing.

10. Great British Railways (August 19, 2010): The Royal Mail states: “The introduction of Stephenson’s ‘Rocket’ to an excited public in 1829 heralded the Golden Age of steam that lasted right up until 1960, when British Rail’s last-ever mainline steam locomotive rolled out of Swindon Works. We are marking the 50th anniversary of that occasion with the first in a series of Special Stamp issues celebrating the glory of Britain’s great steam locomotives.”[4] The stamps issued are: 2x1st; 2x67p; and 2x97p. The stamps in black-and-white depict the LMS Coronation Class; BR Class 9F; GWR King Class; LNER Class A1; LMS NCC Class WT and SR King Arthur Class. This set of commemorative stamps is a must for lovers of rail memorabilia, bringing the age of steam back to life, and for those who could not satisfy a craving for speed.

11. Medical Breakthroughs (September 16, 2010): This issue by the Royal Mail pays tribute to six major British medical achievements of the past 120 years. The medical breakthroughs of beta-blockers, penicillin, hip replacements, artificial lens implants, the discovery of malaria parasites and CT scanners have transformed millions of lives throughout the world. It all began in 1628 when William Harvey described the circulation of blood. Since then, that their achievements have been impressive is perhaps an understatement. Nevertheless, they were milestones in our understanding of the human body. The colourful designs on the six stamps (1st, 58p, 60p, 67p, 88p, and 97p) by Howard



Brown, printed by Cartor Security Printing using lithography, display the breakthroughs mentioned above.

12. Winnie-the-Pooh (October 12, 2010): To feature children’s books in line with postal administrations across Europe, the Royal Mail has issued a set of six stamps (1st, 58p, 60p, 67p, 88p, and 97p). The stamps depict E.H. Shepard’s illustrations of Winnie-the-Pooh and Christopher Robin, Piglet, Rabbit, Eeyore, Friends and Tigger. Designed by Magpie Studio and printed by Cartor Security Printing using lithography, the stamps display simple sketches in A.A Milne’s stories of the bear of very little brain. The stories have delighted generations of young readers. A miniature sheet with the stamps was also issued.

13. Christmas (November 2, 2010): “Wallace and his sidekick Gromit have been amongst Britain’s favourite animated char-

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acters for more than 10 years now. ... it was time to look at how they celebrate a traditional Christmas.”[5] The Royal Mail asked artist Nick Park of Aardman Animations to design the charming Christmas stamp issues. The colourful designs on the seven stamps (2x1st, 2x2nd, 60p, 97p and L1.46) by Aardman Animations Ltd. and Royal Mail, printed by De La Rue Security Print using gravure, bring wonderful Christmas festive scenes to life. A miniature sheet with the stamps was also printed.

B. Definitives

1. *Tariff 2010* (March 30, 2010): In March 2010, Value Definitives (60p, 67p, 88p, 97p and L1.46) and Country Definitives were issued as part of the new tariff price change. The Machin design continues to be the epitome of the value definitive stamps. Two new designs for each of the four UK Home Nations (England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland) were also released. The new designs have the values 60p and 97p with their indigenous symbols.

2. *Post & Go - Birds of Britain 1* (September 17, 2010): Stunning designs of birds by Kate Stephens with illustrations by Robert Gillmore have been released by Royal Mail Crown Post Offices. This is the first in the series of pictorial Post & Go stamps. The six stamps (6x1st) show pictures of different birds on tree branches or on the ground to the right and the inscription 1st class up to 100g on the left at the top with a number in small print at the bottom on the left. The stamps printed by Walsall Security Printers feature Robin, House Sparrow, Starling, Blue Tit, Goldfinch and Wood Pigeon.

3. *Special Delivery* (October 10, 2010): Two new Machin definitive NVI stamps for customers using the Special Delivery Next Day service were issued by the Royal Mail. The Machin definitives of Arnold Machin were first introduced in June 1967. The new stamps bear the words 'SPECIAL DELIVERY' in a contrasting band as well as the maximum weights (up to 500g or 100g) for which they may be used. The square stamps were die-cut and printed by De La Rue Security Print.

III. OTHER PRODUCTS [6]

1. Prestige Booklets:

Classic Album Covers - This prestige stamp book contains an expert commentary by Mojo Editor Phil Alexander and interviews with album art heavyweights Peter Blake and Roger Dean.



It also contains mixed Machin stamp panes that are unavailable anywhere in this format.

The Royal Society - This prestige stamp book contains three panes from the stamps issued to celebrate the Royal Society together with a mixed Machin pane. This richly illustrated book features fascinating material from the Society's own historic archive.

London 2010 Festival of Stamps - The King's stamps - This prestige book is a wonderful collector's item with expert commentary by Douglas Muir, Curator of the British Postal Museum and Archive, on the Philatelist King, and includes four special stamp panes.

Britain Alone - This book, a unique and insightful appraisal to treasure, contains the stories of both Dunkirk and the Home Front by WWII expert Nigel Fountain. All the issue's special stamps of Britain Alone are included along with a mixed Machin selection unavailable elsewhere in this format.

2. Booklets:

Olympic and Paralympics Games - There were four booklets. Each with four 1st definitive stamps and two 1st commemorative stamps. The first contains two commemorative stamps of Paralympics archery and Judo; the second contains two commemorative stamps of Track and Basketball; the third contains two commemorative stamps of rowing and table tennis; and the fourth contains two commemorative stamps of football and cycling. Minor variations in these booklets were re-printed (web address or printer's name).

London 2010 Festival of Stamps - This booklet has six 1st definitive stamps plus advertising.

World Wide and Europe Stamps - Two booklets were issued with four non-value stamps in each for use to the World (purple) or Europe (green) up to 20 grams.

Mammals Stamps - This booklet contains four 1st definitive stamps and two 1st mammal stamps of the otter and hedgehog.

British Classic Design No. 5 - This booklet contains four 1st definitive stamps and two 1st Battle of Britain stamps of the Spitfire.

Christmas - Two Christmas booklets were issued. Each contained twelve stamps, one with the 1st class value and one with the 2nd class value.

3. Press Sheets:

The House of Stewart - This limited edition press sheet contains 21 miniature sheets of four stamps described earlier in a format of seven rows and three columns. The caption at the top reads THE HOUSE OF STEWART. On the left side of the sheet is shown the colour codes.

London 2010 - Accession of King George V - This limited edition press sheet contains 20 miniature sheets of two stamps described earlier in a format of five rows and four columns. On the top of the sheet is shown the colour codes.

London 2010-The King's Stamps - This limited edition press sheet contains nine miniature sheets of four stamps described earlier in a format of three rows and three columns.

The House of Stuart - This limited edition press sheet contains 21 miniature sheets of four stamps described earlier in a

format of seven rows and three columns. The caption at the top reads THE HOUSE OF STUART. On the left side of the sheet is shown the colour codes.

4. Smilers Generic Sheets:

Smilers Business and Consumer Stamps 2010 - Contains ten 1st stamps, beautifully and colourfully illustrated.

Castles of Wales - Contains 20 stamps 1st class stamps, showing 10 different designs of the Castle of Wales.

London 2010 Festival of Stamps Instant Smilers - Contains 20 mixed stamps about greetings and special occasion with the 1st class value marking the 10th Anniversary of Smilers.

London 2010 Festival of Stamps Exhibition Sheet - Contains twenty 1st class 'Hello' stamps with attached London landmark labels.

Battle of Britain - Contains twenty 1st class stamps of the Spitfire with the accompanying story of each.

Christmas - Contains 20 stamps with the 1st class value with labels explaining how the Stamp-O-Matic machine works.

5. Commemorative Sheets:

Grand Prix - This commemorative sheet features 10 Union Flag 1st class stamps with attached labels of British World Champion Grand Prix Drivers and the same caption at the top of the sheet.

Halley's Comet - This commemorative sheet features 10 Union Flag 1st class stamps with attached labels of the anniversary of Halley's Comet. It has the caption 'Halley's Comet' at the top of the sheet.

London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games (II) - This commemorative sheet features the ten stamps of the Olympic and Paralympic Games (II) plus unique labels. It has the caption 'ONE AIM' at the top of the sheet.

London Eye 10th Anniversary - This commemorative sheet features 10 Union Flag 1st class stamps with attached labels of London landmarks and the caption at the top of the sheet showing 'The wonder of the wheel'.

IV. CONCLUDING REMARKS

Philatelists' eyes in 2010 were on Great Britain as it hosted the World Philatelic Exhibition. It put on a 'Show to be Remembered' in honour of King George V, the 'Philatelist King.' It explored the complex and difficult business of creating stamps fit for a new King, accompanied by a host of original, and until now mostly unpublished, development illustrations and artwork. As in the past, every decennial year, Great Britain steals the limelight as far as the philatelic world is concerned. But 2010 was special as it celebrated George V's love for philately. This monarch began collecting stamps at the age of 16 and by the end of his reign he had amassed the greatest collection of stamps of the British Empire housed in 328 albums. His passion is revealed in the following statement: "At an auction in 1904, the future King of England paid a world-record price for a single stamp when he acquired a Mauritius 2d blue for 1,450 pounds. Reportedly, one of George's secretaries had read about the record-breaking purchase in the newspaper and remarked to the Prince that 'some damned



fool' had parted with an exceptional amount of money for just one stamp. His Royal Highness is said to have replied, 'I am that damned fool'".[7]

For philatelists, London 2010 was a year to remember - A Festival of Stamps and a Tribute to the Philatelist King. ✉

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Sir Alexander Fleming, F.R.S.

Many scientific discoveries have been the result of careful observations of the unexpected. Such was the case in the discovery of penicillin by Alexander Fleming, a Scottish bacteriologist and pharmacologist. In 1928 Fleming was investigating the properties of staphylococci at St. Mary's Hospital, Paddington, London. Before leaving for a months vacation he had stacked all his cultures of staphylococci in a corner of his laboratory. On his return Fleming observed that one culture was contaminated with a fungus, and that the colonies of staphylococci that had immediately surrounded it had been destroyed, and other colonies further away were normal. Fleming identified the mould that had contaminated his culture plates as being from the *Penicillium* genus, and named it penicillin. A plaque on the wall of St. Mary's marks his discovery (fig. 1). The actual laboratory is now a museum, having been restored to its 1928 state.

Fleming continued his investigations, noting the positive anti-bacterial effect on many organisms. He had difficulty in refining penicillin and obtaining large quantities. In 1940 Fleming abandoned penicillin research. After Pearl Harbour, with funds from the British and U.S. governments, Oxford University pathologist Howard Florey and biochemist Ernest Chain were, however, able to start to mass produce penicillin. The discovery of penicillin introduced the age of useful antibiotics, and penicillin has saved the lives of millions of people.

The rest of the story is history. Fleming, Florey and Chain were awarded the 1945 Nobel Prize in Medicine. Fleming was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society in 1943. Fleming and Florey were knighted in 1944, becoming Sir Alexander and Sir Howard.

In 1999, Time magazine named Fleming one of the 100 Most Important People of the 20th Century for his discovery of penicillin stating:

It was a discovery that would change the course of history. The active ingredient in that mould, which Fleming named penicillin, turned out to be an infection-fighting agent of enormous potency. When it was finally recognised for what it was, the most efficacious life-saving drug in the world, penicillin would alter forever the treatment of bacterial infections. By the middle of the century, Fleming's discovery had spawned a huge pharmaceutical industry, churning out synthetic penicillins that would conquer some of mankind's most ancient scourges, including syphilis, gangrene and tuberculosis.

Alexander Flemming was born on 6 August 1881 on his father's farm in Ayrshire, Scotland. He attended the Royal Polytechnical Institution in London, and subsequently worked in a shipping office. After inheriting some money from his uncle John Flemming, he fol-

lowed the advice of his physician brother Tom, and in 1903 enrolled as a medical student at St. Mary's Hospital, London. He qualified in 1906, and, by chance, joined the research department at St. Mary's, becoming an assistant bacteriologist. After serving as a captain in the Royal Army Medical Corps during the war, he returned to St. Mary's, where he became Professor of Bacteriology in 1928. When he died of a heart attack at his home in London in 1955, he was mourned by the world as a national hero. After cremation his ashes were interred in the crypt of St. Paul's Cathedral, London (fig. 2).

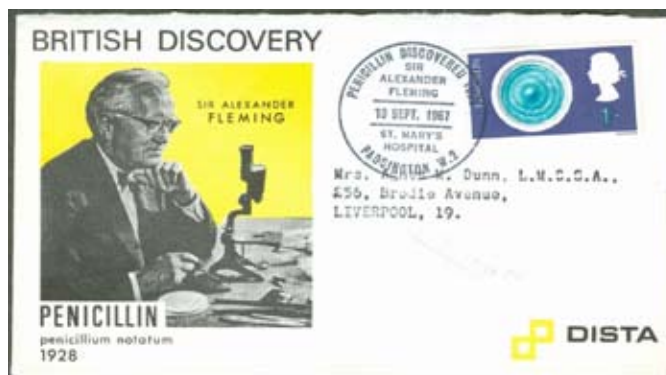


Fig. 3 First Day Cover 1967.

in his laboratory. The discovery of penicillin was also marked on the 43p stamp of the Patients' Tale set of the 1999 Millennium series (fig. 4), and shows an image of the penicillin mould. In 2010 in the Life-changing series the 58p stamp showed the antibiotic properties of penicillin (fig. 5). Although the first day cover shows Sir Alexander in his labo-

Sir Alexander and penicillin have been honoured on the stamps of several countries. Great Britain has issued three. The 1967 stamp was part of the British Discovery and Invention set, that included the discovery of penicillin. Appropriately the first day cover shown (fig. 3) was cancelled at St. Mary's Hospital, and shows Sir Alexander

ratory, Great Britain has not issued a stamp featuring Fleming. This has been left to other countries and several countries have issued stamps honouring Sir Alexander. Stamps to mark the 50th anniversary and 75th anniversaries of the discovery of penicillin, which also show Sir Alexander, were issued by

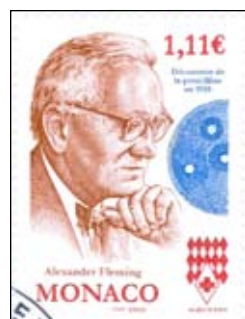


Fig. 8 1,11€ Monaco stamp 2003.

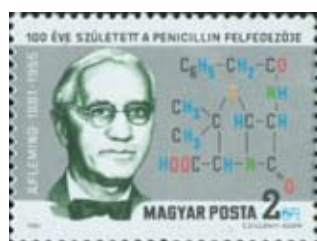


Fig. 9 2Fo Hungary 1981 stamp.

Congo (fig. 6) and Mauritius (fig. 7) in 1978; Monaco in 2003 (fig. 8). The Mauritius set reflects the penicillin story. The 20c stamp shows Dr. Fleming as a physician in World War I, the 1 Rs stamp the first penicillin mould, the 1.50 Rs stamp penicillium notatum, and the 5 Rs Sir Alexander and a nurse administering penicillin. Similarly the 100th anniversary of his birth in 1981 has been noted by Hungary (fig. 9) and

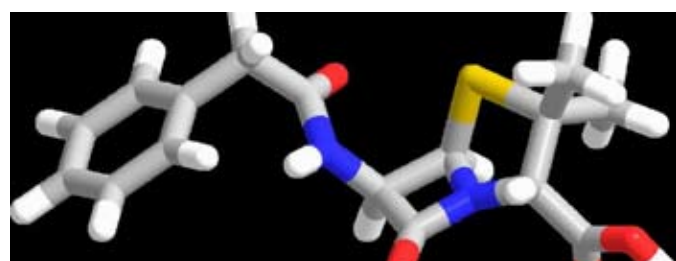


Fig. 11 3D structure of penicillin.

Mexico (fig. 10). Besides a drawing of Fleming the Hungarian stamp shows the relatively simple chemical structure of penicillin, which the model represents in three dimensions (hydrogen-white, carbon-grey, nitrogen-blue, oxygen-red, sulfur-yellow) (fig.

11). He has also been included on a 1983 stamp honouring the winners of Nobel Prizes by the Faroe Islands (fig. 12). The 1997 Dominica Medical Pioneers series has both a 55c stamp (fig 13) and \$5 Souvenir Sheet (fig. 14) with Sir Alexander Fleming, the latter also showing him in his laboratory (fig. 14). Bhutan issued a millennium set, Breakthroughs in Modern Medicine – 100 Years, one of the stamps shows Sir Alexander (fig. 15). ☒

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Speculation

and the Victoria Diamond Jubilee Issue

The Jubilee issue was controversial from the moment Postmaster General William Mulock announced the number of stamps to be issued for each denomination. The numbers to be issued was published in *Hansard* on May 20, 1897. Only 150,000 of the ½-cent denomination and 75,000 of the 6-cent denomination were ordered. The low numbers for these values attracted the attention of speculators who realized the potential for profit.

On June 1, 1897, a notation in the *American Journal of Philately* anticipated the situation:

it does not require a very wise prophet to foresee that this will lead to wild speculation in this value.^[1]

Within weeks of the House of Commons announcement the Canadian government suffered criticism not only about the speculative nature of the ½-cent and 6-cent denominations but also about whether there was a legitimate need for the ½-cent and the dollar denominations.

The Society for the Suppression of Superfluous Stamps condemned the issue as a blatant attempt by the government to profit from the sale of unnecessary stamps. Written support for this position appeared in a variety of philatelic publications and was sufficient that Stanley Gibbons Ltd and Scott Stamp & Coin Co. Ltd, two prominent international philatelic companies, initially refused to recognize the issue.^[2]

Notwithstanding the controversy, the Postmaster General clearly understood the mood of the public and the popularity of the Jubilee issue was immediate and great. The issue touched the loyal heart of Canada.

people bought a stamp who never bought before, and those who bought before now bought the more.^[3]

One thousand three hundred and twenty eight sets were sold and mailed on the day of issue.^[4]

Demand in general and especially for the ½-cent and 6-cent denominations created problems at local post offices. Pandemonium describes the situation on the first day of issue at the main Toronto post office on Adelaide Street. REA described the scene

in a column in *McKeel's Weekly Stamp News* published several weeks later on July 8th, 1897.^[4]

The people of Canada and especially of Toronto have gone Jubilee Stamp crazy. The new stamps were placed on sale in Toronto on June 19 at 9 AM. Before that hour had arrived the post office had become tightly crowded and when 9 o'clock came there was a surging mass of humanity fighting for a place at the stamp counter. The crowd kept increasing until it extended way out on Adelaide Street and much resembled the brute-force committee of some university in an endeavor to obtain priority in getting into a theatre on Halloween night. It had been expected that there would be somewhat of an increased demand for the Jubilee stamps and another young lady had been stationed behind the counter to assist the two young ladies who ordinarily dispense the pictures of Her Majesty. When the office finally opened for the sale of the Jubilee stamps the crowd was orderly for just about one minute when a man was shoved clear over the counter into the distribution office. This immediately brought forth stamp vendor Hewitt who "remonstrated strongly" with the crowd. But the crowd seemed to have no idea of the official importance of Mr. Hewitt and it looked for a moment as though that gentleman would be squeezed through the window out on to Adelaide Street. A sudden thought seemed to strike the vendor and clapping his hat on his head he disappeared, retuning in a few minutes with an exultant smile on his face and a six-foot policeman at his side. The "bobby" proceeded to take a position of advantage in front of the counter and looked sternly at the crowd, chewing the chain of his helmet with the look that Goliath must have worn when he daily paraded forth to challenge the Israelites. A poor old Irish woman who had been jammed into the crowd in an innocent attempt to procure a three-cent stamp to post a letter, was the first object of the policeman's wrath. "Stand back!" he cried as he gave the Hibernian a shove that sent her spinning into the crowd. "Sure it's back on the farm pitching fodder to the cattle yez ought to be," shrieked the woman and the crowd evidently agreed with her for in about two minutes the policeman was jammed into a corner with his helmet locked down over his eyes and his chest fallen in about three inches with the crowd more disordered than ever. Another policeman was called and still another until the unique spectacle was presented of the distributor's office, which contains generally but one young lady, being supplied by the vendor, three young ladies, three policeman, two detectives, and one sergeant of police. An impromptu railing was formed on a bench and the crowd was made to "line up." But this was found to be too slow and the window opening on Adelaide Street was opened and the stamps handed out to the crowd on the street beneath. From the time of starting the sale of the Jubilee stamps up to the time of writing, three days later, the post office has been crowded,

and if it were possible to see the office now you would see a crowd lined up on the street waiting their turn.^[4]

Reports from every branch confirmed the run on the ½-cent and 6-cent denominations. On June 26th, a week after release, the Post Office Department responded to the run on the ½-cent and 6-cent denominations with an order that necessitated the purchase of a full set to obtain these values. A few days later, similar restrictions were placed on the 8-cent and on all dollar denominations.

By July 31st about 9000 sets had been sold. A subsequent order from the Post Office Department authorized the sale of short sets to either 50-cents or to 1-dollar. Presumably this was to make the issue more accessible to the average citizen. The average family income at that time was \$8 a week.^[5] The purchase price for a complete set that included the 1-cent postal card was 16 dollars and 21½ cents whereas for a short set to 50 cents the price was a more manageable 1 dollar and 22½ cents.

In the ensuing weeks about 30,000 short sets were sold. On August 10th and 11th, the government placed a further 1,500 of the short sets on sale in Toronto. Only one set was allowed each applicant. Those collectors and dealers who wanted more than one set defeated the system by arranging proxy purchases.

A September Post Office Department memorandum confirmed that the post office supplies were exhausted except for a reserve of complete sets, and acknowledged destruction of the plates on September 10.^[3]

Demand eventually declined and despite continued availability of some values beyond the turn of the century, the Jubilee issue became dormant with the appearance of the Maple Leaf series in the winter of 1897. The 1-cent and the 3-cent denominations remained on sale until spring 1898. Unsold stamps continued to be returned to Ottawa as late as 1909.^[6]

The dollar denominations did prove useful for prepayment of newspapers. For newspapers that were printed and published in Canada and that were mailed in cities that had a letter carrier system, the bulk-rate charge was 1¢ per pound. Postal charges of \$200 to \$500 were commonplace events for the major dailies in 1897. Instead of placing a stamp on each paper, the publishers arranged with the Post Office Department to pay for hundreds at a time and to receive cancelled panes or complete sheets as receipts.^[7]

A special postal payment book was available for this purpose. A postal clerk weighed the newspapers. After the charge was paid, the stamps were “firmly” affixed in the book and then cancelled. These payment books were used until July 1, 1901.^{[8] [9]}

The dollar denominations also found a limited place in regular mail delivery. Financial institutions, other businesses, and individuals used the dollar denominations for prepayment of money packages and heavier parcels. An international parcel needed to weigh 3 lb. 2 oz. to justify postage of \$5 and for a domestic parcel the weight was 10 lb. 7 oz.^[3]

Notwithstanding these uses, a 1902 Post Office Department inventory showed 100 each of the 1-dollar and 2-dollar denominations, 1,835 of the 3-dollar, 2,013 of the 4-dollar, and 1,240 of the 5-dollar. In 1905 the remainders of these dollar values were destroyed.^{[10] [11]}

The government learned from this experience. Canada did not issue another dollar denomination for 26 years until the 1-dollar orange King George V Admiral issue in 1923. The next 2-dollar denomination took 75 years to appear with the Quebec issue in 1972, and the next 5-dollar denomination took 86 years with the Point Pelee issue in 1983. Canada has never released another 3- or 4-dollar stamp. A century passed before Canada released a denomination higher than 5-dollars with the 1997 8-dollar Grizzly. One hundred and thirteen years passed before Canada issued the 10-dollar Blue Whale.

The legitimate uses for the ½-cent denomination were to prepay newspapers and other periodicals that weighed no more than one ounce within Canada and the US, and for un-addressed circulars delivered to box holders in city post offices and to the UK. Due to the heavy demand for the ½-cent denomination, these stamps were not routinely available to serve as postage for newspapers in Toronto. As such the postmasters were directed to sell 1-cent stamps for this purpose at a cost of ½-cents, and to receive a refund of the difference from the Post Office Department.

Post Office Department distribution policy was criticized. The number of ½-cent stamps the government acknowledged sold as part of a complete or a short set totaled only 40,500, far short of the 150,000 produced, and the discrepancy left many wondering if some of the sheets had been skimmed by Post Office or other government officials. Delivery of the stamps to post offices started on June 10, 1897, nine days before the date of issue. There were reports that many postmasters did not follow the instructions and that even before the official date of issue that the coveted ½-cent and 6-cent values fell into the hands of family and friends.^[12] The postmasters of at least 22 offices reportedly stated that they did not receive any ½-cent or 6-cent stamps.^[4]

Not unexpectedly the plethora of criticism found a political outlet. Among the suggestions of the impropriety included

an unsubstantiated comment that “men well known in political circles, men far up in the Liberal ranks could procure hundreds of sheets of Jubilee halves,” and “Honest Bill Mulock” was accused as a “corruptionist” by members of the late Conservative government.^[4]

Regardless of all the controversy, or perhaps in part in lieu of the controversy, the Jubilee issue remains popular and these stamps eventually did appreciate. However, those who hoped for an early return on their investment were disappointed. The stamps could be purchased at a 25% discount from face value until 1917.^[14]

As the table below indicates, the ½-cent and 6-cent certainly appreciated more than any of the other denominations. Since some of the 3- and 4- dollar denominations were not sold and eventually destroyed, the values for these denominations should have appreciated more than the other dollar denominations, but the Unitrade values do not reflect this. The data on the number issued in the table is from an article by Hurst^[15] and this number is not the same as the number reported in Unitrade (brackets).

Has the Jubilee issue appreciated more than similar denomination issues of the era? A comparison with the 20-cent and 50-cent Victoria Widow Weeds issue of 1893 might offer some

insight. There were five times as many Widow Weeds issued compared to the same Jubilee denominations and presumably this would depress their value relative to the Jubilee. The mint 2009 Unitrade values are higher for the Widow Weeds than for the Jubilee but the used prices are lower. The discrepancy in the mint values suggests that the 20-cent and 50-cent Jubilee denominations did not enjoy enhanced appreciation. There were fewer stamps issued and these stamps are now worth less than the Widow Weeds. The used values for these Jubilee denominations are higher but there might be fewer used copies extant because collectors saved so many of the mint copies on speculation.

Individual collectors value an issue or a stamp for personal reasons that go well beyond the relative scarcity. The Jubilee issue is richly endowed with controversy and perhaps this and the history of the political and the commercial milieu that gave birth to these stamps represent the real value for collectors.

1. ELIGIBILITY

In accordance with a recent decision of the RPSC Board, this National level exhibition is open only to individual collectors who are members of the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada, or if they are non-residents of Canada, are either a member of the RPSC or of the national philatelic body of their country of residence.

They must also meet the entry requirements contained in this prospectus. The whole of the exhibit must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor. If purchased as a unit, it must have been owned for at least two years, extensively revised, and have been prepared by the exhibitor. The submitting of an entry is deemed to be an implied declaration by the exhibitor to that effect.

2. EXHIBIT CLASSIFICATION INFORMATION

National Adult exhibits (Judged by RPSC National Standards)

The National ADULT Classes / Divisions are intended for exhibits that fulfill one of the following criteria:

- (a) The exhibit has been awarded at least a silver medal at a previous regional or local show, or
- (b) The exhibit is deemed by the Exhibition Committee to be sufficiently advanced to be entered in this class/division, or
- (c) The exhibit, though new, is submitted by a collector with a proven track record in previous National shows.

Youth Class (Judged by RPSC National Standards)

The Youth Class is intended for exhibitors who have not yet reached their twenty-second (22nd) birthday on Jan. 1, 2012. The age and birth date of each exhibitor must be indicated on the official entry form, as age grouping will be established for the Class to aid in judging. For an exhibit to be judged under National standards it should have been awarded at least a silver-bronze at a previous regional or local show.

General: An exhibitor may enter more than one exhibit, including those in the same class. Should the exhibition be oversubscribed, the Exhibition Committee will make the final selection of accepted exhibits from the entry forms it has received, and will seek balance and fairness in the selection process.

3. ENTRY

Each entry shall be entered in its correct Class / Division and section on an official entry form. The jury reserves the right to reclassify any exhibit.

Five copies of the Title Page and 5 copies of the Synopsis page and of an Introduction or Plan Page (if applicable) must be sent with each completed Official Entry Form. (These pages may be modified later if desired.)

No exhibit will be accepted unless the prescribed fee has been paid in full at the time of the submission of the Entry Form. (See Section 5.)

Please make checks payable to Edmonton Stamp Club.

Entry forms must be received no later than May 1, 2012.

Acknowledgement of receipt of the Official Entry Form does not constitute acceptance for exhibition, until so notified.

The Exhibition Committee reserves the right to reject any exhibit, in part or whole, without assigning any reason for such rejection.

When an exhibit is rejected or reduced in the number of frames by the Exhibition Committee, the (corresponding) entry fee shall be refunded.

Failure to deliver an accepted exhibit before 9:00 am June 1, 2012 forfeits the entry fee.

4. EXHIBIT DISPLAYS

Exhibits will be displayed in frames holding sixteen (16) pages; in four rows of four pages (4x4). Each page is not to exceed 23 x 29 cm (9 x 11.5 inches).

Entries with larger and / or odd sized pages may be accommodated, but must be granted prior special approval from the Exhibition Committee.

All exhibits must be mounted on white or light coloured pages.

Pages must be in transparent page protectors, enclosed on three sides and numbered on the back in sequential order to aid in the correct mounting of the exhibit by the Exhibition Committee.

Exhibits failing to comply with the above may not be displayed or judged.

The name of the exhibitor must not appear on the faces of the pages, unless on addressed exhibited covers.

Forgeries must be so identified in the text. Failure to do so may result in the exhibit being downgraded.

Each National exhibit accepted for the Exhibition (other than the One Frame Class) shall be allotted not less than two (2) frames and not more than ten (10) frames.

The Exhibition Committee reserves the right to reduce frame limits in order to accommodate a maximum number of qualified entries within the exhibition; also to place exhibits according to its own display plan.

Exhibits in the Youth Class will be displayed in the same type of frames as the National exhibits. Each Youth exhibit accepted will be allotted at least one (1) and usually not more than five (5) frames. All other rules shall be identical to those in the National Exhibition.

Exhibits must be received by the Exhibition Committee no earlier than May 14, 2012 and no later than May 28, 2012, (excluding Saturday and Sunday) unless the exhibitor plans on bringing the exhibit(s) to the show. If hand delivering, please note this on the entry form.

Hand Delivered exhibits must be received at the Convention site between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. on Thursday May 31, 2012 or between 7:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. on Friday June 1, 2012. Exhibitors may be able to make other arrangements for delivery with the Exhibits Chair if arrangements are approved before May 14, 2012. Any exhibit received after the 9:00 a.m. on Friday June 1, 2012 deadline may find that the frames have been re-allocated, or that the exhibit may be judged non-competitively.

7. RETURN

The exhibition will close at 4:00 p.m. on Sunday, June 3, 2012. For security reasons, no exhibit or part thereof may be dismantled before the close of the Exhibition and until all visitors have cleared the exhibit area. All dismantling of exhibits must be done by or under the direct supervision of exhibition staff. (Travel plans should be made accordingly.)

Exhibitors or their agents may be asked to present proper proof of identity to obtain their exhibits from the Exhibition Committee at the Bin Room, following the close of the Exhibition. Exhibits not claimed in person will be returned at the expense of the owner as soon as possible after the close of the Exhibition in the manner directed by the owner. Pre-payment must be enclosed. An additional charge of \$5.00 Canadian must be enclosed for wrapping and handling.

Please allow sufficient time for processing before making inquiries.

8. INSURANCE & SECURITY

Owners are advised that in their own interest, they should make arrangements for the insurance of their exhibits. Exhibits entered in the Exhibition will be received, held, exhibited and returned at the risk of the owner. The Exhibition Committee will ensure that there is reasonable security provided to protect the exhibits, but shall not be held responsible for any loss or damage.

9. LIABILITY

Although all reasonable care and caution will be taken with the exhibits, no responsibility shall attach to the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada, Edmonton Stamp Club, nor members of the Exhibition Committee and / or its voluntary assistants or employees, for any loss or damage to an exhibit arising from any use or reason whatsoever.

10. JUDGING

The Jury, consisting of at least five (5) accredited RPSC judges, will be selected by the RPSC Judging Coordinator, in consultation with the Exhibits Chair. The Jury will make decisions, deliberations and consultations among themselves in keeping with the RPSC Regulations. Exhibits will be judged according to National level standards. Decisions made by the Jury are final and cannot be appealed.

11. AWARDS

RPSC national medals will be awarded in five (5) levels in the General & One Frame Classes: Gold, Vermeil, Silver, Silver-Bronze and Bronze. All awards will be granted in accordance with the judged merits of the exhibits, without regard to Class, Division or Section.

No medal / ribbon award will be made if, in the opinion of the judges, the exhibit is of insufficient merit, but a Certificate of Participation will be given.

A Grand Award and Reserve Grand Award will be awarded in the Postal Class. A One Frame Grand and a Youth Grand will also be awarded. Depending on the number of entries, a Post Card Grand may also be awarded.

Available Society and other established awards, including APS, ATA, BNAPS & PHSC, will be awarded at the discretion of the Jury.

12. RULING AUTHORITY

Any and all questions that may arise concerning the Exhibition, which are not provided for by the Prospectus Rules and Regulations (other than Jury decisions) shall be decided by the Exhibition Committee in its sole and absolute discretion.

Baden 1862 3kr, 1864 9kr

Baden issued stamps with a new coat-of-arms design between 1862 and 1865. The Michel catalogue gives prices for unused stamps without gum for this series. The 3 kreuzer stamp normally is 20 euros with no gum (NG), 60 euros mint-hinged (MH), and 2 euros used. For the printing variety with a white spot below the "T" of "POSTVEREIN," the price is 150 euros NG, 400 euros MH, and 25 euros used. Figure 1 shows the full stamp with the location of the variety circled in white. Figure 2 gives a detailed view of the flaw.

The 9 kreuzer denomination is 7 euros NG, 18 euros MH, and 35 euros used. When there is a dent in the left outer frame line near the "F" of "FRIE," the price becomes 18 euros NG, 60 euros MH, and 140 euros used. Figure 3 is the full stamp with location of the flaw inside a white circle, and Figure 4 is the variety in detail. ☒

In the November/December *Canadian Philatelist*, editor Tony Shaman pointed out unique aspects of our hobby that make it different from other collectibles. Although I don't take issue with what Tony had to say, I believe that our hobby also has a great deal in common with other collecting hobbies. To try to prove my point, and maybe for a bit of fun, I offer you parts of an article by an expert dealer in a collectible other than stamps, writing about his hobby. I challenge you to work out what it is that this person deals in before I let you know. You may find it hard to believe that he is NOT a stamp dealer!

"True collectors do not collect with profit in mind. In my experience that does not even seem to be a long term concern with most collectors. Sometimes, in chatting with a collector about their collection, the collector might mention some horrendous price they have paid for a single item, but I can't really remember ever hearing one speculate what their outlay for a fairly big collection may have cost them, even in general terms. And it is only with collectors who are getting quite elderly that one even has conversations about eventual disposition of their collection.

"Collecting is an emotional process, a hobby which seems to so engage collectors, and which provides so much pleasure and comfort that I believe monetary reward is of little interest to them. Some collectors plan to give their collections to institutions on or before their death. And some are of the school that believes that they should return them to the open market to give later collectors a chance.

"I believe that profit is not a concern, nor ever was, of all the real collectors I have known. Whatever other value it may contain, a collection is really a monument to the person who builds it.

"Having considered all the arguments against a dealer as collector, I remain adamant: A dealer who does not collect cannot experience the emotional passion which fuels all collecting. And so he loses the ability to connect emotionally with his clients."

Dans le numéro de novembre-décembre du *Le Philatériste canadien*, le rédacteur en chef, Tony Shaman, a souligné certains aspects uniques de notre passe-temps qui le différencient des autres passe-temps de collection. Ce que Tony avait à dire ne me pose pas de problème, mais je crois que notre passe-temps a tout de même beaucoup en commun avec les autres genres de collections. Pour prouver ce que j'avance et pour vous amuser un peu, je vous offre quelques extraits d'un article qu'un négociant expert d'un autre domaine que la philatélie a écrit sur son passe-temps. Je vous mets au défi de deviner de quoi il s'agit avant que je vous le révèle. Vous allez peut-être trouver difficile de croire qu'il ne s'agit PAS d'un négociant en timbres-poste!

« Les véritables collectionneurs ne songent pas au profit. Selon mon expérience, cela ne semble même pas être une préoccupation à long terme pour la plupart d'entre eux. Parfois, au cours d'une conversation entre deux collectionneurs, l'un d'entre eux mentionnera le prix épouvantable qu'il a payé pour un seul article, mais je ne peux pas me rappeler avoir entendu quelqu'un spéculer sur le montant que l'ensemble de sa collection a pu lui coûter, même en termes généraux. Et ce n'est que chez les collectionneurs déjà bien avancés en âge que la conversation portera sur la façon de disposer éventuellement de sa collection.

La collection est un processus émotionnel, un passe-temps qui semble captiver profondément ceux qui s'y adonnent et leur procurer tant de plaisir et de réconfort qu'un avantage monétaire est de bien peu d'intérêt. Certains collectionneurs songent à léguer leurs collections à des institutions à leur décès ou avant. D'autres estiment qu'ils devraient les remettre en circulation sur le marché afin de donner une chance à ceux qui suivront.

Je crois que chez tous les véritables collectionneurs que j'ai connus, le profit n'est pas une préoccupation et n'en a jamais été une. Quelle que soit la valeur que représente une collection, cette dernière est vraiment une grande œuvre pour celui ou celle qui la monte.

Après avoir examiné tous les arguments qui s'opposent au fait qu'un négociant puisse être collectionneur, je demeure inflexible : un négociant qui n'est pas collectionneur ne peut pas faire l'expérience de la passion émotive qui anime toute collection. Et dès lors, il perd la capacité de se connecter émotivement à ses clients. »

So if I've succeeded to this point in puzzling you as to what collectible David Mason deals in, can it not be said that what he says above is also true about stamp collecting? And if that is the case, then the future of his field is likely to be very much like the future of our hobby, a topic that so many people enjoy speculating about. And if we looked long enough at the writing of other people about their collectible fields, would some or all of the same statements be made there?

Thank you for playing along with my guessing game. In case you were wondering, David Mason is a long time Toronto dealer in rare books. ☒

If the project is kept secure, and, of course, voluntary, participating members can develop trading and sharing connections with others who have similar interests. Yes, it would require work from some chapter leaders, but the directory can bring members together and promote interest and sharing in one another's specialties.

Visits to local service clubs. These community-minded groups are always looking for speakers at meetings and breakfasts. Their members enjoy seeing sets of stamps well displayed in albums or frames. I've found that all it takes to be invited is to find one stamp club member who belongs to a service club.

50/50 draws. Perfectly legal now, and though totally non-philatelic, they attract interest and open up wallets and pockets. The club itself and one member are always certain to be happy as a result!

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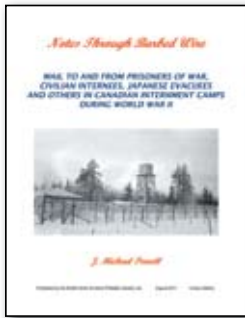

NOTES THROUGH BARBED WIRE, MAIL TO AND FROM PRISONERS OF WAR, CIVILIAN INTERNEES, JAPANESE EVACUEES AND OTHERS IN CANADIAN INTERNMENT CAMPS DURING WORLD WAR II

This volume dealing with World War II Canadian postal history is more than a philatelic study of prisoner of war covers. The 400-plus-page work incorporates historical information and images of internment camps and camp life of civilians. These photos add another layer to the educational aspect provided by this new publication about a dark chapter in Canadian history, especially for the many Canadians whose lives were negatively affected by the war that lasted for almost six long years.

The book is divided into eight major sections plus three appendices: a bibliography with separate philatelic and historical reference sections, a detailed textual index and an index of photographs. Postcards and other illustrations complement the Table of Contents.

Appendix A lists the main prisoner of war and internment camps located in Alberta, Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick; the satellite work camps situated across Alberta, Ontario and two in Manitoba; and the Japanese camps mostly in British Columbia although some "Road Camps" were located outside that province.

Appendix B, a work in progress according the author, consists of covers showing the locations of Canada internment operations and censor handstamps. As with the camps themselves, most of these locations were situated in Alberta and Ontario. Pictured in Appendix C is a reproduced Certificate of Parole for a Japanese National who was allowed to remain in Vancouver and appears not to have been evacuated to the interior for the duration of the war years.

Standard and special prisoner of war stationery, consisting of items such as "free" message cards and letter sheets, parcel acknowledgements, business letter forms and incoming mail, is dealt with in the opening section. A subsection shows examples of surface, air, metered, registered, free franked and intra-camp mail.

Use of a variety of hand stamps is an important part of processing prisoner of war mail and these are well represented throughout the second section of the book's ample illustrations. For example, Army Post Office forms such as various tags used to identify mail are amply pictured. Also shown are items such as circular date stamp and machine postmarks, camp date stamps and other route markings for incoming and redirected mail.

These first two sections of the Table of Contents have the individual page numbers omitted although this apparent oversight is not an insurmountable impediment in finding information as the omission is restricted to the first 107 pages only. All subsequent Table of Contents headings show the appropriate page numbers.

Nearly 160 pages are devoted to a variety of Canadian censor markings. All are described or pictured in the third section. Included is the earliest known correspondence from a World War II prisoner of war in Canada. It is dated Sept 18, 1939. Because the censor had not yet been provided with a handstamp, he simply applied his initials to the cover and marked it "Certified Prisoner of War Mail".

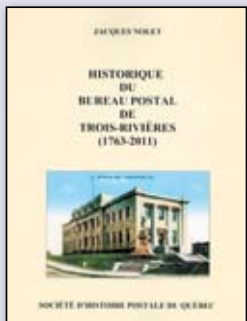
In section four, the author looks at foreign markings. Illustrated are German censor machine, handstamp and location markings as well as special handling, transit-post inspection and manuscript marks. Other markings include examples of tape with machine censor ties, examples of the end of German censorship, British and American censor markings and covers illustrating post-war censorship in Germany.

Although the vast majority of prisoners of war in Canada were German and Austrian, the author has included examples of mail from other than these two countries. Examples include rare covers from South Africa, Kenya, Isle of Man and Morocco. All are difficult to obtain. Not surprisingly, undeliverable mail would not be uncommon during time of hostilities and a section of the book is devoted to covers that did not catch up with their intended addressees.

This publication goes well beyond a sampling of prisoner of war held covers and related stationery. Many of the illustrated letters provide capsule summaries of the lives of the prisoners and brief notes by the author of the lives they built for themselves after cessation of hostilities. Many ex-prisoners made the choice to live in the country that held them captive during a dark period in Canadian history.

Notes Through Barbed Wire is a work that will be of equal interest to postal historians and readers with an interest in Canadian history.

L'histoire de la poste trifluvienne a débuté le 23 août 1763. Pour la première fois, un ouvrage philatélique s'attaque à l'ensemble de l'évolution historique du bureau postal de Trois-Rivières. Non seulement il aborde ses différents « maîtres de poste », mais également tous les autres aspects principaux de son évolution historique séculaire : emplacements, bureaux auxiliaires, poste ferroviaire, activités postales et marques postales. Abondamment illustré, riche en citations et en références bibliographiques, d'un intérêt particulier pour les généalogistes et les collectionneurs de marques postales, cette imposante recherche permettra une meilleure interprétation de la poste dans les contextes social, économique et politique de Trois-Rivières au cours des 250 dernières années.

A.C. ROESSLER'S CANADIANA

Many readers will have heard or read about A.C. Roessler and not always in the most flattering of terms. The prolific designer of airmail, first day and first flight covers and similar philatelic items also used an abbreviated form of his name, A.C. Roe, probably as a time-saving device because he addressed many hundreds of covers for his clients by hand.

A native of the United States, Roessler had a run-in with the law principally because he was too vocal in his criticism of U.S. post office practices. As a result, he was arrested and convicted in 1933 for fraudulent use of the mails in the U.S. He was given a suspended sentence and three years of probation, which still allowed him to continue his mail order business until 1940 when poor health and failing eyesight prevented him from carrying on. He is thought to have been unemployed after that date and survived on welfare until his death in 1952 at age 69.

Dickinson has managed to pull together Roessler's Canadian work and has presented it in this volume in a coherent fashion.

The snapshot of Roessler that the author provides in Chapter 1 gives readers background information that

explains much about the meager success that Roessler enjoyed as a cover merchandiser in a highly competitive business. When necessary, Roessler had no qualms in undercutting his competitors to stay in business. Much of his business philosophy seems to have been based on producing his covers as inexpensively as possible, which allowed him to undercut the competition.

With his training as a linotype operator Roessler possessed the skills to design and print the many covers that he produced during his career as a cover promoter and marketer.

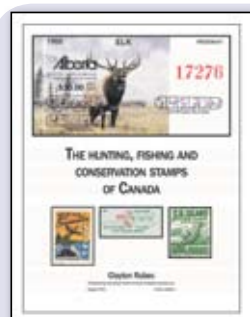
In Chapter 2 we see examples of his Canadian airmail envelopes, including examples of corner cards imprinted "inaugural" and "first day" flights.

Chapter 3 describes and illustrates Roessler's first flight covers. It covers the nine year period from February 1928 to December 1936. Included is a "preliminary" checklist of Roessler covers that collectors will find useful. Chapter 4 is devoted to first day covers. It is amply illustrated and contains a checklist of covers from September 21, 1928 to May 10, 1937. Included in the checklist are Scott and Roe catalogue numbers, issue dates and descriptions of the covers.

Semi-official flight covers, miscellaneous topics, geography and graphology and a final summing up of Roessler's relatively brief but active period dealing in Canadian philatelic material are covered in the book's last four chapters. A three-plus page annotated bibliography complements the volume.

The author's thorough research is evident throughout the work. For aerophilatelists, first day cover enthusiasts and cachet devotees, this publication provides information and illustrations in a single source not available anywhere else.

Every once in a while a new philatelic publication breaks new ground. *The Hunting, Fishing and Conservation Stamps of Canada* is such a work. It touches all aspects of revenue stamps by the various Canadian government departments, federal, provincial and territorial, that issued stamps for fishing, and hunting. Also covered in Rubec's extensive work are conservation permits and fund-raising stamps.

When compared to the plenitude of literature that exists to serve the philatelic collecting community, surprisingly little has been published that specifically deals with revenue stamps. Besides the E.S.J. van Dam and Edward Zaluski revenue catalogues and the various articles in *BNA Topics* there are not many sources that revenue collectors can access for relevant information. Rubec's work, for that reason, fills a huge void.

According to the author, the book is necessarily incomplete and ongoing. But, it is an incomparable leap forward from any published material currently available on Canadian revenue issues. It is a massive work that will surely find favour with revenue stamp devotees.

The bulk of the topics covered in this 448 page tome are divided into 14 sections and deals with the various stamp issues of the Government of Canada, the governments of the ten provinces and the three territories.

Novice revenue collectors will surely be surprised at the extensive and varied quantity of material that falls under the revenue stamp heading. For instance, stamps issued by the Government of Canada include

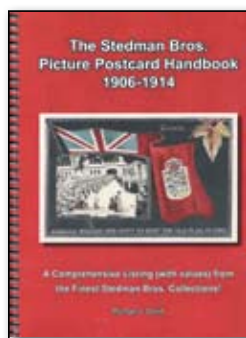
wildlife habitat conservation, salmon conservation and national parks motor license stamps. National non-government organization stamps include fund-raising stamps, waterfowl stamps and Earth Day commemorative stamps.

Provincial stamps are substantially more numerous and consist of categories such as hunting permit stamps, wildlife certificates, game bird, resource development and environment protection stamps. There are also non-government organization stamps under provincial jurisdiction and these include Prairie Provinces conservation and wildlife conservation fund stamps.

Each section of the book is amply illustrated with colourful stamps issued by the various government and non-government organizations. If one were inclined to compare the quality of revenue stamps with postage stamps, it would be extremely difficult to pick a clear winner. What is clear after perusing this extensively researched work is that the appearance and printing quality of revenue stamps do not take a back seat to postage stamps.

The Hunting, Fishing and Conservation Stamps of Canada is a publication that should be in the philatelic libraries of collectors of Canadian revenue stamps or those contemplating entering this relatively unknown field as well as other individuals with an interest in wildlife art. It is a book that individuals will find useful as a reference and one that they will be proud to own.

THE STEDMAN BROS. PICTURE POSTCARD HANDBOOK 1906-1914

Postcard collectors are well aware of Stedman cards but it is likely that not many would have guessed just how many different postcards the three brothers, Samuel, Ted and

George, produced. At one time, they also owned more retail stores in Canada than any of their close competitors such as S.S. Kresge's Metropolitan, Woolworth's and Zellers, or that

the Stedmans founded the *Canadian Home Journal* magazine. With prolific postcard author Michael J. Smith's latest publication, the seventh on the topic, we now have a much clearer understanding of the extent of Stedman postcards.

With the cooperation of Mary Stedman, daughter of the eldest Stedman brother, Samuel, the author had access to Stedman family photos, its family history, audiotapes and transcripts. From these sources we learn that the Stedman brothers owned more than 350 retail outlets from coast to coast and as part of their retail empire published millions of postcards. They were the most productive publisher of Canadian postcards in the early 1900s.

At one point the Stedman Bros. owned the lithographic plates that they maintained at a plant in Germany. The author is now in the process of investigating the names of the printer(s) that the Stedmans used in Germany.

Earliest known use of a Stedman postcard is 1906 and as this book is as a work in progress, the author solicits any earlier known dates from collectors. Another area where the author requests the help of fellow deltiologists concerns the initials preceding the postcard numbers. It turns out that a significant number of cards show these alpha prefixes, which are the initials of local postcard vendors or distributors. Currently, about 75% of prefix numbers remain unidentified and this aspect of Stedman Bros. postcards also remains a work in progress. It is worthwhile noting that nearly 90% of Stedman postcards are numbered.

The book is divided into three Parts plus the Appendix that illustrates the reverse sides of the various postcard types. A seven-plus-page Index of cities and towns complements the publication.

Part 1 consists of an 18-page introduction providing readers with a brief outline of the Stedman family history and details about the postcards such as numbers issued, earliest used cards, postcard backs, numbering and listing systems, values of cards and the various card grades. Smith makes the case that Stedman Bros. is an underrated publisher based on the number of different card designs they produced.

Part 2 of the publication lists the Special Series Postcards that run through 24 series plus a selection of cards that Stedman Bros. wholesaled. The section is richly illustrated with a limited number of cards pictured in colour with the majority reproduced in black and white.

Regular View Cards make up Part 3 of the book. They are listed by province beginning with BC and ending with cards depicting PEI scenes. Remember that Newfoundland was not a part of Canada when Stedman Bros. published its postcards.

The Stedman Bros. Picture Postcard Handbook 1906-1914 is a work that provides collectors with information not previously available in one place. Collectors of Canadian postcards, regardless of their specialty, cannot pursue their collections in an insightful way without referring to the new information and data contained in this groundbreaking work. It is a publication that is long overdue.
